

HOW FISH BECAME A SYMBOL OF CHRISTIANITY

The first disciples were fishermen.
The only recorded meal that Jesus cooked was grilled fish for breakfast at the end of John's



Gospel. Early on, the fish became a symbol for Christ from the Greek word for fish, *ichthys*: lesous Christos, Theou Yios, Soter - Jesus Christ, Son of God, Saviour. When two early Christians met, the first might trace one arc of the fish symbol on the ground, then the other would confirm that he or she was a believer by adding the complementary curve.

WHAT TO BELIEVE

"The gospel opens with two people who followed Jesus, but felt discouragement. Events have dashed their hopes. Now they walk away from the Christian community in Jerusalem. Luke symbolised the broken movement in Cleopas and his companion.

"But, as Jesus once gathered followers with his preaching and great signs, he would do again. He came near and engaged them in a faith dialogue without revealing himself. How does he begin? By being present and listening to stories of discouragement. On a human level, the two companions had every right to feel discouraged. After all, they placed their trust in the reputation of Jesus, only to have that trust crushed by the actions of the religious leaders.

"Jesus also listened to the companions' lack of trust. They heard the witness of the women to his resurrection but through their actions (ie. walking away), they showed disbelief. In light of past days events, the women's claim did seem hard to believe."

REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL

Extraordinary things can happen if we open ourselves to the presence of a stranger on the road of life. That is one of the elements in today's gospel which is the conclusion to the Emmaus story. When I was a student at Trinity College in Dublin writing about Luke's depiction of women in his second volume, I would often take a detour on my way home to visit the National Gallery of Ireland. Velázguez' remarkable oil painting, Kitchen Maid with the Supper at Emmaus captured and held my attention. In his painting, the kitchen maid pauses from her tasks to listen, through the window between kitchen and dining area, to the conversation between Jesus and the disciples. The disciples have not yet recognised the companion they had encountered on the road from Jerusalem. Velázquez seems to be suggesting that the young slave woman has sensed what they have still to discover. Imagine two dejected disciples (Cleopas and possibly his wife) on the road from Jerusalem to their home in Emmaus. On their journey, they encounter the risen Jesus. At first, they fail to recognise him. Their sadness at his death has blinded them to what is happening before their very eyes. He engages them in conversation and holds up a metaphorical mirror to their experience of loss and grief. Their hearts 'burn' within them as he opens to them the meaning of their sacred scriptures. They invite him to share a meal with them and their eyes are opened: they recognise him in the breaking of the bread. He disappears from their midst. They cannot contain the joy they have experienced in realising that Jesus is alive. Cleopas and partner go straight back to Jerusalem to share the good news with the other disciples. Now all the assembled disciples experience powerfully the presence of Jesus in their midst. They share a meal with him. He opens their minds to understand the scriptures. Everything falls into place. They not only understand Jesus' death and resurrection in the light of the scriptures. They now know that they will be 'clothed with power from on high' to exercise their role as witnesses to this great mystery, and to preach forgiveness to all peoples 'beginning from Jerusalem'.

Luke will open the Acts of the Apostles with the story of Jesus sending the disciples to be his witnesses to the ends of the earth. We who re-member these events in every Eucharistic celebration are both the recipients and the bearers of that message. If we allow our hearts to 'burn' within us, we too may recognise the Risen One in our gatherings and become his witnesses to the ends of the earth. *Veronica Lawson RSM*

WHAT ARE WE SUPPOSED TO DO?

Once, in perplexity, people asked Jesus, "What are we supposed to do?" (John 6:28). The Second Reading raises this question for us too.

The Second Reading says that if you don't keep God's commandments but say that you know the Lord, you are a liar. Being a liar is bad enough. But the Second Reading also says that if you don't keep the Lord's commandments, you don't know the Lord. If we believe that Jesus is the Saviour, sent by God to save us from our sins, then, sinful as we are, we are in fact keeping the commandment the Lord gave the people. That is the worst, isn't it? Especially because the test for whether or not you know the Lord is not whether you have fervent prayer or sweet religious experience. No, the test is just whether you keep the Lord's commandments. That is why you lie if you don't keep the Lord's commandments but still try to tell yourself and others that you know the Lord.

In another passage, this same Epistle (1John 1:6-8) claims that if you say you have no sin, you are a liar, too.

And now we have a real puzzle, don't we? To avoid the sin of lying, you have to confess that you do sinful things. But then you are confessing that you aren't keeping the Lord's commandments, aren't you? And in that case, you are a liar, and you don't know the Lord. Well, then, what are we supposed to do? The answer is in what Jesus told the people when they asked him that very guestion. Jesus said, "Believe in the one whom God has sent." (John 6:29) Notice that this is a command. And here is what it means. We can tell the truth: we are sinful. But it doesn't follow that we don't keep God's commandments. If we believe that Jesus is the Savior, sent by God to save us from our sins, then, sinful as we are, we are in fact keeping the commandment the Lord gave the people when they asked him what they were supposed to do. And if we keep his command, then it is also true that we know him. We know him as the Christ, sent by God to save us from our sins.

It can be true then both that we are sinful and that we keep the commandment of the Lord if we believe that he will save us from our sinfulness.

So this is what we are supposed to do: know him. Eleonore Stump

DOUBT NO LONGER

Third Sunday of Easter. Fr Aidan Nichols OP

discusses the difference between doubt and difficulty.

Today's Gospel shows the first disciples having difficulties and doubts about the Resurrection. Is it real, did it really happen, or is it an illusion, are we misinterpreting the evidence? Traditionally, the Church has distinguished between difficulties and doubts. According to John Henry Newman, 'Ten thousand difficulties do not make one doubt'. As reasoning people, we naturally apply our minds to our religion, including to what happened in the aftermath of the Crucifixion. There are difficulties here - about the sources, about the agreement of the witnesses, about the possibility of miracle, and, in the larger picture, about how the Resurrection of the Messiah can be said to fulfil the hope of Israel and consummate the creation. We face up to these difficulties, none of which is insuperable (to put it mildly!), and through them we grow into a more informed and intelligent faith

Doubt is something more radical. Doubt is wondering whether religious terms have any reference to reality at all. 'God', 'Christ', 'The Resurrection', 'The Holy Spirit', 'grace' - are these words just counters, is it all a game? Curiously, this kind of radical doubt is mentioned by both St Luke and St Matthew in connexion with the Resurrection appearances. With the risen Christ before their very eyes, some doubted. In today's Gospel, Christ gives his own analysis of why this could be and his explanation runs: the cause of it is fear or anxiety. 'Why are you so agitated?' 'Why are these doubts arising in your hearts?' 'Your hearts', we notice, not 'your intellects'. Something is wrong with their sensibility, with their passions, their emotions, and this is what is doing the damage to their judgment. This is what is causing doubt. Stepping back a little from the Gospel narrative, we can reflect on the following datum of human experience at large. If we are, in some way, fearful of reality in its richness and depth, we tend to clam up. We shut out from our minds the unexpected, which may also - but not necessarily - be the unpalatable. We like to have things taped. We feel secure and unchallenged that way. Predictability is a comfort zone. The routines even of a hard life become dear to people. This is strange but true. 'Human kind', wrote T. S. Eliot, 'cannot bear too much reality', or, come to that, too varied a diet of it.

Applying that generalization to the present case, then: to accept the risen Christ, which means, among other things, to accept that we are going to be in some manner changed by him and have our lives interfered with, may be more than we want to bear, at any rate at this or that time in our lives. The closed-in self must be opened up before we have Easter contact with Jesus. 'Why are you troubled?' 'Peace be with you!' It brings to a climax a theme sounded throughout his ministry. 'Why are you afraid?' 'You believe in God, believe also in me.'

Christian faith requires us to receive this mystery, to let it flow over us and shape our life. There is a parallel here with the philosophical realism in the school of St Thomas Aquinas. We are not to dictate to reality, to force it into the shape we prefer. We are to let go, let ourselves be carried by it, let it mould us by its own glorious objectivity. Life and the God of life are bigger than we are. If that is how we ought to approach creation, then the new creation - the supernatural - will surely make at least comparable demands.

The new creation has its realism as well as the old. What could be more basic to the act of faith than to say of the Gospel narratives and the invitation they contain: something real is here! God is here, and he is here for me. So in Paschaltide we hold out our hands to the Living One, the risen and exalted Lord, and experience in some degree the joy of his victory over death. He is truly risen, alleluia! http://english.op.org/torch
