OR CODE

It is now **MANDATORY** for parishioners & visitors to use the **Check In CBR App.** to attend Mass.

If you do not have the CBR App, you will need to either log in with a family member or friend or complete your details on the parish Tablet at the Sign-In desk. All names are still needed to be recorded for numbers as the capacity is capped at 200.

TRY BOOKING

Booking for Mass and Recording your attendance at Mass.

During the extended COVID time, we have all had to make lots of adjustments, including how we manage attendance at the Church.

We are still legally obliged to restrict the numbers of people who may be together in the Church at any time to 200, and also to keep track of who they are. People attending are also required to check in on arrival, using the Check-In CBR app if they have a smart phone, otherwise they need to record their names and contact information on a sign in sheet. We then need to transcribe this information into the Check-In CBR system, so it really helps us if you can use the Check In CBR app. This does sound restrictive but we have all benefited from the way COVID has been managed in Australia. (We are also liable to very heavy penalties if we don't follow the requirements),

As far as planning and managing the actual numbers is concerned, recently we started using an online booking system called Try-Booking so that people can book ahead online for the weekend Mass they plan to attend. From this information we are able to print a list of those who plan to come and use this as the start of the Mass sign in sheet you have all become familiar with. This saves us a great deal of time, speeds up the arrival process, and also helps us manage the numbers better. We are not charged by TryBooking for using the system for free events.

If you use a computer, smart phone etc, do please consider booking ahead for the Mass you plan to attend. There is a new Try-Booking code each week that links to the booking form for that week. We will advise you in the bulletin of this code. On arrival you will simply need to tick your name from the list we have printed off from TryBooking, PLUS check in using the Check-in CBR app. Of course this isn't compulsory, and mostly our numbers don't exceed the maximum of 200, but it does help if you can use this system.

Please remember that the Welcome Ministers are volunteers who have come to Mass but give their time to sign people in.

Thanks for helping us in this way.

GOOD SHEPHERD

This coming Sunday is Good Shepherd Sunday when we hear the words of John 10:11-18 'I am the good shepherd: . . . who lays down his life for his sheep'. Unlike the hired man who is not that invested in the care of his animals that he is willing to die for them, Jesus is willing to sacrifice his life. He does this, not only because of duty (a command from the Father), but because of his unconditional love for us. It is an extraordinary gift Jesus has given us. This week, let us pray for all those who are our good shepherds.

As Australians prepare to commemorate Anzac Day on Sunday, we remember all those who have taken up arms in defence of their country, especially the few remaining servicemen and women from WWII. **This week we pray for all envoys of peace of agents of reconciliation**, and we acclaim our belief in the ultimate power of love.

GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY



How often in our lives have we failed to listen to the advice of others, especially people in authority like parents or teachers, or mentors of some kind, maybe we refuse to listen to our spouse or our children, we just think we know what's best - what do they know? This failure normally arises because of pride.

Pride is the queen of all sins, she reigns unhappily over the other deadly sins. It is her false glamour that is the backbone of our lust, our greed, our envy, our unjust anger. Pride, St Thomas Aquinas says is contrary to reason since by it a person aims higher than his state will allow. Aquinas points out further that right reason requires that every person will should tend to that which is proportionate to them. Therefore it is evident that pride denotes something opposed to right reason, and this shows it to have the character of sin. Our pride causes us to become our own god! This is how we feel, we have the authority to sin, to break God's law, to fail to love him as we ought. By our pride we put ourselves on a pedestal and accept our own worship. We can no longer love God, because our love has turned in on ourselves.

Jesus in our gospel today speaks to a proud generation. A generation that thought they knew better. Even though he had told them already who he was they, because of the proudness of their hearts, they failed to see clearly who he was, and if they did know they did not have the humility to accept it. They were happy with the status quo, Jesus rocked the boat too much!!!!

So the lesson that comes out of this gospel hinges on humility. It is only by having the humility of a sheep thay we can rightfully call Christ our shepherd. "The sheep that belong to me **listen** to my voice" only by humility can we be more open to his voice calling us to aim higher in our spiritual lives.

GOOD SHEPHERD SUNDAY

Cont... This voice is echoed through our Mother, the Church. The Church's pastors, particularly, are endowed with the charism of calling the sheep, calling them to Christ. Jesus says to his disciples "he who hears you hears me" (Lk 10:16). Yet this charism of teaching and calling is fraught with danger as the pastors themselves are more concertedly called to the humility of the sheep so that they may more faithfully hear the words of Jesus too. Hence the shepherds of the Church, that is bishops and priests, who are entrusted with the duty of leading are also supposed to listen to the voice of the supreme shepherd, Christ the Lord. If they do not they will be seen by Jesus, and the flock they lead as "strangers", and thus Jesus says of the shepherd who is alien to his sheep that "they do not recognise the voice of strangers". Humility and a patient listening then are key to the healthy functioning of the sheepfold!

Our listening to the voice of Christ the Good Shepherd also takes on a moral tone too. Often people think that they can pull a "swifty" with God and do some nice things for people, a bit of charity work here, or a kind act for someone there, and then God will overlook their corrupt ways. These deceitful sheep hide their deviousness, their lustful advances, their shonky deals, their dishonesty in a tax return or in a business deal, they are nothing but thieves and brigands who enter the sheepfold in another way. One or two small kind acts just won't cut it, our Christian lives must always aim at being consistent not foolhardy or slap dash, and we do not fool God by our deceit.

Our Lord says this to those who deceive themselves

"Not every one who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. 22 On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name?' 23 And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you evildoers.' (Mt 7:21)

It is only by listening to Christ's voice in daily, humble prayer that our pride becomes humility when we look not to do our own will but the will of God, this is the subject of one of our most treasured prayers, the 'Our Father'.

It is God alone, by grace, who elevates us to participation in his life, let us then be mindful to ask for this in humility **and listen to his voice** seeking that His will first of all may be done in our hearts, and thus it may be done on earth, as it is in heaven.

God love you all. You're all in my prayers.

THOUGHTS ON THE GOSPEL

'I know my own, and my own know me' (John 10:14): these own (whose reciprocal knowledge of him and intimacy he equates with that of his Father and himself) are his disciples. The culmination of his life opens in 13:1: "Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end." 'And as a token, of the love for them their Shepherd washes their feet; he relates his last discourse; and the lifting up to crucifixion becomes his accepted destiny. 'The Shepherd has the yet higher dignity of being the Lamb of God - indeed, his being the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world, confirms him as Shepherd of us all. We members of his flock are all called on to wash one another's feet, that is, to serve the 'neighbours' God provides. 'So we his sheep, the people of God, his flock, his fold, subordinately exercise the role of shepherds. We too must live in humble service; and daily lay down our lives for one another, in union with the Lord who laid down his life in the passage towards glorious life for him and for us.'
