When life shuts a door... Open it again. It's a door. That's how they work. The celebration of Australia Day on 26 January has always been marked by controversy. That was inevitable once it was decided to hold it on the day that the First Fleet arrived at Sydney Cove.

This marked the beginning both of British settlement and of Indigenous dispossession.

So, on the face of it, not a suitable date for a celebration that unites Australians. It is rather a sign of division between winners and losers from the landing.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

But we are free to make of celebrations what we will, and perhaps precisely because the date of the holiday is so ambiguous, it may actually be very appropriate. Its awkwardness reminds us that there is unfinished business. It says that we are not a perfect people, that our prosperity is not equitably shared, that our good fortune is built on the unmerited aggrandisement of some and the undeserved dispossession of others, that our history carries much to be proud of and much to be ashamed of, and that our future must be built on reconciliation and not moving on from an unhealed past.

Australia Day reminds us that our nation is not exceptional, does not have a unique destiny, but is the result of what we human beings, at once precious and sinful, have built, of the quality of our relationships with one another and with our environment, and of the justice and the equity of the institutions we have shaped.

NATION BUILDING REQUIRES WORK

Australia Day is not an occasion to praise ourselves that we are different from other nations who are less wise, courageous and industrious than we are, but a time to note the differences between Australians, to recognise the ways in which power has triumphed over justice in relationships between us, to celebrate the moments of reconciliation, and to resolve to address wisely, courageously and industriously the consequences of dispossession in order to shape a nation we can be proud of. Australia Day, of course, is a day free from work, a time to put snags on the barbie and to rest. It is a time to be thankful for the relatively peaceful and prosperous society that we have. But it is also a time to remember the history of conflict that has advantaged some of us and disadvantaged others, and to respect the people on whose dispossession our prosperity rests.

TIME TO BE SERIOUS

The close association with the Day to remember the victims of the Holocaust (27 January) does highlight the serious side of Australia Day. Of course, it is not right to compare the events of the Holocaust and those of the settlement of Australia. But the mention of the Holocaust does remind us of the danger when any society marginalises and scorns a minority of its citizens. Such unresolved prejudice can have murderous consequences. CONNECTIONS

It is likely that Jesus sat near the Ark of the Covenant in the synagogue at Nazareth. He looked out at the familiar faces from his home town. They had always known him as the son of Joseph, the carpenter. As the Torah was carried back to the ark they chanted the Eighteen Blessings. The chazan handed Jesus the scroll from Isaiah. After reading it, Jesus said: "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." More than 2,000 years later, this Gospel still challenges us. We might ask, "Is Jesus really that fulfilment of Isaiah's prophecy?" Will we defend him today?

GOSPEL SUMMARY

The first part of today's Gospel introduces Luke's Gospel and Acts. Luke recalled for his readers that stories had been handed down by eye-witnesses and written down by others. He intended, however, to improve on the order of these earlier accounts. The lectionary moves us to another beginning and that is the beginning of Jesus' ministry. He had traveled throughout Galilee teaching in the synagogue. This day, he was in his home town of Nazareth where he unrolled a scroll and proclaimed the words of Isaiah. The Spirit of the Lord will come upon one who will free captives, favor the poor, and give sight to the blind. After Jesus rolled up the scroll, he told his listeners that those words had been fulfilled in him.

REFELCTION

Children are really all the things listed in what Jesus read from Isaiah. They are poor because they really depend on parents for their every material need. They are not free because they are too young and inexperienced to live on their own. While they're not completely blind, much of what they do see has been shaped by their parent's vision. When we think of all parents do for their children, it becomes clearer all that Jesus is for us.

PAUSE THE GOSPEL

Why does the church pause here, and finish the story next weekend? Because today this Scripture is fulfilled in our hearing. We pause at the best part of the story. Because it is too easy with a familiar story to jump to the conclusion, and miss an unmistakable call to action. Because we are the body of Christ. The second reading confirms this: We are the body of Christ which is comprised of many unique parts. Think a minute: The Spirit of God is upon you and me. Why? Because God anointed each of us at our baptisms. And the Spirit rushed upon us when we were anointed during the sacrament of confirmation. Do I believe I have a role to serve that no one else can do? We each have a mission. Do you know what yours is? As we gather for Eucharist today, can I wait eagerly for each Gospel sentence, as attentive as the assembly that gathered around Ezra or Jesus? When I leave Mass today, how will this "Spirit of God be upon me or upon you?" How will it be evident where you go and in people you meet? To whom will you bring glad tidings - news that God loves each one of us? Today - we can proclaim, heal, free the oppressed and forgive. As the psalm today says: Rejoice! Be refreshed. Enlightened. And just.

MERCY AND MISSION

Third Sunday of the Year.

Fr John Farrell OP explains how we are called to works of mercy and mission through our encounter with Jesus Christ. Today we begin our Sunday readings from the gospel of Saint Luke which will continue throughout this liturgical year. Here, as the gospel opens, Luke deliberately brings forward an episode which Matthew and Mark have as occurring later in Jesus' public ministry. In this way the story hits us with great force. It is the public and explicit Manifesto of the Messiah, the Anointed One, the Christ. Jesus sets out his programme with Spirit and with power. The setting is his own home synagogue which he would have known from his childhood, a familiar place. The drama is played out: Jesus stands up to read, the official hands over of the large scroll of the prophet Isaiah, Jesus unrolls the scroll at his chosen place, he proclaims the prophecy. Handing back the sacred text there is silence and anticipation. "All eyes in the synagogue are fixed on him." He sits, (to teach) and then come the resounding words of the Christ which we hear this morning in our own churches and congregations: "Today this text is being fulfilled even as you hear it".

We Christians, who hear this read amongst us this Sunday, we have also been sent, by Jesus. We have also been anointed by his Holy Spirit. This prophecy of power and service is being fulfilled even now as we hear it today and as he, the same one, is present in our assemblies and in our mass. His mission is the same one into which we were "Christened": baptised and anointed in the one Holy Spirit.

St Paul explains this in the second reading today – about Christian people in all their diversity and complementarity forming the Body of Christ. Any and every Christian community, parish, congregation or meeting is called to be the living embodying of the presence, salvation and mission of Jesus the Christ in that particular place and at that particular time.

Our first reading today is an account of the re-establishment of the Commonwealth of Israel after the devastation of the Exile in Babylon. Ezra the priest "learned in the Torah" and Nehemiah the Civil Administrator lead the People of God to promise to follow the Law of God as the Book of the Law is read out. Christianity is not a religion of the book (as is often said), but of a person, the living person of Jesus who calls all to become part of the ongoing embodying of his life in each generation and in every place. Christianity is centred around the living and crucified Lord who comes to us in word and in sacrament and also in

the poor, the imprisoned, the hungry and the naked, the broken hearted and the lost.

We have all become familiar with the idea of the Christian liturgy as made up of word and sacrament but it is really made up of three parts: word, sacrament and the ongoing Christian life of works of mercy which are to flow out of our worship and lead us back to it. Pope Benedict in his encyclical on Charity taught that Christianity can no more give up works of mercy than it can give up the sacraments or the Scriptures. None of the three are optional. In this "Year of Mercy" it is refreshing to remind ourselves of the essential structuring character in the Christian life of works of charity and mercy along with our devotion to the Scriptures and the sacraments.

Furthermore this outreach of mercy which is intrinsic to Christianity is truly ecumenical. In this we can work together fully. Whether we are considering the various Protestant churches of our own country or the suffering Christians of the Middle East and Africa: we were all baptised in the one Spirit and all given the same Spirit to drink. The one Lord and Christ has sent us and anointed us, as a Spirit-filled People embodying, his presence, "to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour".
