THE SOURCE OF OUR DEEPEST COMMITMENT

Israel ratified its covenant with God in blood, half of which the priest splashed on the altar, the other half on the people. Jesus passed around the wine, which he called, "my blood, the blood of the covenant." Like the blood of the old covenant, it was poured out on the altar (of the cross), but unlike the blood of the old covenant, it was drunk by the people.

The priest offered up the "body" of the sacrificial animal as a "peace offering to the Lord." Jesus gave the disciples bread, which he called *my body*, but only after he had broken it.

Jesus thus leads us in the direction of giving ourselves totally for others. He pours out his blood for love of the world; he offers his broken body for love of the world; and then he has us consume these signs of love, to make them part of us so that we will make our own the total commitment to others expressed in the sacrifice of the cross.

Jesus became "mediator of a new covenant" by shedding his own blood. We follow Jesus into this new covenant by offering ourselves up totally for the well-being of our brother and sister humans.

The quest for human freedom and justice is not optional for Catholics, nor is it a small part of the Church's mission. Participation in the struggle for freedom and justice is a duty for each one of us, as it is a central element of the Church's mission of redemption and liberation. In the Eucharist we find the source of our deepest commitment to the loving service of our brothers and sisters.

GOSPEL SUMMARY

Mark describes for his community the words and actions of Jesus at the Last Supper. Scholars believe that the words are more an attempt on Mark's part to help his early Christian community understand the Eucharist than they are the actual words spoken by Jesus. Still they help us understand that Jesus was leaving the physical company of the apostles, and he gave them a way of remembering him through bread and wine, his body and blood. Much of this reading is about sharing a meal with those we love. In today's crazy world, with all the ways we run our children and ourselves ragged, one of our greatest priorities should be mealtime. Make this a time of day when family members feel safe to share their dreams, joys, and struggles of the day. As often as possible, allow enough time so that the meal is not rushed. Try to have all members together at least for one meal each day. Even special touches such as flowers, soft music or lit candles help create an atmosphere that encourages fellowship. Most families have lost loved ones, relatives, or close friends in death. Consider who some of these people are in your family's experience and share ways that you still remember that person. Perhaps you have photographs, some of their belongings, or beautiful memories. Make a connection to these memories and the memory Jesus left with his disciples and us. Allow each person to suggest ways he/she experiences Jesus' presence today.

WE BECOME HIM

We use the phrase 'Body of Christ' in three distinct but interconnecting ways. The first use is to refer to Jesus himself, stressing the full humanity of the Incarnate Son of God. He was formed in his mother's womb, was born and grew. He suffered, was tortured, murdered and was dead and bodily buried. But he is no longer dead, but Risen and glorified in his body. He is alive and with us. 'The second use of this phrase is to refer to the men and women and children who form the embodying of the life of Jesus in each and every generation. He, the living Lord, is the Head of his Body the Church. By baptism every Christian has the serious vocation of being the embodying of Jesus in the place, situation and time of their own lived life. 'What is true of the individual is even more vibrantly true of the Body of Christians under the active Headship of the Risen Jesus. Every parish community, or other grouping of Christians, has the on-going duty of being an embodying of Jesus in this particular place and time. 'The third use of the phrase 'The Body - and Blood - of Christ' is to refer to the celebration of the Eucharist at the heart of every Christian communitv. 'The Eucharist makes the Church, and the Church makes the Eucharist'. Whereas other food is eaten so that it becomes us, with this food which Jesus himself gives us we become him because it is him we are receiving.' Excerpt from a homily by Fr John Farrell OP

EUCHARISTIC SERVICE

The Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi).
Fr Malcolm McMahon OP
challenges us to become what we have received
in the Holy Eucharist, the body of Christ,
and as members of His body to carry him
into all aspects of our lives.

Dominicans from St Thomas Aguinas onwards have been very articulate in helping the Church understand more deeply the mystery of the Blessed Eucharist that we celebrate today. A modern Dominican, the late Father Paul O'Leary from Ireland has helped me personally in making the vital association between the Eucharist and justice. The constant mistake that we all make about the Eucharist is that is a thing rather than a person. With a person, we can develop a relationship which of its very nature is dynamic and healing, consoling, and loving. This is no less so with the presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. Personally I do not like the term adoration, which has become fashionable nowadays, because it can so easily makes me think of idolatry. The Blessed Sacrament is not a thing to be adored but a person to love and who loves us. Experiencing this creative love should change us and make us anxious to spread that love in our everyday lives. That is what Fr Paul pressed home to me in a sermon I was privileged to listen to when he was teaching in South Africa. The exact point he made was that there was little point in us sharing the consecrated bread of the Eucharist if we were not prepared to share unblessed bread with our brothers and sisters when we left Sunday Mass or Benediction and went back to our homes and work. In other words the Eucharist demands that we "love one another as I have loved you". The link between the Eucharist and Justice is an unbreakable bond of love. If we fail to allow this to work in our lives and continue to think that Eucharist is only about myself and how I feel then we are in danger of missing the point. The tradition of the Corpus Christi procession in public places brings this gift of the Eucharist to those who may not know or understand the presence of Christ in the Eucharist. It will startle some people and evoke all sorts of behaviour. Some will kneel down, their conscience jogged so that they resolve to be a better person. Other people will walk away and try to ignore the spectacle before them. It is not unusual for the procession to provoke a violent response among some of the members of the public. Though I imagine many will simply carry on with their shopping. But we know these reactions from the gospels so we should not be surprised. However when we take the Blessed Sacrament out of churches and process through the streets we are making a clear statement that Christ is for all people not just for those who go to church. In so doing we are taking the responsibility not to let Christ down. So don't process unless you are prepared to help those who sit by the roadside begging. You must be prepared to take Christ into those parts of society where injustice prevails whether it is in an abortion clinic or a business that exploits it workers. At times this may seem just too challenging. But don't worry about this, because in receiving the Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist you will be given the grace to see what needs to be done and power to carry it out. We are not alone because Christ is among us as one who serves, offering his life as a ransom for many The Eucharist makes present for us, now, Christ's sacrifice of his entire self for me. And so, each time we eat the Bread of Life and drink the Blessing Cup, we associate ourselves intimately with that offering of the Lord. We are saying 'Amen, yes, so be it', to his invitation to a life of committed and self-sacrificing love and service. For Christ has left us as example that we are to copy: an example expressed in the simple gesture of washing feet and a call to do the same for one another. A final thought on this Feast of Corpus Christi that we can pray is the post-communion prayer from the Liturgy for the feast of St Augustine: Lord, make us holy by our sharing at the table of Christ.

As members of his body, help us to become what we have received.
