

DAYS OF FASTING AND REPARATION

The forty days of Lent are upon us earlier this year! We have returned from our holidays of January. The return to work, school and the normal routine activities of our year are quickly occupying our time and energies. Yet, the annual Lenten penitential journey we now make towards Easter is here! In the midst of this sudden change of pace in our lives, let us try our best to enter into the grace Lent offers us all. Our ancient yet ever new Christian Tradition offers us during Lent the enduring disciplines of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. These prepare us to celebrate worthily the central tenet of our faith - the Death and Resurrection of Jesus. Our Lord and Saviour. In the Risen Jesus darkness and despair have been forever defeated by light and hope. Last December 2017 the Australian Youth Festival in Sydney proved a stunning moment of light and hope of the Holy Spirit for the thousands of youth gathered. Our own diocese was well represented. It officially launched the YEAR OF YOUTH for 2018. Yet, incredibly at the same time, the Final Report of the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse, was published. It has showcased moments of great darkness and despair not simply in courageous victims but also their family and friends and all of us. This tragedy of sexual abuse ought become a particular prayer focus of our Lenten discipline this year. The Bishops of Australia have requested that the four days from Ash Wednesday (14th Feb till 17th Feb) be dedicated in a special way to fasting and reparation in sorrow for child abuse and for the healing of victims. I am confident that parishes and communities will be able to respond appropriately to this request. Liturgical resources are readily available to assist. My prayer is that our spiritual journey of Lent to the Easter Mysteries assist us to shift our focus afresh onto Jesus, our hope and lasting peace.

In recent times we have seen natural disasters such as earthquakes, tsunamis, terrorism, war, displaced persons seeking new homelands, floods, fires, and starvation shadowing the earth. Yet in these shadows we have seen people of faith, courage, prayer and action, perseverance and hope; and through these people we have caught a glimpse of the self–sacrificing love of Jesus himself.

As in former years, we are invited to journey together in faith and if possible to set some time aside to reflect on God's Word as nourishment on our pilgrimage. LEPROSY

The disease called leprosy is a disfiguring illness in which ulcers and gangrene develop on human bodies. It is occasionally found in tropic areas, but is only slightly contagious. In ancient times people feared it so much that they labeled anything as leprous that even appeared to be infected. Thus conditions as widely ranging as mildew, rust and cancer were all grouped under its name. Anyone infected with apparent symptoms were quarantined. They could lose their homes, families and careers. Priests were called upon to give victims detailed examinations. Their verdict could condemn people to a living hell.

THE CHURCH'S HEALING TOUCH

Sixth Sunday of the Year.

fr David ask us to reflect on how we can bring Christ's healing presence to those most alone in the world.

There is a story, it may be apocryphal, about an upper class lady in Oxford who attended mass soon after the new ruling about the kiss of peace was introduced after Vatican II. When someone turned to her to shake her hand she withdrew rather affronted and said 'I do not believe we have been introduced.' Crossing social barriers can be dangerous. We see this today in the Gospel when Jesus meets a leper. Leviticus laid down strict rules for dealing with contagious diseases like leprosy. They were harsh but necessary. The leper must be isolated from society and his loved ones until there was a cure. Jesus himself seems to have recognised that it was necessary to have official priestly procedures to monitor the state of the illness. Leprosy struck the healthy with terror just as Aids and Ebola have in recent times. Isolation wards are essential and the victim must not be touched by unprotected human contact.

The Gospel reveals the desperation of this leper and the huge risk he and Jesus were taking in crossing a profound social gulf. The reading from Mark emphasises this. Notice how the leper approaches, pleads, falls to his knees and begs to be healed. He is desperate. Jesus could have just spoken a healing word, he could have raised his hand to bless, without making any bodily human contact. But notice how Jesus's gesture of touch is stressed: he stretched out his hand and touched the leper. And immediately he is healed.

Why does Jesus insist on touching him and what is the significance of this miracle? The reason for touch is simple. Jesus touched him 'out of compassion'. He was able to sympathise with the suffering of the leper so that he willed to bring him out of his isolation. So many of Jesus' miracles involve touch because it expresses powerfully the way the loneliness which comes with illness and stigma is overcome.

Jesus has announced the presence of the Kingdom of God in his ministry. When he exorcises the unclean spirits he is pushing back Satan's kingdom in a very dramatic way. The leper symbolises the isolation and alienation which many who have been made outsiders experience in a hostile society.

The healing is certainly dramatic but it dwells less on the sensational than on the leper who is healed and who can now return to the normal. He is restored to himself and given back to his loved ones. It is a sign of God's kingdom which through Jesus defeats the forces of evil and so breaks through the rigid barriers which a society can set up to protect itself against the outsider.

St Paul speaks in the second reading of respecting both Jews and Greeks. He knew too well how they could hate and stigmatise each other. But the isolating barriers which kept them apart were finally overcome through the death of Christ. St Paul fought hard for the unity of the communities he founded because he saw in that amazing the new unity in the Church of Jew and Gentile a witness to the power of Christ's resurrection. Leprosy can still act as a powerful symbol for the isolation which many experience in a society which stigmatises people who suffer from frightening illnesses or who are in some way seen as marginal. Even in the church we can reflect the rigid barriers of colour, class and race which society imposes and we react with fear and prejudice.

A Jesus who makes God's rule present when he reaches out and touches lepers and restores them to health and to family is a powerful challenge to the contemporary church. In a society which is becoming increasingly lonely and isolated, despite the claims of the social media, the Church is called to be what it should, a community where Jew and Gentile coexist and where the lonely, the isolated and today's 'lepers' and untouchables can find a home and a helping hand that is stretched out to them in welcome.
