### SHEPHERD'S VOICE

The words Jesus speaks in this reading were directed to some Jewish leaders who wanted to trip him up. They were hoping he would call himself the Messiah. Instead, Jesus refers to himself as "the Good Shepherd." He describes the secure and lasting relationship he has with his sheep, those who truly hear him and believe. Just as no one can separate Jesus and his Father, no one can take Jesus' disciples away from him.

Did you know that the brain capacity of the average dog is about the same as that of a three-year-old child? This means that dogs can understand quite a lot! It also means that there is still a lot that they cannot understand. They do not understand traffic lights, or what makes chicken bones or rat poison bad to eat. This is why it is up to us to keep our dogs out of danger. We often use our voices to do this: "Come! Heel! Sit! Down!" This is what a good shepherd does for sheep. Just as a dog recognizes its owner's voice, sheep recognize the shepherd's voice. We, as the flock of Jesus, hear and recognize Jesus' voice. When do we hear his voice? How do we recognize it? #### **GREET HIM**

If we pay attention we can learn a lot about animals and about their humans. Think of the endearing way domestic beasts recognize their owners. Dogs collapse into a frenzy of delight when you come home, even if you have been gone for fifteen minutes. The new heaven has arrived in their midst, and hysterics are the least they can do.

Somewhere there may be a cat like this, but most of them have a different reaction than the heartsick dogs. "Oh it's you again," they seem to say.

I know some exceptions. Though my cousin's cat does model indifference with most people, but when I walk into the house it makes a quiet bee-line to where I am sitting, making no secret of how it enjoys being petted by me. I have never been quite sure whether to be complimented. Nor can I explain it. There might be months between visits and still this cat makes its way to the petting machine, with both dignity and quiet craving.

Judging from his stories, Jesus paid a lot of attention to animals and to their humans. He watched sheep many times on his trips through the lands and he observed their ways. They were not cat-like or dog-like, but were heartfelt in a different way. The sheep followed as the shepherds made them safe, guarded them, led them to food and drink. Jesus even compared a milling crowd of people to "sheep without a shepherd."

But I have been told that, in the Jerusalem of Jesus' day, there was only one sheepfold. Various flocks would arrive, along with their respective shepherds, and all these flocks were funnelled into the one sheepfold. This made for a rather large gathering, and there wasn't any practice of branding or marking in order to tell one from the other. What's more, sheep, unlike dogs, do not make themselves joyous when their shepherd walks up. Smartness was not a noticeable trait in them.

Then how could each shepherd reclaim his own sheep? Two ways. *One*, the shepherd already knew them by heart. He might even have a special name for each character in the flock. And *two*, the sheep themselves recognized the voice of their master. When he called out, they simply got to their feet and came with him, through the sheep-gate.

Jesus refers to this reaction in Sunday's short Gospel. "My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they [know] me," he says. Haven't you ever craved the voice of someone who would make things right, would lift the burden from your shoulder? Someone who knows you by name and loves you? Jesus is that someone, he tells you. You "shall never perish," he says, and then he steadies you with his hands. The Father has given you to Jesus. Who could revoke that gift?

I have a hunch you do recognize Jesus' voice when you hear it. Your feelings move when you listen trustingly to a certain Gospel, for instance. Or when you receive the bread of everlasting life and the cup of salvation—not as a stranger might, but as a member of a well-fed and greatly cared for flock.

What about trying, Sunday, to notice whether your spirit inclines to Jesus? Maybe you will settle into his lap for comfort. Your soul seeks him always, you know. And finds him. ### **GOSPEL SUMMARY**

There are two notions that need to be taken on faith as they are presented in the Gospel passage where Jesus identifies himself as the Good Shepherd. The first mystery is that those who are given the gift of faith to hear the invitation Jesus presents, will follow him. The second mystery involves the unbreakable bond that exists between the Shepherd and the person who hears the invitation. Once a person responds to the invitation, he or she belongs to God forever.

Our culture has changed since the days of our parents and grandparents when just about anyone dropped in at any time. We now call ahead and make arrangements for our children to visit friends. In comparing our own day to 50 years ago, we begin to really appreciate the invitation of Jesus to follow him, just as we are, anytime of the day or night. Where would we be if we had to call ahead to see if Jesus was available?

Reach out to a family in your neighborhood this week by inviting them over for some 'informal' fun and food. Dig out board games and snacks as you welcome them spontaneously. Keep in mind that this is how Jesus reaches out to us and let your neighbors experience God's love through your hospitality.

### PASTURES OF ETERNAL LIFE

Fourth Sunday of Easter. Fr Charles Dominique OP preaches on the Good Shepherd who leads his sheep to pasture.

The sheep that belong to me listen to my voice; I know them and they follow me.

Not only does Jesus call his sheep and they follow because they know his voice, but more importantly, he gives them eternal life also. The Easter season is our celebration of our eternal life, won for us when Jesus came into this world and gave up his life for us on the cross at Calvary.

Jesus uses the analogy of shepherd and sheep, he the shepherd and we the sheep. Jesus often uses such imagery, and he generally speaks in such a way that those who heard him could relate to what he was saying. No doubt 'shepherd and sheep' was part of the experience of the people of Israel, branded as they were as 'sheep without a shepherd'. And Jesus was the one, the shepherd, who would lead them to safety. Jesus was the one who would lead the sheep to pasture, and that pasture is eternal life: that is what we celebrate at Easter.

For us then who are the sheep, Jesus is the one who has come to call and gather; we know his voice and we follow when he calls. Jesus does not reject or turn the sheep away: he invites all to come into his presence and receive the life he freely gives to us. The shepherd is there ready to spread his tent over us, offering himself so that we will never hunger or thirst again. In this place neither the sun nor scorching wind will plague us, because Jesus the shepherd will lead us to springs of living water, where there will be no more tears but only joy. That is the assurance we have from Jesus who is our shepherd and who is leading us to pasture in God's kingdom, where we will experience eternal life.

Easter is about life. It is about renewal and transformation. Easter is about our redemption and our hope for future life in God's kingdom. It is about our death due to sin, but it is also about our life due to Christ's resurrection. We are fortunate though that Jesus chose to offer up himself for our benefit. And when Jesus offered up himself, he did so not just for a certain group of people but for all. His call went out, and continues to go out, for all, and the salvation he offers reaches the ends of the earth. The life he offers is for people of every nation, race, tribe and language: all are invited.

Because this gift is free, we have a choice to accept it or reject it. The gift is there still, and God invites us to share in it. God will not force this gift on us, but will gladly give it to anyone who wants it. The gift of his Son Jesus is our gift, and his death has won for us that chance to enter into his kingdom and share in the life he offers. So we are all invited to share in the kingdom and, if we accept, we will share in God's kingdom and will never be lost.

As we continue in this Easter season, we celebrate our redemption. We celebrate the shepherd Jesus calling us each by name to follow him. We are fortunate that he would do this, but it is up to us, the sheep, to follow this voice of Jesus. If we follow his voice, then he will lead us into green pastures, that is, eternal life, and it is this life that we should seek and accept, because it has been given to us freely, yet it is a gift we can reject. May we accept the gift of eternal life to which Jesus the shepherd is leading us! http://english.op.org/torch

### DID YOU KNOW

The Latin word for shepherd is pastor. It is from this word that we derive many of the terms used in the Church for people with a special role: pastor or priest, pastoral care, pastoral associate, pastoral council. These roles always imply a duty of love and care towards those for whom one is responsible.

The Shepherd-King was an ancient image of God used by the Hebrew people. In this gospel text, John is addressing one of the issues which faced his community: the heretical voices of some who sought to lead people away from rather than towards God. The Summit - Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne
