A LOVE LEARNED FROM GOD

'Jesus approaches the end of his journey. He has already entered Jerusalem when a "scribe", who is evidently well disposed, asks which is the greatest of the commandments of the Law. As interpreters of the Law, the scribes had listed 613 ordinances calling for observance; it is not surprising that they often discussed their relative importance.

'The Covenant was intended to make old Israel "a light to the nations" – their life, shaped by the ways of God, learned through the covenant relationship, was to be an invitation to all peoples of the earth to find the one, true God – "The Lord our God is the one Lord" – and the blessings life with God can bring. The Saviour links the two commandments under the rubric of "love". The love true believers have for fellow human beings is a love that has been learned from God.

'The theme of "love", so important to every human heart, was soon to emerge, we know, as the very heart of the Gospel, the good news that "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son".'

CONVERSATIONS MATTER

Most organisations have planning days to discuss what they're doing right or where they can improve. A variety of questions are canvassed such as: 'Is there still a reason for us to exist?' or 'Do our clients, customers, readers, share the same vision?' Jesuit Media held one of those days recently, and in attempting to explain its raison d'etre, the word conversation kept cropping up. Everything we do - every article that is published - is designed to further conversation among ourselves, or between ourselves and God. In the readings next Sunday, Jesus and a scribe have an open conversation about God's commandments. As Fr Brendan Byrne SJ says in his homilist notes, 'scribes are usually hostile figures in the gospels but the one who approaches Jesus seems a genuine inquirer. At first, the conversation is straightforward. The question - which commandment of the Torah is the "first"? - was a standard item of discussion among the rabbis. And Jesus initially responds in conventional terms. But he then goes on beyond what the scribe had asked to offer a "second" commandment - "to love one's neighbour as oneself".' That reported conversation has resonated for more than 2000 years.

On Friday, the Intenational Day to End Impunity for Crimes Against Journalists will be held. Many are dismissive of journalists, and in Australia there are no end of opinions about the worthiness or truthfulness of what appears in our news each day. However, there are many journalists who have been beaten, imprisoned or killed for speaking truth to power, such as Jamal Khashoggi. Their stories remind us of the deeper role that journalists can play in our society – starting conversations that can lead to change or growth, much in the same way that Jesus did all those centuries ago.

THE ROOT OF CHRISTIAN LOVE

Citing another text from the Torah, Jesus then says that the second command is: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself' (Lev. 19:18). Its fundamental presupposition is not psychological well-being, but a conviction well expressed by Thomas Merton: 'The beginning of the fight against hatred, the basic Christian answer to hatred, is not the commandment to love, but what must necessarily come before in order to make the commandment bearable and comprehensible. It is a prior commandment to believe. The root of Christian love is not the will to love, but the faith that one is loved...by God although unworthy or rather irrespective of one's worth!'

LEARNING TO LIVE

Thirty-Third Sunday of the Year. fr Peter Hunter OP helps us to see how the purpose and meaning of life are given as a gift.

We've all had that experience of joining a group of friends who are mid-conversation, and finding that, at least at first, what they're saying makes no sense to us. Without the context of what they've been saying, it's hard to get our bearings, and work out just what the things they are saying mean.

Maybe we feel that way about our lives a lot of the time. Instead of making sense, our lives seem disjointed and confusing, and it's hard to find a meaning in the things that happen.

People say, "Everything happens for a reason", but that's precisely because it doesn't look that way. If the reasons behind the things that happen in our lives were clear, we wouldn't spend any time at all trying to persuade ourselves that things happened for a reason. But it isn't so obvious.

One way of reacting to this lack of meaning is to try to create

meaning for ourselves. A lot of people nowadays think it's up to us to create the meaning in our lives. We must decide on a purpose for our lives, heroically make something of ourselves. I don't think that works, and it's all very exhausting! Part of what Jesus is talking about in today's Gospel is the idea that our lives, indeed the whole history of humanity, the whole universe, already has a meaning and a purpose: we're just ignoring it. He seems to think that the meaning is pretty clear, as openly obvious as the coming of summer, the signs which herald the passing of the seasons.

Sometimes, it's pretty hard to accept that the way things are going in the world has anything to do with God. Our news is full of tragedy and suffering. It doesn't feel as if God is in charge. But even in the darkest stories, there is often a sign of hope. There are people fleeing their countries and people trying to stop them coming here, but there are also people working to make them welcome and to care for them.

In our own lives, I think we often see, especially looking back, a story to our own lives which was not of our making. When I think of the various events in my life that nudged me towards joining the Dominicans, it's quite unnerving, because I begin to realise that all my own decisions, some of them made for good reasons, but some even made for rather selfish ones, took me down a path I had not planned to be on.

I say "unnerving" because I have to come to realise that my life

and its meaning and purpose are not my own. I can try all I like to give meaning to my life, I can have as many plans as I want, but ultimately none of that amounts to much. The meaning of my life, the story I find there, is being told, not by me, but by God. I don't mean he tells that story in a way that makes my choices irrelevant, but even when I make bad choices, God can use them to move the story in the direction he wants. Understanding our lives, then, is not about heroically creating meaning. It's about discovering the meaning that is already there, our part in the greatest story ever told, the history of the whole universe, as told by its Creator, the God who loves us. Making sense of what's going on involves seeing things more and more in the light of the revelation that God has given us in Jesus. Things can seem confusing and disjointed, a bit like arriving in a conversation part way through. In that conversation, of course, the people talking have no difficulty knowing what's going on, and the more we listen and adopt their perspective, the more it makes sense to us too.

Something similar happens in our lives. The more we come to share the perspective of God, particularly in prayer, the more the story becomes our story, and the more we see the sense of it. I'm not sure we will ever know it fully this side of eternity, and knowing the meaning sometimes doesn't make it any less difficult. But the glimpses we get now give us hope that one day, we will know as fully as we are known, and love will be all in all.
