LENT

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on 26th February. Each year the forty days of Lent are given to us for prayerful reflection on the figure of Christ crucified and the journey He took through darkness to light. The theme of our reflection program this year is "Hope". In recent times we have seen natural disasters such as earthquakes. tsunamis, terrorism, war, displaced persons seeking new homelands, floods, fires, and starvation shadowing the earth. Yet in these shadows we have seen people of faith, courage, prayer and action, perseverance and hope; and through these people we have caught a glimpse of the self - sacrificing love of Jesus himself. As in former years, we are invited to journey together in faith and if possible to set some time aside to reflect on God's Word as nourishment on our pilgrimage.


BUSHFIRE APPEAL

MERCY AND REINSTATEMENT

FORMATION: FAITH AND LIFE

Pouring out the balm of God's mercy within the ecclesial community

The phone rang. A young woman was on the other side of the call. "My name is Katie, and my aunt is a member of your parish. I am getting married in a month in a Catholic church in another state, but we are living here with my aunt and her family until we start grad school in the fall. The priest at the church in Alabama says we need someone to do the paperwork so we can get married in the Catholic Church. Can you help us out?" The part of my brain that knows all the rules wanted to say, "I don't think so." But the other part of my brain encouraged me to inquire about this young couple's circumstances: "Have you done any marriage preparation?" "No, we tried but we could not find a Catholic Church within reasonable driving distance." "Where were you?" "We were in different cities. We each were doing a service year overseas, and we did not have many options." "Ok — well, who is the priest who is witnessing the wedding?" "He is the pastor of the parish, but we don't really know him."

I hear the sincerity in the young woman's voice — and the panic. I think of her aunt, our parishioner, and her goodness and generosity to so many people. I remember that I frequently mention how grateful I am when young adults come to the Catholic Church to celebrate the sacrament of marriage. Here was one such couple. So, I begin to think about how we can make this work. With compassion and flexibility, we made it work. The phone rang. A woman of great faith and involvement in the parish community is on the other side of the call. "I cannot believe I am making this call. My nephew and his wife were scheduled for a C-section in a week. When they went for the pre-op meeting today, the baby did not have a heartbeat. They have lost the baby. We are all in such disbelief. I don't know what they will want. They were raised Catholic, but they did not get married in the church. But could you help if they want to do a service?" And I reply: "We would be happy to assist with whatever they would like to do. I know that they are reeling with this news. I am so sorry."

Twenty-four hours later, the woman called again. "My nephew and his wife do want to come to the church and bring Sarah Marie's cremains for a Mass. My nephew says this is what our family does in times like these. Can we do that?" And I reply: "This is why we are here, and I am grateful they want to come to the church. Of course, we will do this."

Two days later, 200 family and friends gathered in the church for Mass for Sarah Marie. The parents of the infant daughter chose 1 Corinthians 13:1-13, a passage read at their wedding, and two excerpts from the Gospels of Matthew (18:1-5) and Mark (10:13-16). Sarah's mom liked Psalm 139, so we sang "You Are Near" as the psalm response, and Sarah's dad knew he wanted to sing "Be Not Afraid," "On Eagle's Wings," "Though the Mountains May Fall," and "Here I Am, Lord." When we sang that last hymn, it was impossible to stop the tears for many who came to pray that day. This couple may not have been married in the Catholic Church, but they prepared this service like two young Catholic adults, clinging to the familiar balm of faith's rituals and traditions. It seemed they had come home to bury their infant daughter.

When I consider these privileged moments of pastoral care, I am reminded of what Pope Francis has written in his apostolic exhortation *Amoris Laetitia* ("The Joy of Love"):

There are two ways of thinking which recur throughout the Church's history: casting off and reinstating. The Church's way, from the time of the Council of Jerusalem, has always been the way of Jesus, the way of mercy and reinstatement ... The way of the Church is ... to pour out the balm of God's mercy on all those who ask for it with a sincere heart ... For true charity is always unmerited, unconditional and gratuitous ... It is a matter of reaching out to everyone, of needing to help each person find his or her proper way of participating in the ecclesial community and thus to experience being touched by an "unmerited, unconditional and gratuitous" mercy.

. Nearly every day, parish ministers have the opportunity to put these words to work. Mercy and reinstatement take time, more time than casting off. But they also ensure the ability to sleep at night and to look at one's pastoral self in the mirror each morning, knowing we have done our best to do as Jesus would do.

TRUE AND LOYAL SERVICE OF GOD

Christ's opening statement, that the attitude of his followers towards the commandments (and other precepts of the law) must be different, and superior to that of the scribes and Pharisees, clearly indicates how Christianity must differ from, and supersede, Judaism. Christ is not abolishing the ten commandments, but he is demanding of his followers a more perfect, a more sincere, fulfilment of them. The whole moral value of any legal observance (the Mosaic law included), comes from the interior disposition of him who observes or keeps the law. No man serves or honours God by any exterior acts, be they ever so arduous or continuous, unless these acts proceed from an intention and a will to honour and please God. This is the charter, the constitution, of the new law, Christianity. The old law is not abolished, but deepened and given a new life.

Avoiding murder therefore is not enough; the true Christian must remove any inclination to murder by building up true, brotherly love for all men in his heart.

We must not only not injure our neighbour or fellowman in his person, or in his character, but we must be ever ready to help him and prevent injury to him, whenever and wherever we can. We must not only not commit adultery, but must also develop a Christian respect and esteem for purity, the virtue which will preserve us not only from adultery but even from thoughts of adultery, or any other abuse of our sexual gifts given us by God for his sublime purpose.

We must be truthful always, and men of our word. This virtue is not only necessary for man's salvation, but is the basis of rational intercourse between men in civilized society. While our civil courts still deem it necessary to impose oaths on contestants and witnesses (since they have, unfortunately, to take account of the liars and deceivers who still are a menace to society), the truthful man need not be afraid of insulting or dishonouring God by calling him as his guarantor, if asked to do so.

True and loyal service of God therefore begins in the heart and has its value from this interior disposition. Keeping the ten commandments is our way of proving to God that we are grateful, obedient and loyal to him who gave us all we have and who has promised us future gifts infinitely greater still. And just as our love for God is proved by our true love for our neighbour, so the last seven of the commandments impose on us obligations regarding our neighbour. It is only by fulfilling these seven that we can fulfil the first three which govern our relations with God. This truth is expressed by our Lord in the words: It you are offering your gift at the altar, and remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there . . . first be reconciled to your brother and then come and offer your gift.

The effects of climate change are already having a devastating effect on many people. The World Bank estimated in 2018 that, by 2050, there could easily be 140 million people displaced by climate change. That is twice the current number of people displaced for all reasons. Many experts now believe that this is an underestimate.

How will we deal with this? Will we treat these people in the same way as we are currently treating those seeking asylum? This public meeting will explore these questions and argue for alternatives to the current refugee policies.
