INTRODUCTION

# **GOSPEL REFLECTION**

When someone asks Jesus how many will be saved, he answers by using the image of the narrow door. Those who do not remain faithful to him will be left outside. Jesus is warning people of faith not to take their salvation for granted. Just because we worship every weekend, we cannot assume that we can squeeze through the narrow door. We may be surprised to discover that some who seem less worthy will enter the kingdom before us. Discussion - Jesus reminds us that we are not to judge others as "worthy" of the kingdom or not. Our human judgment is faulty. We only see so much. God sees the entire person, heart and soul, past, present, and future. Some who seem to be "last" ("losers" in our current slang) may well be "first" with God. And some we look up to as "first" (the winners in our world) may turn out to be "last" in the kingdom. We just don't know. And where others are with God is really not our concern. The question is: where do YOU want to be with God? How can YOU stay close to Jesus?

Praise the Lord All You Nations - In the first reading and in the responsorial psalm, all the nations of the world are encouraged to praise the Lord.

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# **BEYOND EXCLUSIVENESS**

"Will there only be a few saved?" Jesus had no intention of entering into this discussion; his whole purpose was to lead people beyond the exclusiveness they took for granted. Israel's calling was, in fact, for the sake of the other peoples of the world. They were to be a "light to the nations", leading them to come to know the life-giving ways of the one true God. 'The "narrow door" of his parable does not imply that salvation is available to only a few; it refers to the conversion called for if his hearers are to accept his teaching, and thus become the people God wants them to be.

'Similarly, the point of the parable of the "locked door" is not exclusion, but the need to hurry in - the opportunity brought by Jesus is coming to an end. Only conversion from the constricted ways the nation has come to take for granted will give entrance to "the master's house". Jesus was calling Israel back to a sharing in the generous ways of God that was their true faith tradition. But, as he makes his way to Jerusalem, time is running out." # SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS

There's no extra credit for merely being a member of a certain religion, sect, political party, gender or cultural group. When the time comes to be gathered into God's kingdom feast, those who take their faith for granted may find themselves shut out.' 'Those who might consider themselves "insiders" and so be complacent about their inclusion had better take note. Too late, they may wake up to find themselves excluded, while, to their anguish and chagrin, they see many included whom they would have considered outsiders.'

# FROM EAST AND WEST

One of the features of God's creation is the great variety there is the world. Not only a variety of terrains, plants and animals, but also of human cultures. Despite the basic humanity shared by all people, there are great differences in social structure, dress, customs and food. This all helps to make the world an endlessly fascinating place.

However, there can be a downside to this diversity. People can be afraid of difference, and this can lead to ethnic and national conflicts, as the whole history of the world attests.

Other solutions have been tried, and these attempts have tried to make everyone conform to one particular way of being. The totalitarian regimes of Nazi Germany, Soviet Russia, and Communist China tried this solution with disastrous consequences. Others can try and overcome such differences by dreaming of utopian one-world governments, where all differences will be eradicated. The historian Michael Burleigh, in his book Earthly Powers describes one such utopian dreamer from the 16<sup>th</sup>/17<sup>th</sup> century, the Dominican friar Tommasso Campanella. Campanella wrote of the "City of the Sun". This fantasy world would consist of a communist style regime ruled by the 'Metaphysician'; people's diet would be regulated as would their sex lives, according to 'complex astrological calculations and the rules of stock-breeding.' (p.21). Pictures of Moses, Alexander, Christ, Caesar and Mohamed would encourage people to live moral lives. Religion would be a mixture of paganism, astrology and Christianity. While many of these ideas may seem laughable and bizarre, many were taken seriously at the time, and have influenced political thought since Campanella's time. Even today, there are theories, both approving and disapproving, of a 'new world order.'

The picture presented to us in the scripture readings for today creates quite a different scenario. One of the great themes of the Old Testament is that although the People of Israel are the chosen people, they have this role on trust. They are to act as a beacon to the rest of the nations, to bear witness to the creating love of the one God, and to act as prophets for the day when all people will be united by God himself.

# TO LIVE IS TO MOVE

Twenty-First Sunday of the Year. Fr Colin Carr OP tells us that God welcomes the badly brought-up.

Why does the Church get us to listen to the Bible at Mass week by week? Why do we have to hear about Put and Lud and Moshech, which were marginal places even in Old Testament times, and certainly don't make the headlines - or even footnotes - in our times?

Is the Bible simply an old book which is interesting and instructive to those who are interested in ancient history? The church would not be commending it to us if it were just that: it's our belief that God speaks to us now through the Bible, in which we hear his Word. So if what the prophets said thousands of years ago challenged the people of their time, it continues to challenge us today; if Jesus divided people in his day by what he said, offending some and cheering others, we need to check out whether what he says offends us or cheers us now.

But first, let's look at the beginning of the gospel for today: 'Through towns and villages Jesus went teaching, making his way to Jerusalem.' Luke's Gospel and Luke's other book, the Acts of the Apostles, are full of the idea of journeying. Jesus doesn't just sit in one place and wait for people to come and listen to his teaching: he himself is moving forward in obedience to his destiny; those who want to hear him must travel with him, and for us that means being willing to move, to be changed, to learn new things.

We can never say of the Gospel, 'I've got it.' If you say that, you haven't got it. We dare not be stuck in complacency; nor need we be stuck in self-despising; neither of those attitudes helps us to hear the Gospel.

The whole Bible is about movement - away from Egypt, to the Promised Land, away into exile, back to the promised land; and not only do God's chosen people get moved: the people of all these foreign places like Put and Lud and Moshech are invited to move, to come to Jerusalem, the place of God's glory. (They are even promised a chance to minister in God's sanctuary, which is a pretty shocking idea to the purists). To live is to move - away from our smaller world into God's bigger world. The fact that we are known as God's people doesn't mean that God isn't interested in other people. God may possess us; we don't possess God. So Jesus challenged his hearers not to imagine that just because they had had contact with God through the scriptures read in the synagogue, or had been visited by Jesus as he went round preaching, they were assured of a place in the kingdom: the question was, had they responded to God, and desired a place in the kingdom, like hungry and needy people? Had they desired him, like the people from east and west and north and south, the outsiders who would be welcomed into the feast with Abraham and Isaac and Jacob simply because they wanted to be there? We can gain admission to the heavenly banquet on one condition: if we are hungry to be there. Those who think they have a right to be there will get a shock; they have not tried their best to enter by the narrow door, which paradoxically welcomes countless unexpected guests through it; it is the door of humility, of need, of poverty in spirit. Those who have had a good, godly upbringing may think that that is all they require; somehow they're already in the club, and they needn't bother to apply. But the fact is that we can only come into God's presence if we come as needy people who know we have nothing to offer but everything to receive. Jesus scandalised the well brought-up by showing that God welcomes the badly brought-up too; each has the same way into the heavenly feast: hunger. http://english.op.org/torch
