

FIRST READING

First Reading: 2 Chronicles 36:14-16. 19-23

A reading from the second book of Chronicles

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its Sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep Sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth; he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."'

Gospel: John 3:14-21

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

The Son of Man must be lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. Yes, God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believed in him may not be lost but may have eternal life. For God sent his Son into the world not to condemn the world, but so that through him the world might be saved. No one who believes in him will be condemned; but who ever refuses to believe is condemned already, because he has refused to believe in the name of God's only Son. On these grounds is sentence pronounced: that though the light has come into the world men have shown they prefer

darkness to the light because their deeds were evil. And indeed, everybody who does wrong hates the light and avoids it, for fear his actions should be exposed; but the man who lives by the truth comes out into the light, so that it may be plainly seen that what he does is done in God.'

THE SACRAMENT OF MERCY

Hot on the heels of last week's readings concerning the commandments and Our Lord's cleansing of the Temple, it is worthwhile thinking about having our temples cleansed. We are reminded by St Paul in his First Letter to the Corinthians that indeed our own bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit:

19 Surely you know that your bodies are the shrines of the Holy Spirit, who dwells in you. And he is God's gift to you, so that you are no longer your own masters. 20 A great price was paid to ransom you; glorify God by making your bodies the shrines of his presence. (1 Cor 6:19-20)

When we combine this rationale with the prophetic action of Jesus in last week's gospel we see that Jesus seeks to cleanse our temples. How does he do this? Jesus has instituted for us the sacrament of Mercy, Reconciliation, or Confession to achieve this purpose.

We're not too keen on the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Some people prefer to go directly to God but if that were the case why did Jesus institute this special sacrament? Fear, laziness or a bad experience may be the obstacles to renewing our sorrow for the things we've done, but like some medicines it may taste bad or have strange side effects but its object is to cure us.

First of all, we need to realise our brokenness, our woundedness, and our frailty; humility is the name of the game. Moreover, holy scripture reminds us that we are not being true to ourselves, or to God, if we deny our sinfulness. St John in one of his epistles writes:

5 What, then, is this message we have heard from him, and are passing on to you? That God is light, and no darkness can find any place in him; 6 if we claim fellowship with him, when all the while we live and move in darkness, it is a lie; our whole life is an untruth. 7 God dwells in light; if we too live and move in light, there is fellowship between us, and the blood of his Son Jesus Christ washes us clean from all sin. 8 Sin is with us; if we deny that, we are cheating ourselves; it means that truth does not dwell in us. 9 No, it is when we confess our sins that he forgives us our sins, ever true to his word, ever dealing right with us, and all our wrong-doing is purged away. 10 If we deny that we have sinned, it means that we are treating him as a liar; it means that his word does not dwell in our hearts. (1 John 1:5-10)

Remarkably the first fruit of Jesus' resurrection wasn't his love, or a warm and fuzzy hug, but rather peace, peace that comes from knowing one is forgiven now. On that first Easter Sunday Jesus mentions two things to his disciples in that upper room where they remained hidden and afraid. Jesus first of all says 'Peace be with you' (John 20:19), then he breathes on them bestowing the Holy Spirit saying:

"Receive the Holy Spirit; 23 when you forgive men's sins, they are forgiven, when you hold them bound, they are held bound."

Jesus, by his death and resurrection, had merited the infinite forgiveness of sins for all humanity. In this episode in the upper
room Jesus associates his disciples with this fact and makes them
dispensers of the forgiveness he had attained for all. Yet, how can
one forgive if one does not know what another has done? How
can the disciple dispense this forgiveness without some
knowledge of the offence committed or even if there has been an
offence committed? It is with this logic that a person must first
reveal his sin orally so as to be then given the forgiveness of
Christ. Thus in bestowing the ability to forgive men's sins Jesus
gives the disciples the authority to judge and counsel those who
come to them seeking this prize. Earlier on in the gospels Jesus
had already given Peter first, then the other disciples, the ability
to make prudent judgments on how to govern the Christian
community. In Matthew 16:19 Jesus gives authority to Peter:

Cont..."I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; and whatever you bind on earth shall have been bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall have been loosed in heaven." (see also Mark 8:27-30; Luke 9:18-20; John 6:66-71)

This power is also given to the rest of the apostolic college as well. In Matthew 18:15-18 Jesus makes a number of statements to the disciples, one of his sayings is made during a discussion on how often one should forgive a brother:

15 If thy brother does thee wrong,[2] go at once and tax him with it, as a private matter between thee and him; and so, if he will listen to thee, thou hast won thy brother. 16 If he will not listen to thee, take with thee one or two more, that the whole matter may be certified by the voice of two or three witnesses. 17 If he will not listen to them, then speak of it to the church; and if he will not even listen to the church, then count him all one with the heathen and the publican. 18 I promise you, all that you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and all that you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven

With this declaration authority over the church is given but particularly in relation to the forgiveness of sins, the action in John 20:19 complements Jesus' previous actions; all of the chosen twelve had been given this ministry of mercy.

However, knowing this ministry must continue till Jesus comes again the ministry of forgiveness is passed from the apostles to their successors the bishops and their co-workers the order of presbyters (priests). It is via the apostolic succession and the supreme power to continue the work of forgiveness that all ordained priests have the ability to absolve sin. This power, however, may only be exercised with the permission of the bishop, for it is in the episcopal order that the power to forgive primarily and formally resides.

So let us think about cleansing our temples in the Lenten period, not only is this mandated by the Church (the so-called <u>Paschal</u> <u>Precept-the command to go to confession and receive holy communion at least once a year specifically in the period from Ash <u>Wednesday to Trinity Sunday</u>), but because it is beneficial to our spiritual health and our authentic following of Christ.</u>
