

FIRST READING

First Reading - Genesis 15:5-12,17-18

A reading from the book of Genesis

Taking Abram outside, the Lord said, 'Look up to heaven and count the stars if you can.' 'Such will be your descendants,' he told him. Abram put his faith in the Lord, who counted this as making him justified. 'I am the Lord' he said to him 'who brought you out of Ur of the Chaldaeans to make you heir to this land.' 'My Lord,' Abram replied 'how am I to know that I shall inherit it?' He said to him, 'Get me a three-year-old heifer, a three-year-old goat, a three-year-old ram, a turtledove and a young pigeon.' He brought him all these, cut them in half and put half on one side and half facing it on the other; but the birds he did not cut in half. Birds of prey came down on the carcases but Abram drove them off.

Gospel - Luke 9:28-36

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus invites all of us to "Come away by yourselves to a lonely place, and rest a while." (Mark 6:31)

WE ARE NOT ALONE

The response to this Sunday's Psalm is 'The Lord is my light and salvation'. The first verse, begins 'The Lord is my light and my help; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; before whom shall I shrink?' As we face the devastation of natural disasters at home and abroad, the violence perpetrated against Ukraine and threat of widening conflict let us remember the psalm as we go about our daily tasks. Indeed, all the readings from Sunday remind us we are not alone when we pray.

COVENANTS



We often hear in our religious language this term "covenant". This term conveys something more than an agreement or a contract. A covenant is a sacred contract, more solemn and binding than any earthly pact. The sacred character of the covenant is made all the more

evocative because its partners include on one side Almighty God who never defaults his promises and can never turn back on what he has sworn to do. On the other hand, is humanity, weak, fickle, prone to selfishness and often totally unreliable. If this were a business deal one would think God to be a fool, but then that is the intriguing element of this specific agreement.

Our Old Testament text we have today from the book of Genesis reflects the first covenant God makes with the father of the Hebrew people, Abraham. The nature of the covenant is manifested in a symbolism we find strange but it fits with the way covenants were enacted in the Ancient near East.

Abraham is ordered to sacrifice a number of animals cutting them in half, then we notice "a smoking furnace was seen, a torch of fire that passed between the pieces of flesh." This imagery depicts God passing

Cont...between the two halves of the bisected animal. This particular form of an ancient sacral covenant, of a kind known from other ancient Near Eastern sources, reflects how covenants were made in the ancient world. The ritual of covenant making saw the parties cut their offering in half and by passing in between the two cut pieces this symbolized that the parties would observe faithfully the agreement until the two halves come together again, (which meant never.)

It is God who passes through the sacrificial offerings for it is he who is making the covenant, an agreement on which Abraham cannot impose any conditions, for how could he put conditions on God? The remarkable thing is that God goes through with it all knowing that his human partner can never fulfill the bargain. On God's side the bestowing of this covenant is totally gratuitous, God is not forced to do this, he does it out of love and esteem for his human creature. On the side of the human creature all he can do is trust God that the promises made will be fulfilled.

It is this trust then that is at the heart of the covenant and it is the lack of trust in God that saw the covenant betrayed each time. As the Fourth Eucharistic Prayer prays:

Time and again you offered them covenants and through the prophets taught them to look forward to salvation.

A final reminder of the covenant is manifested in Jesus' transfiguration on Mt Thabor. This reminder is made all the more evocative because of the appearances of Moses and Elijah. As we know Moses symbolizes the Law, for it was to him the Ten Commandments were entrusted at Mt Sinai. The Law was, as it were, the fine print of the covenant, the do's and don'ts. In observing the Law the faithful Jew could establish that he indeed was loyal to the covenant and to the God of Israel. The formula was simple: keep the law and fidelity to God's word was manifest. The other figure at the Thabor epiphany is Elijah who is the dean of the prophetic college. He represents God's messengers whose main job was to guide Israel to fidelity. Both of these Old Testament figures point to Jesus who is the new and everlasting covenant; the last covenant and the most supreme of all. In Jesus God keeps faithful to that covenant he made with Abraham even to the point of shedding blood. Just as those animals were slaughtered and cut in half so the Divine Son is slaughtered so as to emphasis for the last time how faithful God is to his word:

THIS IS THE CHALICE OF MY BLOOD,
THE BLOOD OF THE NEW AND ETERNAL COVENANT,
WHICH WILL BE POURED OUT FOR YOU AND FOR MANY
FOR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS.

It is in Jesus' own blood that we see God's final agreement with humanity and it is in listening to him that we remain faithful to the covenant. Just as the faithful Jew kept the law, the faithful Christian listens to Jesus who comes to fulfil both the law and its prophetic witness. Today as we journey through Lent let us be mindful of the loving vow God makes to us and let us realise that in receiving the body, blood, soul and divinity of Jesus in Holy Communion this covenant is renewed and remembered. The promise God made to Abraham is still alive in the body and blood of Christ which we share.

Cont...The bottom line is that God keeps us true to that covenant by his Son, for it is this loving vow made flesh in Christ that God wishes to see fulfilled at the eternal wedding banquet of heaven.

EXPECTANT GLORY

What we expect to hear in Lent are lessons on fasting, prayer, alms-giving and perhaps the corporal works of mercy. This Sunday however, as many have noted before, we are surprised to hear the account of the Transfiguration of the Lord. The leap from the lessons we heard last week about the fasting of Christ, his hunger and resisting temptations of the devil - to the glory of Christ's divine face briefly revealed to the apostles on the mountain, seems initially a rather rushed if not an odd development.

Yet when we listen attentively to the story of Abraham who is led out of his home land and given a promise of a great inheritance, and when we consider how persistently St Paul urges us not to trust in earthly things but rather put our heart in our 'heavenly commonwealth', it becomes clear that the readings are focused on expectation itself.

What do we expect of our Christian lives and religious practices? What do we expect of the Lord?

Many of us simply seek peace of heart and mind in the life of faith. Many value the character building qualities of the Catholic discipline and want to raise their families in that spirit. Some want to strengthen their life of virtue. Some seek consolation because they are in pain and want to join their suffering to the suffering of Christ. Other still find here a treasure trove of energy and inspiration to make our world a better and more just place. We could surely continue here with a long list of possible answers. All of them are noble and good in themselves.

But today, only the second Sunday of Lent, another expectation is pointed at, prompted by the passage from St Luke's Gospel: it is the hopeful expectation to be raised to experience with Christ the glory of the Resurrection; the glory of his radiant face.
