

CONNECTIONS

Today's Gospel tells of how when an angry older brother confronted his father about welcoming the prodigal son back home with a lavish feast, the forgiving father replied: "My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found."

In this story, can we see ourselves in all the characters? How many times have we been the prodigal son? Or the angry and jealous older brother? And, how many times have we been the forgiving father? Consider how many times have we been grateful to our heavenly Father for his unending forgiveness of our transgressions.

GOSPEL SUMMARY

Today's Gospel is the well-known story of the prodigal son who begged for his share of the family inheritance. He took his fortune to a faraway place and quickly spent all he had on his personal pleasures. He was completely broke when a serious famine struck the area and he was forced to tend pigs, an occupation prohibited to Jewish people. As he tended the pigs, he hungered for their scraps and realized that his father's slaves lived better than he did. It was then that he decided to return home, not as a son, but as a hired hand. So happy was the man's father when he saw his son return that he celebrated with all sorts of signs of honour. The father's older son, however, was very displeased with the way his father treated his brother, claiming that he had always been there working like a slave for his father. Never once had the father celebrated with this son. The father explained that the older son had always been with him and obedient. It was cause to rejoice, however, that his other son had been lost but now was found.

Reflection for Families

Parents try to divide the world into equal pieces for each of their children, but they know how very different each child can be. There are really no one-size-fits-all sets of expectations for families with more than one child. This Gospel helps us remember that we need to recognize the virtues of obedience and faithfulness, while we still love unconditionally and forgive the child who challenges us. Both brothers in this story considered themselves slaves, feelings we work hard to prevent in our children.

Bringing the Gospel Into Your Family

This parable about the prodigal son is a story about families and filled with emotion. Gather all your loose family photos and organize them into an album. (If you're lucky enough to be up to date, go through your photo albums.) As you arrange the photos, talk about your memory of that picture and the emotions that you associate with its circumstances. When you have finished, decide which emotion most characterizes your family. Are you pleased with this defining emotion or is this a good time to work on some changes?

THE PRODIGAL,

Today's Gospel passage is usually known as the parable of The Prodigal Son. A more fitting title might be the parable of the Prodigal and the Vindictive Sons. Prodigal means "wastefully extravagant". It aptly fits the young man who wants his father's legacy before the father dies. He acts foolishly and shows no regard for the survival of his family. His brother is no less blameless. While he has worked for his father, his words suggest that his motives were not exactly pure. His vindictiveness against his brother also indicates his base character.

The real hero of the story is the provident father. He loves both his sons, despite their flaws. In the boys, we see the extremes of human failure. In the father, we see God.

GOD CALLS US TO CHANGE

'The bad side of the bad son is that he does not see that the father's estate is not for profligate personal reward, but is a livelihood which covers good times and bad times such as famine. The good side of the bad son is that he is open to grace and open to see that his father represents love, grace, support and family gathering. This stirs him to see his sinfulness against his father and also the heavenly providence of God.

The bad side of the good son is that he has lost vision of his work for his father as using God's gifts and living on God's livelihood. The good side of the good son is that he has respected his father and done his commands, perhaps in an unseeing way. His father nevertheless says to him, 'all I have is yours' in an expansive way. All of our actions should have an implicit address to God. If done as a burden, then God calls us to change. If done in superiority to others, he calls us to change. Be reconciled!

TWO WAYS OF LOOKING AT THE PRODIGAL

Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday). Fr Robert Ombres OP helps us to envision

how we can see our own lives in the mirror of today's Gospel. Today's gospel, which we hear well into the season of Lent, is extremely familiar. To describe someone as a 'prodigal' or behaving just like the prodigal son has become almost proverbial, a way of speaking which does not depend on being a Christian. The familiar can of course lose its power, its capacity to startle us into repentance. Because the parable is so well-known, in listening to it we probably knew what was coming next and could even race ahead while it was being read out. So let's take step back, and then perhaps the parable will speak to us in a fresh way.

When we read the Bible, with its histories and its stories, do we basically think we are spectators looking out of a window at something that this happening out there to others? Or do we think of reading the Bible as more like looking into a mirror, when we too are very much in the picture?

If we look at the Bible as we do when we look out of the window, then we are at some distance from what is going on, we need not get involved if we do not want to, we can remain at a safe distance. The people 'out there' do not include us, and what they say and do is not aimed at us. But if we look at the Bible as we look into a mirror, then we are in the middle of what is going on, we are part of the picture. In the mirror we see ourselves as well as others; we are caught up and involved in the story. In reading or hearing the parable of the prodigal son, as the story is usually even if not too accurately called, we should not remain spectators looking at the drama of someone else's family. If we are directly involved then we will not just ask questions about what is going on, but are ourselves called into question. In fact, we are made to question ourselves. We are meant to be 'at home' in God's house, without rivalry or estrangements. There are to be no alienating distances between the children and their Father or between the children. Looking into today's gospel as into a mirror, what should we look for? Clear-sighted honesty about how each of us stands, to begin with. We can distance ourselves in all kinds of ways. The prodigal son's distancing of himself is brought out geographically in that he travels to a distant land, but also in his life-style and how he has to 'return to himself' as well as to his father. At one level the older brother is near to his father, but more deeply he is not close to him and he cuts himself off from being related to his younger brother: 'this son of yours', as he describes his brother. Especially in Lent, we should look and see if there are features of the prodigal in us as well as features of the older brother.

The gospel, however, is Good News as well as a way of gaining self-knowledge. If it contained only judgment then this might well increase our sense of alienation from God, from ourselves and from others. In the mirror of today's parable, the generous and lavish welcome of the Father is the feature to concentrate on. Putting the focus on God will allow us to discover the truth about ourselves and at the same time not to think that is the whole picture, the end of the story. God makes change possible, more than we sometimes dare to hope for.

At this point, in a way the mirror scene turns out to be part of a film, a film in which each of us is one of the cast, and there is development and change. We have seen how the story unfolded so far, and in a dramatic manner the story finishes with the end of one estrangement and the risk of another. How will the older brother finally react? Will he accept and imitate the generosity of his father? Where does each one of us stand in all this?

THE JOURNEY

St. Paul puts it succinctly, "You are no longer slaves but sons and daughters, and if a son or daughter, then an heir through God". (Gal. 4:7)

'Living this parable becomes a challenge for our Lenten journey of return to a loving Father who breaks through our self-image as servants bent on pleasing a demanding master. This pardoning and prodigal God invites us to a family party freed from aimless wandering and resentful dutifulness.'
