AUSTRALIAN CATHOLICS

Many of us will be shaking our heads at the events in Adelaide, Newcastle and elsewhere over the last few weeks.

A book of images by the brilliant Australian photographer Michael Coyne - Second Spring – The regeneration of the Jesuits. It is a simple book filled with images of Jesuits in mission with humanity around the world. The forward to the book was written by Morris West, one of Australia's most successful writers whose literary works were translated into 27 languages and sold more than 60 million copies who in part opined:

"We are a church in crisis. We are a community divided. We need for ourselves and for our children a restatement of the Godspell in the language of the human heart and not in the language of theologians and canonists. These were the terms in which the original message was delivered to us by the Savior. He did not give us theological treatises. He gave us simple parables: the sower going out to sow his seeds, the passing birds whose flight was known by the Creator, the lilies of the field more glorious than Solomon, Caesar's coin and the coinage we pay as tribute to the Creator.

"The time of rebirth and restoration is overdue. The people of God are parched and thirsty for sweet water."

There is much pain, distress and anger to name a few of the emotions of the people of God. Socially and demographically, Church composition has changed significantly over the last 40 years. Our institutions have grown and we find people where they gather now, not where the primary points of congregation used to be in our parish churches. We are charged to hear the many voices. So it is timely for us all to participate in this plenary process. But to do it requires imagination not only of the organisers but of the participants. Under canon law, 50% of the members of the Plenary will be ordained clergy. It is critical that the voices of many are heard gently through this initial stage so that the conversations transmitted to them reflect impetus, not just noise.

CARRYING FORWARD CHRIST'S MISSION

'In reality, the unity which God wills for humankind is broken in many different ways. The poverty gap between rich and poor has widened in the past decade. In developing countries destitution, malnutrition, vulnerability to disease, remain scandals that may implicate Western nations as the beneficiaries of an unjust economic order. Within so-called 'developed' nations migrants and asylum-seekers may be isolated and humiliated, a far cry from the compassion which is to be shown to strangers by members of the Promised Land. Their advertised exclusion supposedly serves our national or cultural unity - whatever that is. As I write this sermon, I can only guess if and how these questions are addressed in the new papal encyclical from Benedict XVI, *Caritas in Veritate* (Charity in Truth).

'Yet the very existence of such an encyclical can inspire hope. It reminds us that the prophetic mission of Amos (First Reading) to speak the words given to him by God is not a dead letter or dead end. That mission to Israel continues, culminates, in the advent of the Divine Word made flesh, Jesus Christ, whose preaching is carried forward in today's Gospel by the apostles. The encyclical reminds us that His and their mission is likewise carried forward in the Church. Her vocation is inescapable. For - mercifully - whatever our disunity, whatever the false compromises, God has acted decisively to restore our full unity in Christ. As the Letter to the Ephesians insists, God chooses us to be His adopted children in Christ so that all things are brought together at the end under His authority.'

A DRESSER OF SYCAMORES

The first classical prophet was not a professional preacher. Amos laboured as a migrant farm worker traveling throughout Israel to find employment. Among his jobs was that of tending Sycamore trees. These are not the European or North American variety, but a type of plant native to the Middle East. Sometimes called "the poor man's fig tree," they produce a small fruit encased in a husk. During the growing season these husks must be pierced with a sharp stick for the fruit to ripen. The yield was of little value. Despite his low-paying occupation, Amos was rich in prophecy. He was the first prophet to write down his words.

LIVE OFF THE LAND

After having trained his apostles in his teachings, Jesus sends them on a trial missionary journey. He instructs them to be "free spirits" by living off the land and charity. They are not to carry anything that could encumber them in their work. Baggage is a handicap for a person with a mission. The very fact that they will be living by faith will be a sign to others of the efficacy of their message. We also see that Jesus institutes the Christian sacrament of anointing by giving his apostles power to heal with oil.

GOSPEL THOUGHTS

'The Gospel passage follows immediately the story of Jesus' rejection as a "prophet without honour," who then commissions his 12 disciples to adopt the prophetic life-style of itinerant preachers. 'In Mark the 'formation' of the disciples unfolds in stages. They are called to follow Jesus and become people who fish for humans (1:16-20); later they are called "to be with him" and are given power over evil (3:13-19). At this point their mission closely parallels that of Jesus: preaching repentance, confronting the power of evil, healing the sick. Jesus will later tell them that they too will be rejected by their loved ones (13:9-13). The lack of material support, food, money and sack (briefcase) and their dependence on hospitality from others are signs of their total reliance on God and of their freedom.'

CARRY NOTHING BUT THE WORD

Fifteenth Sunday of the Year.

Fr Leo Edgar OP examines how the excess baggage of modern life can get in the way of preaching the Word.

Is it fear that prompts us to rely on modern technological advances in communication? An interesting question, perhaps. Are we too afraid to rely on the gift of memory? Is this the "power" referred to in the passage from Mark's gospel?

Mark writes of the power conferred by Jesus on those he sent out. But along with the power he gave them, he also instructed

To be able to trust in the generosity of others is indeed a great virtue, particularly in a society that nowadays rarely goes anywhere without a cell phone or a laptop. Is it fear that prompts us to rely more and more on artificial means of communication? Fear that we can no longer rely on memory, one of the greatest of the gifts of the Holy Spirit? The Twelve Apostles had no such restrictions or fears in their preaching, going out to the whole world to share the Good News.

Remembering some of the great Christian preachers of the past, Paul & Barnabas, Dominic & Francis of Assisi, Vincent McNabb, Billy Graham, Martin Luther King, and, in more recent times, some of our own contemporaries, what inspires the preaching of the Good News is the News itself. The gospels never cease to inspire, no matter how frequently we visit them – in fact the more often we approach the 'Word' the greater the impact it should have on our lives, the more Christ's power is working through us.

Jesus sent his disciples, his preachers, out into the world with a clear message: "Tell the world the Good News that I have given you."

Nothing else is needed; no advertising; no TV commercials; no computerised back-ups; simply the word as it is given to them should be passed on without additional 'baggage'.

The ability to preach the gospel therefore, depends not so much on externals as on a desire to convince one's hearers of the validity, the truth, of the message one preaches. Accompanied by healing powers given by Christ and through faith, the impact can be dynamic, and no doubt was, and still is.

The Acts of the Apostles tells us little of the impact made by Christ sending his ambassadors into the world; but Mark tells us that the Twelve set out and preached repentance, casting out demons and anointing and healing many who were sick. St. Paul's letters give a more detailed & graphic coverage of the effect of his early preaching.

Current ambassadors of the Word have a distinct legacy to live up to in their bringing the Good News to the world of today. Modern technology should assist in that task, as it enables the message to reach beyond the boundaries of conventional church. But above all we should recognize the power that accompanies the preaching of the Good News. Even the poorest of preachers can produce a rich result in the minds of those who listen. And there is a warning: if there are those who refuse to listen, then we should not be afraid to shake off the dust from the feet, and leave the task to another, possibly at another time. There seem to be two clear messages in this Passage from Mark; one, that Christ's church must not allow itself to get clogged down with too much "baggage", too many irrelevant additional rules that may detract from the preaching message; and two that it must be prepared for those who refuse to listen, but stay determined to continue to preach the Good News in the same way that Christ himself continually preached.
