# SAINT AUGUSTINE

Saint Augustine once wrote:

To fall in love with God is the greatest romance; To seek him, the greatest adventure; To find him, the greatest human achievement. Jesus tells his disciples:

'I have come to set the earth on fire,' God's love encompasses those who seek Divine friendship. This is the most important relationship[ we will ever know; it changes Everything and makes us a new creation.

## WHY DO WE MAKE THE SIGN OF THE CROSS?

Do you rush through the sign of the cross as if you're swatting a fly? Don't! This gesture contains powerful symbolism connected with the trinity and with your baptism. Indeed, it can be viewed as a prayer in itself. By making this sign you are declaring: I am completely under the power of the risen Christ, our Redeemer. You are identifying yourself with generations of Christians, for the common usage of this familiar formula ('In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen') can be traced back to the second century.

LISTENING is often the only thing needed to help someone.

Ponder a moment on the image of 'fire'. Jesus uses it in a negative way; it's not about cooking or warmth. It's about danger, panic, destruction; lighting a fire under somebody, apparently under a family. Jesus often uses shocking overstatements to convey a truth. Could this be such an example? Does a choice to follow Jesus always involve danger, panic, destruction? Or is it more the case that sometimes there is some element of these? Maybe you feel

different about this. Jesus is totally involved in his mission to save us. Fire is the image he uses to speak of this great desire in his heart. Not everyone would receive his message and hence it would bring division at a deep level in many relationships. How important to me is the good news that Jesus has brought? It helps me to realise how much I must mean to him when I consider what it cost him. Gentle Jesus, meek and mild? Conformity and harmony are never to be imposed or sought for themselves. They are not a mould into which life is to be forced. When life is properly arranged, they will be the result.

Here Jesus is anxious to see the fire of God's love blaze across the globe. John the Baptist had promised that Jesus would baptise his disciples with the Holy Spirit and fire. The fire of God's love was in fact visibly cast upon the earth at Pentecost, and we thank God for it.

Lord that we might experience the fire of your love in our hearts today. Saint Ignatius was 'ablaze with God' and we wish that for ourselves too. Only so will we be your true disciples. https://www.sacredspace.ie/scripture/luke-1249-53-0

# NEW AGE

There is an echo here of John the Baptist's reference to the difference between his own baptism and that of Jesus: 'I baptize you with water; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire' (Luke 3:16). Fire has a purifying quality: it separates what is of value from what is worthless. The baptism of Jesus requires us to die to sin and selfishness in order to live more fully for God and others.

Jesus does not set out to cause conflict, but so radical is his message that it inevitably does cause division in certain situations and relationships. The Gospel is a call to conversion, to becoming 'a new creation' (2 Corinthians 5:17). It means shedding the skin of a former way of living. Does my Christian faith make a real difference to the kind of person I am and to the kind of life I lead? Living out your life as a companion of Jesus is anything but dull! Christians are meant to be 'on fire' with God's love, and be moved by the Holy Spirit. I ask God to show me where my life has become bland and to free me to become fully alive.

Jesus does not try to cause divisions, but he does insist that we must put God first. In him the new age of God has dawned, and I ask to be part of it. I want to live a fruitful life that will be a blessing to everyone, especially the oppressed and excluded. https://www.sacredspace.ie/scripture/luke-1249-53-0

## I CAME TO BRING FIRE TO THE WORLD

Jesus demonstrates God's love in so many ways during his earthly ministry. He will also accomplish an incredible blessing of love when he comes to take God's children home to be with him forever. However, the cost of those blessings is high - high for him, high for the Father, and high for those who follow him. Jesus left heaven, came to earth, and died a horrible death to provide these blessings. The Father withheld his power and allowed those he created to do such horrid things to his Son. So we must not be surprised at the powerful language Jesus uses here. His ministry calls for a decision, a radical decision, to be made. Either he is God with us, or he is an impostor. Either he is Christ, God's Messiah and our Savior, or he is delusional. Either he is Lord, King of our hearts and of all creation, or he is a liar. Making a decision about him is divisive. It will divide families and households. It will be politically incorrect because it doesn't allow for alternatives. As Jesus speaks to his disciples, he also speaks to us. If we decide for him, our decision will not make everyone happy and won't lead to everyone's liking us. A passionate disciple of Jesus will not be appreciated by all - maybe not by most - but will surely be appreciated and rewarded by God! www.heartlight.org/wjd/luke/

# SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS

*Non-violence* - The Christian message is non-violent. It brings love, compassion, harmony, peace. It brings people together so that there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave or free, male or female... But it also of its nature challenges injustice, corruption, discrimination, abuse, dishonesty and all attacks on human dignity. The role of the evangeliser is "to comfort the afflicted and to afflict the comfortable." Vested interests - the rich, the powerful inside and outside the Church - will do anything to keep what they have. When the Church preaches and lives the Gospel, conflict is inevitable - even though in no way wished or intended.

*True religion does not divide* - So, in one way, religion should never divide (as in Northern Ireland). It is only a false Christianity and religion that deliberately creates division ("them and us"). It is not Christianity or any other religion as such which has brought so much suffering but certain people who call themselves "Christians" (or Muslims, Hindus or Jews). At the same time, true Christianity in defending truth, justice, human dignity and freedom will inevitably meet opposition and be attacked. The passage which says that the peacemakers are blessed also says that those who are persecuted in the name of the Gospel are equally blessed. Strangely enough, both go together.

# THE PEACE THAT ONLY COMES THROUGH FIRE

Twentieth Sunday of the Year. Fr David Sanders OP

dares us to risk being consumed by fire. I know a church where they stopped using incense after they had fitted smoke alarms. Fire is dangerous but sometime you have to take a risk. Imagine what would have happened to our faith if Moses had used a fire extinguisher rather than venturing into the presence of God at the burning bush. But you may feel uneasy when you hear Jesus wanting to bring fire to the earth. There are too many terrorists around at present who are willing, for a greater cause, to burn up themselves or bring down fire on their enemies and the innocent. Is it destructive fire like this which Jesus wants to use? Elijah had certainly called down fire on his enemies, but when

the disciples earlier in the Gospel asked Jesus whether he wanted them to imitate the prophet and destroy the Samaritans with fire, he rebuked them. But Jesus could still be using the fire of judgement which would not destroy but reveal God's truth, disturb the peace and bring down hatred upon his head. And in this he would be more like the prophet Jeremiah.

Jeremiah knew that Judah was riddled with injustice but that no one wanted to admit this. The false prophets advocated peace at any cost and papered over the corruption. Jeremiah also knew what the cost would be if he opened his mouth and spoke the truth. But he could do no other. He tells us in chapter twenty that there is something like a burning fire shut up in my bones. I am weary with holding it in and I cannot.

He must speak God's word which prophesies that it will only be through the crucible of exile that healing will come to the nation. Judgement is the only way to true and lasting peace. But how do his listeners react? They douse these prophetic flames by throwing him into the mud at the bottom of a well. But this is what happens to prophets who risk playing with fire.

Jesus, like Jeremiah, knows that lasting peace will only come when his words are heard and people change their behaviour. When he goes to the Temple he condemns this central institution of the nation as corrupt. And inevitably his words cause divisions.

But instead of throwing an incendiary device at his enemies, Jesus prefers to take on himself the effects of the peoples' sin. John the Baptist had earlier prophesied that Jesus would bring a baptism in the fire of the Holy Spirit. At Pentecost the disciples will indeed receive the Spirit in for form of tongues of fire. But before this can take place Jesus must face his own baptism of fire through the sufferings he will endure in his passion and death.

But today in the Gospel he expresses a passionate impatience; he yearns for this baptism just as he yearns to share the passover meal with his disciples. It will only be through his act of sacrificial love on the Cross that his disciples will be able to receive that baptism of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Having plumbed the depth of human injustice and passed through death, the risen Jesus can give them the gift of an enduring peace through the power of the Holy Spirit. But that peace will bring with it, as Jesus predicts and as the Acts of the Apostles reveal, divisions in families and households.

That gift of peace is still on offer. But just as many turned away from Christ's words in his own day people still prefer a quiet domestic peace which allow the deeper injustices and problems in their lives to be ignored. The Church too often puts out the fire which Christ wishes to bring to the earth through timidity and fear. It can often give the impression it wants peace and quiet and does not want people to be disturbed in their faith, although Jesus did not have the same anxieties.

But just in case you are ready to cast fire you should at least take the fire test. Before you cast the fire in righteous anger against others make sure you are willing yourself to take some of the same heat which Jesus felt in his baptism of fire.

In Australia fire is often rightly feared. In summers, with rising temperatures and little rain, fire can sweep through hectares, destroying pastures, forests, properties and even taking lives. Amid the ashes, however, life can and does grow again. Today's Gospel speaks of fire in destructive terms but also in the understanding that once it's passed over there will be a renewal. It seems best to understand the 'fire' that Jesus says he has come to bring to the earth as being a gift of the Holy Spirit. 'This communication of the Spirit cannot take place until [Jesus] has personally confronted and overcome, through death and resurrection, the hostility to divine love lurking in the human heart'.

We pray the fire of commitment to those in need continues to burn brightly.
