

#### Gospel - John 9:1-41

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

As Jesus went along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. His disciples asked him, 'Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, for him to have been born blind?' 'Neither he nor his parents sinned,' Jesus answered 'he was born blind so that the works of God might be displayed in him.

'As long as the day lasts
I must carry out the work of the one
who sent me; the night will soon be
here when no one can work.
As long as I am in the world
I am the light of the world.'

Having said this, he spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man, and said to him, 'Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam' (a name that means 'sent'). So the blind man went off and washed himself, and came away with his sight restored.

His neighbours and people who earlier had seen him begging said, 'Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'Yes, it is the same one.' Others said, 'No, he only looks like him.' The man himself said, 'I am the man.' So they said to him, 'Then how do your eyes come to be open?' 'The man called Jesus' he answered 'made a paste, daubed my eyes with it and said to me, "Go and wash at Siloam"; so I went, and when I washed I could see.' They asked, 'Where is he?' 'I don't know' he answered.

They brought the man who had been blind to the Pharisees. It had been a Sabbath day when Jesus made the paste and opened the man's eyes, so when the Pharisees asked him how he had come to see, he said, 'He put a paste on my eyes, and I washed, and I can see.'

Then some of the Pharisees said, 'This man cannot be from God: he does not keep the Sabbath.' Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there was disagreement among them. So they spoke to the blind man again, 'What have you to say about him yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet' replied the man. However, the Jews would not believe that the man had been blind and had gained his sight, without first sending for his parents and asking them, 'Is this man really your son who you say was born blind? If so, how is it that he

Cont...is now able to see?' His parents answered, 'We know he is our son and we know he was born blind, but we do not know how it is that he can see now, or who opened his eyes. He is old enough: let him speak for himself.' His parents spoke like this out of fear of the Jews, who had already agreed to expel from the synagogue anyone who should acknowledge Jesus as the Christ. This was why his parents said, 'He is old enough; ask him.'

So the Jews again sent for the man and said to him, 'Give glory to God! For our part, we know that this man is a sinner.' The man answered, 'I don't know if he is a sinner; I only know that I was blind and now I can see.' They said to him, 'What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?' He replied, 'I have told you once and you wouldn't listen. Why do you want to hear it all again? Do you want to become his disciples too?' At this they hurled abuse at him: 'You can be his disciple,' they said 'we are disciples of Moses: we know that God spoke to Moses, but as for this man, we do not know where he comes from.' The man replied, 'Now here is an astonishing thing! He has opened my eyes, and you don't know where he comes from! We know that God doesn't listen to sinners, but God does listen to men who are devout and do his will. Ever since the world began it is unheard of for anyone to open the eyes of a man who was born blind; if this man were not from God, he couldn't do a thing.' 'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born!' And they drove him away.

Jesus heard they had driven him away, and when he found him he said to him, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said, 'You are looking at him; he is speaking to you.' The man said, 'Lord, I believe', and worshipped him.

Jesus said:

'It is for judgement that I have come into this world, so that those without sight may see and those with sight turn blind.'

Hearing this, some Pharisees who were present said to him, 'We are not blind, surely?' Jesus replied:

'Blind? If you were, you would not be guilty, but since you say, "We see," your guilt remains.'

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#### I HAVE SEEN THE LIGHT



Last week we saw the theme of water as a symbol with the woman at the well. The water provided a variety of meanings for us, life, wisdom, and baptism. This week the theme is light, or being able to see the light because we've been enlightened. Water and light will make dramatic appearances at our

Cont...final destination, the Easter vigil.

But for the meantime, this narrative of the man born blind is a remarkable story because it charts, very much like the woman at the well, a growth in faith and finally a recognition of Jesus' identity. For the woman it was water that drew her in, for this blind man it is the ability to truly see, not just the mundane but the divine. An en-lightenment.

The scene is set by an encounter with the blind man. His blindness is thought to have been caused by sin, committed either by his parents or himself. This rationale, somewhat karmic in character or perhaps just downright superstitious, held that evil actions begot evil effects. Jesus will have none of this. Rather, in this particular instance, this man's blindness is not caused by anything, it was simply permitted by God like any other evil.

This situation gives rise to that old chestnut of the Problem of Evil, a conundrum which at its heart seeks to do away with the kind of God we as Christians take for granted. The atheist points to the blind man and retorts 'so much for your loving God! How could he let this happen?' And rightly so, it is a fair assessment to make. How do we reconcile God's benevolence with the apparent permission of evil to seemingly flourish? Whilst this scenario seems completely baffling to us, it is not from God's side of the ledger. If we hold it is indeed God's creation and the universe is directed and sustained by his loving Providence is it not plausible to believe God has his reasons for permitting such things? First of all who are we to dictate to God how he should run his creation? Secondly, we arrogate to ourselves that we somehow should be privy to God's mind! Is God accountable to us?

For this particular instance God's providence determined that this man would become a sign so that people could see who Jesus is. The physical blindness of the man is a strong metaphor for the spiritual blindness of the Pharisees and Jesus' opponents. By opening the man's eyes the only response is to seek out and determine who Jesus is. Jesus by his own admission describes himself in the following way:

As long as I am in the world I am the light of the world.'

The reply the Blind man gives to the Pharisees on his second unfortunate encounter with those religious professionals is interesting. The Pharisees badger the now healed man squeezing him for more information regarding his healing, St John narrates:

the Jews again sent for the man and said to him, 'Give glory to God! For our part, we know that this man (Jesus) is a sinner.' The man answered, 'I don't know if he is a sinner; I only know that I was blind and now I can see.' They said to him, 'What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?' He replied, 'I have told you once and you wouldn't listen. Why do you want to hear it all again? Do you want to become his disciples too?'

Clearly the Pharisees are intrigued by what had occurred and the blind man calls their buff, retorting "you seem awfully interested in this guy, do you want to follow him?" Whether this statement was said naively, or with impish wit, I'm not sure, but it would seem the key issue is, who is really blind here, who has seen the light? Furthermore St John uses a variety of "sense" verbs "you wouldn't <u>listen</u>" and "why do you want to <u>hear</u> it all again?" John is surreptitiously inferring that the Pharisees are not only spiritually blind, but deaf too!

The healing of the Blind man then encapsulates the theme of enlightenment. When we clear away those

Cont...obstacles or let Jesus clear those obstacles away for us, then we can truly see who Jesus is, and in doing so act like the Blind man who confesses his faith in Jesus:

'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said, 'You are looking at him; he is speaking to you.' The man said, 'Lord, I believe',

This man truly...saw the light!
