

GOSPEL

Gospel - John 4:5-16,19-26,39-42 A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus tired by the journey sat straight

well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' – Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

> 'If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: Give me a drink, you would have been the one to ask, and he would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

'Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again; but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water. I see you are a prophet, sir. Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while you say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.' Jesus said:

> 'Believe me, woman, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know: for salvation comes from the Jews. But the hour will come – in fact it is here already – when true worshippers will worship

Cont...the Father in spirit and truth: that is the kind of worshipper the Father wants. God is spirit, and those who worship must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony when she said, 'He told me all I have ever done', so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when he spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard him ourselves and we know that he really is the saviour of the world.'

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CONVERSION AND PROCLAMATION



A strong element of our Lenten journey is the characteristic of conversion. What we mean by conversion is the consistent turning back to God after our failures and falls into sin. A fundamental aspect of this conversion is that God gives us numerous opportunities to come back to him, and he waits for us with open arms.

The narrative we have before us today of Jesus' encounter with the Samaritan woman at the well aptly points out for us Christ's call to conversion and evangelisation.

How does Jesus do this? First of all he is happy to upset custom and culture. It was not the custom for single men to talk to unaccompanied women in public. This was a cultural taboo. Secondly for an observant Jew to speak civilly with a Samaritan was also unheard of. Jesus goes against these strong cultural mores to reach out to this woman, calling her first of all to conversion, but also to evangelisation.

To add to this woman's handicap it is also the case she is a public sinner; living with a man who was not her husband. Yet, we do not know the reasons for her sad run of luck with marriage. She has had five husbands, but perhaps the failure of these relationships were not her fault alone. Culturally women had no say about divorce and thus it could be the case that her husbands Cont...terminated their relationships arbitrarily. Whatever of this woman's marital status her treatment from her fellow villagers is coloured with suspicion. She is ostracised, and indeed her embarrassment about her situation leads her to fetch water in the hottest part of the day to evade the judgmental gaze of her fellow citizens.

This scenario does not stop Jesus from offering her spiritual assistance to reform her life. The offering of spiritual water at first puzzles the woman who merely thinks on a materialistic level. Likewise Jesus' revelation of her marital status and the teaching that both the Jews and the Samaritans were wrong about the worship of God, piques the woman's interest. The woman's understanding of who Jesus is grows as well. First she questions the Lord with hostility, why would a Jewish man wish to talk to her?Later, their relationship grows, she calls him 'sir', and finally Jesus reveals who he is when the woman states that the Messiah will sort out the question of right worship:

"I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus, 'I am he."

At this revelation two things happen to the woman, there is a conversion and an evangelisation of the village. In that brief moment of revelation from Jesus the woman is convinced of his messiahship. Interestingly although she exclaims to the villagers 'Come and see a man who has told me everything I ever did;" she is no longer embarrassed about her questionable marital status or her past, announcing the good news takes precedence. God uses a sinner to announce salvation to sinners.

The moral for us is that we need to encounter Jesus in our sinfulness willing to be changed by him, but also challenged by him. Our growth in faith then leads us sincerely to share Jesus' power to heal, to save, and to love.
