

FIRST READING

First reading - Acts 13:14,43-52

A reading from the Act of the Apostles

Paul and Barnabas carried on from Perga till they reached Antioch in Pisidia. Here they went to synagogue on the Sabbath and took their seats.

When the meeting broke up many Jews and devout converts joined Paul and Barnabas, and in their talks with them Paul and Barnabas urged them to remain faithful to the grace God had given them.

The next sabbath almost the whole town assembled to hear the word of God. When they saw the crowds, the Jews, prompted by jealousy, used blasphemies and contradicted everything Paul said. Then Paul and Barnabas spoke out boldly. 'We had to proclaim the word of God to you first, but since you have rejected it, since you do not think yourselves worthy of eternal life, we must turn to the pagans. For this is what the Lord commanded us to do when he said:

I have made you a light for the nations,

so that my salvation may reach the ends of the earth.'

It made the pagans very happy to hear this and they thanked the Lord for his message; all who were destined for eternal life became believers. Thus the word of the Lord spread through the whole countryside.

But the Jews worked upon some of the devout women of the upper classes and the leading men of the city and persuaded them to turn against Paul and Barnabas and expel them from their territory. So they shook the dust from their feet in defiance and went off to Iconium; but the disciples were filled with joy and the Holy Spirit.

Cont...We also remember that Mother's Day is a difficult day for many, particularly those who have lost their mothers, or whose family memories are not such happy ones. We pray to Mother Mary, that she might offer up her prayers for everyone in our communities this weekend.

This month, too, Pope Francis asks us to pray for young people, that they might find in Mary an inspiration for living a generous life. It's also the feast of Blessed Edmund Rice founder of the Christian brothers this week - a man who generously journeyed with young people without access to education.

THE SHEPHERD



In our gospel for today we see Jesus describing himself as the leader of the sheep. This figure of the Good Shepherd is the nearest approach to a parable in John's gospel. It is so important that the Church puts it before us on the fourth Sunday of Easter in each of the three cycles of readings. Apart from its

obvious sense of Jesus looking after his sheep this image has special significance. The figure of the shepherd in the Old Testament is a frequent image for God.

In the Old Testament God is the primary shepherd of Israel, who pastures his sheep in pastures green so that they fear no evil (Psalm 23). In Ezekiel 34 God promises to free Israel from the self-centred shepherds who keep the sheep for their own advantage, and to send them a true shepherd after his own heart.

The motif of the shepherd also finds a claim in the person of King David who was called to lead Israel from the fields by the prophet Samuel. There the young David left his flock to take on the more exalted task of shepherding the flock of Israel.

Jesus then symbolises both from the divine side the heavenly shepherd of the psalms and the Old Testament images of God as the Shepherd of Israel (Psalm 80) and in his human nature, as we know, Jesus inherits the throne of his ancestor David (Lk 1:32) the original shepherd king.

Both of these images then casts Jesus as the true Shepherd king who leads the flock both in a divine way as God and in a human way as the descendant of David. Yet, Jesus only leads those who listen to his voice. Only those who listen to the voice of Christ are given a three-fold promise:

- 1. They will receive eternal life
- 2. They will never be lost

3. No one can ever steal the faithful hearer of Christ's voice from the Lord.

Thus we must be attentive to what Christ teaches in the

Cont...words of scripture and in the teachings of the Church and its tradition. It is the scriptures and the Tradition which form Christ's message to us for our salvation. It is only through hearing the Shepherd's voice that we can enter into the pasture, safe and secure.

Today then let us listen to the voice of the Lord, lest our hearts become hardened.

CONCERN FOR THE PEOPLE OF GOD

'The Good Shepherd is one of the best-known and best loved of the images in the New Testament. It has its roots deep in salvation history: David, the boy shepherd, was chosen to be king of Israel; he was the anointed leader of the people of God, to guide and lead them towards God and his kingdom.

'Our Lord speaks very solemnly of shepherds and pastors in Saint John's Gospel. The young Church in its ministry of preaching and teaching the Good News of the Kingdom of God had perhaps encountered difficulties in its pastoral ministry. Great concern for the people of God is expressed in this passage; if the people are misled, if they are persuaded by a false voice, they could be prevented from attaining the Kingdom of God. There were flaws and frailties in the embryonic Church. 'Flaws and frailties on a huge scale were seen in the case of the horrendous paedophile scandals which emerged recently; pastors - priests and bishops who had accepted the call to be shepherds and pastors had betrayed the trust placed in them.

'This betrayal is very wide and very deep; instead of being led and guided towards God and the kingdom, many among the people of God have been violated, their persons and humanity scarred, in some cases destroyed. The wounds inflicted have been very great, and many have abandoned the Church perhaps forever. Excerpt from a homily by Fr Robert Pollock OP

'At every crossroad, every one of us has three possible options:

The **first** choice is to quit a road that is going somewhere we do not want to go. We can move on in another direction. We can distance ourselves from the difficulties of it all. We can leave the mission unfinished.

The **second** alternative is to... crawl into a comfortable cave with nice people and become a church, a culture, a society within a society. We can just hunker down together and wait for the storm to calm down, go by, and become again the nice warm womb of our beginnings.

The **third** choice is to refuse to accept a moral deterioration of the present and insist on celebrating the coming of an unknown, but surely holier, future. The third choice is to go steadfastly on, even if we are not sure what we will find at the end of it... The third choice is a choice that demands great courage.... And courage is a prophet's road. The prophets had a choice. So do we.'

MARY, QUEEN OF THE MAY

May has traditionally been a month of special devotion to Mary, the mother of God. Over the centuries, different traditions developed in different cultures. Processions singing hymns to Mary and carrying flowers often ended at a garden shrine where Mary was crowned, to the hymn "O Mary we crown thee with blossoms today, Queen of the Angels and Queen of the May." Many families still have a May altar to Mary in the home, with a picture or statue, flowers and a candle or two to light when the family say prayers. Many flowers have become associated with Mary, and the tradition of a Marian garden can be traced back to the seventh century in France. We have our own beautiful Marian garden - the rosary of red and white roses in front of the main entrance to what was the Monastery. For the five Sundays in May, we will be singing a Marian hymn after Communion at the 10 am mass, in honour of Mary. Father Mannes will also lead the Regina Caeli (Queen of Heaven), proper to the Sundays of Easter, before the final blessina.
