

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday 2019



Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday falls this year on Sunday 7 July and is a significant celebration in our Church's calendar. Whilst providing us with an opportunity to acknowledge our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander brothers and sisters, the celebration also signifies that we are united as one in God's love and care.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Catholics number over 130,000 and are a growing demographic in our Church today. We must continue to reach out and provide opportunities where we may be enriched and nourished by their deep spirituality, culture and love for Jesus Christ, by opening the doors to our hearts and our homes.

In the Gospel of the day Jesus says "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." Just as Jesus did, we must meet people where they are and walk alongside our First Nation's peoples on their journey to reconciliation and justice.

As Catholics we can set an example for the rest of Australia to follow by coming together as equals and friends in our Schools, Parishes and Organisations in the name of Jesus Christ and in the spirit of mutual respect and unity as one people.

PUSHING OUT THE BOUNDARIES

'In today's Gospel there is a sense of movement, of pushing out the boundaries of those to whom the good news of Jesus has been preached, a strong sense of mission. Don't carry any luggage, and don't stop to gossip on the road. Concentrate on the essential, the preaching of the good news, so that as many people as possible have the chance to hear and accept it. 'You get much the same picture with St Paul. He often did not stay long in any one place. But it is clear that the preaching of the good news was one thing, and the building up and consolidating of the communities was another. He was concerned for both, but his overriding passion was for the preaching. 'The Church as a whole has this double task of mission and maintenance. But we can all ask ourselves whether our lives as Christians do reflect the emphasis that Jesus and Paul put on mission: the spreading of the Good News of the Kingdom in ways that make sense not just to ourselves but to those we live alongside, people whose culture and assumptions may well be very different from our own.'

GOSPEL SUMMARY

Jesus sent out seventy-two disciples to spread the Good News and continue the work Jesus had begun. They had not yet experienced the Good News of the resurrection, but following Jesus, they proclaimed that the Kingdom of God was at hand and healed the sick. Jesus had them pack light taking only peace with them. Whatever town they entered and whatever home, they were to greet the people with peace, even if the people did not want to hear what they had to say. When the seventy-two returned, they were most pleased by the fact that they had power over evil forces. Jesus told them not to think so much about that as the fact that they had already been assured of salvation.

Reflection for Families

There are many places in our lives where we, too, can be missionaries. Sometimes we find ourselves in situations where we work, in our neighborhoods, or with our children's friends where we can show God's love in a single gesture of caring or kindness. Simply accepting another person is a way of showing them that the Kingdom of God has begun.

AUSTRALIAN CATHOLICS

At the end of the financial year, work is very much in everyone's mind. This is the time when the hunt for old receipts is on and then, once found, there is the question of whether they can be used to offset tax. The tax income statement might make us consider why we work at what we do, and whether it's time to change jobs, retire or do something else entirely. Midwinter also seems a good time for such reflection on the nature of work. The readings this week ask us to undertake the work of Christ – to celebrate the grace of Christ's peace and become messengers of that peace to all around us. In the Gospel the Lord appoints missionaries, saying 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few'. The scripture readings challenge any easy assumption on the part of followers that they can be casual about living the values prevailing in the world around them. Christianity requires work and commitment.

It seems appropriate then that the International Day of Cooperatives is held this week. In his Parish Life blog, Andrew Hamilton says the cooperative ideal remains strong in the Catholic tradition. It gives priority to persons over profit, to cooperation over competition and to negotiation over conflict.

PEACE BE TO THIS HOUSE

Fourteenth Sunday of the Year. Fr David Sanders OP shows us how Jesus Christ's mission is one of universal peace.

In the Gospels Jesus is waging a war. It is a battle between the kingdom of God and the kingdom of Satan. The final prize of victory will be peace. At the beginning of his ministry he extends his rule by healing illness and exorcising evil spirits. But Jesus wants us to collaborate in his mission. First he calls the Twelve to share in his work and today he extends that call to seventy two disciples who symbolise the nations of the world. They are sent to prepare the towns Jesus intends to visit. Jesus has already sown the seeds of the Kingdom by his preaching and knows there is a rich harvest. But he needs workers to help him reap it before it spoils. There is an urgency about his battle. The disciple must begin the work *now*.

But he has a warning. These peace campaigners will face bitter hostility. They will be lambs amongst wolves. What protection will they be given? Can they buy arms? No. Jesus's strategy demands his disciples travel light – no money, no provisions, not even sandals. They will be defenceless because the peace they bring will depend on complete trust in God. In fact the disciples should have guessed Jesus would make this demand. Just before this call as they had entered Samaria on their way to Jerusalem, they had encountered hostility from its inhabitants. James and John, the Sons of Thunder, wanted to call down fire on them. But Jesus had rebuked them just as he would reject the offer of a sword at his arrest in Gethsemane.

He tells the disciples their first greeting on mission must be 'Peace be to this house'. So what is this peace which the disciples bring? It sounds so impractical and ineffective in a world which is ruled by the mighty empires of the world. How can it compete with the peace brought by Caesar, the pax Romana? This peace was achieved by pacification, the brutal use of ruthless military power. Caesar Augustus boasted that he had subjected the whole world to the imperium of the Roman people. Jesus knew, as Isaiah had before him, that his harvest of peace could only be reaped when they had hammered 'their swords into ploughshares and their spears into sickles'. Jesus brought peace by other means. And this is what Paul

boasts of in the second reading. The peace which Jesus brought came through the cross. For it was through the cross that he subverted the idolatrous claims of empire by submitting willingly to the full force of Rome's brutality. In his life of humble service and in his refusal to use violence, Jesus had offered an alternative vision of peace. God recognised the truth of it when he raised him from the dead at the Resurrection. This was the victory which brought peace, the peace which is at the heart of God's kingdom.

The Resurrection was the confirmation of Jesus' call to mission, not just because he had been raised from the dead but because his claim to be a universal saviour was vindicated. The risen Lord sent out his disciples to preach to all nations. He had already given them a mission strategy. In fact in the Acts of Apostles we see how the disciples put this strategy into practice. There is an urgency as Peter and Paul preach, heal, exorcise and claim that the kingdom of God is very near. They offer the peace of Christ, not by coercion but as a free gift. When it is refused we see how Paul and Barnabus obey Christ's command for at Antioch we are told 'they shook the dust from their feet in judgement against them.'

Mission is still an essential part of the Christian gospel. Jesus calls us to work in his harvest. There is just the same urgency. The details of the strategy may be updated but the need to offer Christ's peace in a world ruled by modern and idolatrous forms of *Pax Romana* is just as great. We believe that in the Resurrection Satan did indeed fall from heaven and as we await for Christ to fully establish his rule, he still tells us to travel light, trust alone in God and in his name say to those we greet "Peace be to this house".
