PROCLAIMING FAITH

Reading 1 Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7

In this reading the author tells us about a special servant of the Lord. He brings justice to God's people in ways that are peaceful and life-giving. He frees those who are imprisoned or wandering in the darkness. With a firm grasp, he takes God's people by the hand and guides them in keeping their covenant with God.

For Christians, this description of the servant of the Lord is an inspiring portrait of Jesus. He is the One who brings us peace, life, and freedom.

Reading 2 Acts 10:34-38

Because God is just, God does not play favourites. All persons and nations are acceptable to the Lord. As Peter shares this welcome news with the household of the Roman soldier Cornelius, he can hardly wait to tell the entire Jesus story. He stresses how the Holy Spirit anointed Jesus at his baptism. After that, Jesus went forth to fulfil his ministry as the servant of the

We are often wary of people who did not grow up as we did, who are somehow different from us in some way. Perhaps Peter was surprised that this former pagan, this Gentile, this Roman had also been accepted by God. It may not have been the way Peter had expected God to work, because God first chose the Jews to carry his message to the world.

Gospel Matthew 3:13-17

Why did Jesus insist that John baptize him in the Jordan River? Jesus had no sin to be washed away, no need to repent. But Jesus had a great need to cooperate with God's plan of salvation. And that plan required that he identify totally with the people he had come to save.

Note that Jesus does not contradict John when he says, "I should be baptized by you!"

In a very real way, John was right. However, Jesus only says, "Give in for now." Jesus had a bigger plan in mind, and he was asking John to cooperate by laying aside his own way of thinking "for now."

By our Baptism, we were given a share in Christ's life and ministry.

He shares his identity with us. How will you live as another Christ, so that God will say of you, "This is my beloved, on whom my favour rests"?



PARISH RENEWAL

Over the past year, a group of parishioners, inspired by Plenary Council conversations, have been praying and reflecting on Parish Renewal in Blackfriars Parish. As part of this process Fr. James Mallon's book "Divine Renovation" was the focus of two parish reading groups over the last couple of months. BAPTISED FOR MISSION

Baptism of the Lord.

Fr Isidore Clarke OP recalls that we, like Christ, are baptised into the mission of spreading God's light to the nations.

Already John the Baptism had begun to prepare the way for Christ's coming. He preached a baptism of repentance, which generated a great atmosphere of excitement and expectation. What John hadn't expected was that Jesus himself should ask to be baptised. After all, baptism was meant to prepare other people, who were sinners, for Christ's coming; and he was no sinner. But Jesus insisted on being baptised. He wanted to identify with the whole of sinful humanity, to carry and remove the burden of our guilt.

Then, immediately after his baptism, something remarkable happened. The Spirit of God rested upon Jesus, in the form of a dove — the symbol of the peace God brought to the chaotic, destructive waters of the flood. Jesus came to bring peace to our chaotic, troubled lives. He wanted to enable us to make a fresh start. And the Father's voice from heaven proclaimed: This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased.

These words echo those of the first reading, in which Isaiah tells us that God has appointed his servant to be a 'light of the nations.' His mission would be to 'open the eyes of the blind, to free captives from prison, and those who live in darkness from the dungeon.' Jesus would fulfil the role of the Suffering Servant of the Lord, who would be exalted in sacrificing his life for the salvation of the nations.

At Christ's baptism the Father commissioned Jesus to act and speak in his name and with his divine authority. In the power of the Spirit he would proclaim the Good News of salvation. Christ's baptism prepared him for this mission.

Today's feast celebrates not just Christ's baptism, but ours. Through our baptism we have been born from above -- from God - and have become the children of God. Just as Jesus shared our human life through his birth at Bethlehem, so we share his divine life through our birth at baptism. We become God's beloved sons or daughters, with whom he is well pleased. Christ's baptism and ours prepare us for mission. We are not simply called to a private, cosy relationship between each of us and God; rather our baptism commissions us to share the faith we have received. Like Jesus, we are meant to be luminous lights revealing the glory of God and the power of his salvation. Like Jesus we are called to dispel the darkness of ignorance and error. If we live up to our vocation God will, indeed, be able to say, 'This is my beloved son or daughter, with whom I am well pleased.' http://english.op.org/torch

A NEW BEGINNING

Baptism of the Lord.

Fr Richard Ounsworth OP explores the relationship between Christ's identity and his mission.

Today's feast marks both an ending and a beginning. It is the final celebration of the Christmas period, a fact that is emphasised by the Divine Office for today being the same as that for the Epiphany; and yet it is also the first Sunday of 'Ordinary Time'.

It is appropriate that this transition from Christmas to Ordinary Time be marked by the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. That event, which we hear about in today's Gospel, was the beginning of Christ's active ministry in the world, and it culminates in the testimony of the Father to the identity of the Son. It is this identity that we celebrate during Christmas: the miraculous truth that Jesus Christ is the true Son of God, the image of the invisible God, Word-made-flesh and Splendour of the Father. He is the beloved Son with whom the Father is well pleased. In other words, the person of Jesus Christ is constituted by the perfect love of the Father for the Son.

And because we have God's own testimony to the divine identity of Jesus, our Christmas faith is based on that testimony, on the authentic self-revelation of God, and not on human opinion. But because Jesus's whole being is founded upon the love of God, his divine identity that we celebrate at Christmas necessarily leads to his ministry. For Jesus was not born simply in order to exist, to give us the doctrine of the incarnation: he was born to serve. As he himself says, the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. It is vital for us to affirm that Jesus Christ is God-with-us, and so we have done over the last two weeks. But we must also affirm that he is God-for-us. How could he not be? Jesus serving life and saving death is, we may say, the playing out of his divine identity on the stage of human history. The ministry of Christ, in which he gives his life for us, is what a human life looks like when that life is lived by one whose existence is perfect love, just as his death shows us how perfect love reaches its end, and in dying proves itself stronger than death. Just as Christ's death was a self-surrender carried out in perfect solidarity with the despised and rejected of this world, so his life among us begins with an act of perfect solidarity with the despised and rejected, when Christ allows himself to be baptised in the Jordan. For this baptism is a symbolic passing through the waters that guard the entrance to the Promised Land. In his solidarity with the outcasts of this world, Christ who by right of his divinity has a heavenly home makes himself an exile like us, so as to lead us back from exile, out of the wilderness, to our new home with the Father.

And our journey home too begins with baptism, when we are adopted as sons and daughters of God. This means that what the Father says to Christ in today's Gospel he also says to us: you are my beloved child. Today we hear from God the words that must transform our lives, because these words of love become the centre of our being now that we are a new creation in Christ. Just like Jesus, our identity now is God's love for us; and this love is no longer that of a superior for an inferior as we might love our pets. Rather, it is the perfect, heart-breaking love of a parent for a child.

Therefore, as Christ's identity drives him into his mission of loving ministry in solidarity with us, so our new identity in solidarity with him must drive us into mission. Today the call is renewed for us to live lives of perfect service as Christ did, and we are strengthened for that service by the knowledge that, whatever joy and delight we have ever experienced in loving anyone, God's delight in us is infinitely greater. http://english.op.org/torch
