ENTRANCE ANTIPHON

Entrance Antiphon - Acts 1:11

Men of Galilee, why gaze in wonder at the heavens? This Jesus whom you saw ascending into heaven will return as you saw him go, alleluia.

FIRST READING

First reading - Acts 1:1-11

A reading from the Act of the Apostles

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

This you can tell from the strength of his power at work in Christ, when he used it to raise him from the dead and to make him sit at his right hand, in heaven, far above every Sovereignty, Authority, Power, or Domination, or any other name that can be named not only in this age but also in the age to come. He has put all things under his feet and made him, as the ruler of everything, the head of the Church; which is his body, the fullness of him who fills the whole creation.

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THE ASCENSION



Go to any airport, train or bus station in the country and often you will find tearfilled relatives farewelling the ones they love. Saying good bye is hard. For some of you this may have been felt through the death of a relative, a parent, a grandparent, perhaps a brother or sister. All in all we hate saying goodbye to those whom we love.

The disciples are gathered and Jesus rises, ascends above them and returns to the existence he had from all eternity; the life of heaven. The disciples, however are far from sad, in fact they are joy filled, they are now the bearers of the good news, the news that we are made for life with God, and it is through Jesus that we get there. Cont...Our celebration today then tells us most importantly about who Jesus is. As Catholics we believe Jesus Christ to be no ordinary man. Rather he is God become a human being. For some people that sounds weird or stupid. How can God become a man? Well if we realise that God is all powerful, that God created all things out of nothing, that he provides us with a multitude of miracles each day, then there is no problem in coming to the conclusion that God could become a man. The idea of a God becoming a man was no problem to the peoples of Jesus' own time. Greek and Roman religion was certainly quite open to the fact that Gods could regularly descended from Mt Olympus to take on the disguise of human beings.

Christ is nothing like the gods of ancient mythology. In his behaviour, in his love for humanity, our Lord and God Jesus Christ sacrificed himself on our behalf to show us how much God loved us not matter what we had done. Our God who became man, Jesus Christ, rather than come to earth for pleasure, like the Greek or Egyptian, or Roman gods did, came to earth to suffer, die and rise again gloriously.

St Thomas Aquinas, the great Dominican theologian of the 13th century explained it was entirely fitting that God could become man-St Thomas says then that:

"the very nature of God is goodness... And it belongs to the essence of goodness to communicate [or give] itself to others... Hence it belongs to the essence [to the very nature] of the highest good to communicate itself in the highest manner to human beings, and this is brought about chiefly by [Christ] in his joining created nature [to his divine person]"

Fundamentally in God assuming a human nature God opens up to us his goodness, and invites us to the joy of this experience. In Jesus Christ god embraces humanity and lifts it up to the life of heaven.

Yet once Jesus' message of goodness, love and peace had been achieved he went back to his heavenly throne. This is what we celebrate today. We remember Jesus' victory over death and his enabling us to come to eternal life with him. Jesus ascends to heaven but that is not the end of the story, no. We who are baptised, we who have put on Christ continue to live that story today, whether we are conscious of this or not. Each of us is made to worship, each of us is made for unending happiness, unending and perfect joy.

How do we know we are made for perfect joy? We know this because sometimes we are bored with life, we are bored with our job, with assignments, with the monotonous humdrum of life. What would we rather be doing? Perhaps for some it would be sitting on a beach in the Bahamas drinking a Pina Colada, or listening to music, or playing sport, or having nice meal. But even with those things we would not be satisfied. Really we are made for more than just material realities; we really want to be fulfilled in a way which will never leave us unhappy or dissatisfied. Jesus' ascension points the way to that happiness. However, we don't just get there like that, we can't enter heaven without some effort, we have to learn the etiquette of heaven. This etiquette or behaviour which is suitable to heaven is able to be discovered while we are on earth; it is in following the example of Christ that we can learn to enjoy eternal life. Jesus' ascension basically indicates to us that heaven is the place where we can be totally fulfilled. Today then we must be mindful then that our destiny, our desires, our needs, can only be filled by that which is infinite, and that infinite something is not just a thing, but a

Dear friends,

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I am writing to inform you of my intention to revive the Parish Pastoral Council. After an absence of almost five years it seems appropriate now to work towards setting up this integral part of our parish community.

The church's law makes provision for a PPC which recognises the importance the faithful have in the mission of the Church.

In our Archdiocese it has been required each parish have a Parish Pastoral Council since the 1989 Diocesan Synod. Due to the absence of a PPC at Rosary for some time, the re-establishing of this pastoral organisation is a matter of priority as we move towards the administrative changes in the parish on November 26th.

That being the case, I have decided to nominate some parishioners to be an interim Parish Council during the handover to the next administration. I will be seeking nominations from both our Parish Finance Council and from our Renewal group, two from each team. I then will be seeking a nomination of one (1) person from each Mass time. Criteria for nominees

- A healthy, vibrant, and deep, prayer life.
- A skill set which will contribute to the well being, renewal, and mission of the parish.

• A desire to promote a mission oriented community not just a maintenance one (knowledge of Divine Renovation will be an advantage).

CATHOLIC WOMEN'S TASKFORCE

Three parishioners joined 25 or so other women of faith representing many parishes across the Archdiocese for a sumptuous morning tea on 6th May at St Christopher's Pastoral Centre.



We gathered to support the Catholic Women's Taskforce who advocate for and enhance the participation of women in the Catholic Church within the Archdiocese. The taskforce (title about to change) was formed in 2019, the purpose of which was at that time threefold:

Ways of Being - Formation Ways of Relating - Connection

Ways of Transforming – Advocacy

Since its inception, reflection afternoons have been held including input form Spirituality groups within the archdiocese, raising funds for outreach to families in rural areas affected by bushfires, an information session on 'Women and Homelessness' which sparked, financial and pastoral care supporting MacKillop House by the taskforce. Themes from Laudate Si' were also covered.

A talk on what it is actually life for women in the workforce was comprehensively covered. The taskforce values the relationship and honesty of women and the opportunity to hear their stories regardless of whether they have a grievance or not with the Catholic Church, which may have Cont....caused pain or excluded them.

Healthy verbal contributions and discussion took place with each individual asked to speak briefly on a positive aspect of their experience and feelings about their parish today.

This gathering of like-minded women of faith, was an inspiring and gratifying one for all present with thanks to Andrea Dean and members.
