

FIRST READING

First reading - Acts 15:1-2, 22-29

A reading form the Acts of the Apostles

Some men came down from Judaea and taught the brothers, 'Unless you have yourselves circumcised in the tradition of Moses you cannot be saved.' This led to disagreement, and after Paul and Barnabas had had a long argument with these men it was arranged that Paul and Barnabas and others of the church should go up to Jerusalem and discuss the problem with the apostles and elders. Then the apostles and elders decided to choose delegates to send to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas; the whole church concurred with this. They chose Judas known as Barsabbas and Silas, both leading men in the brotherhood, and gave them this letter to take with them: 'The apostles and elders, your brothers, send greetings to the brothers of pagan birth in Antioch, Syria and Cilicia. We hear that some of our members have disturbed you with their demands and have unsettled your minds. They acted without any authority from us; and so we have decided unanimously to elect delegates and to send them to you with Barnabas and Paul, men we highly respect who have dedicated their lives to the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Accordingly we are sending you Judas and Silas, who will confirm by word of mouth what we have written in this letter. It has been decided by the Holy Spirit and by ourselves not to saddle you with any burden beyond these essentials: you are to abstain from food sacrificed to idols; from blood, from the meat of strangled animals and from fornication. Avoid these, and you will do what is right. Farewell.'



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TRADITION AND TRADITIONS



In the church there seems always to be a sense of preserving tradition but also a desire to reformulate it.

Yet we must distinguish between tradition, with a big "T" and traditions. The tradition (with a big 'T') of the church is contained in those things which we would consider not negotia-

ble, like the divinity of Christ, or that God is a trinity of persons.

Our first reading from the Acts of the Apostles describes a debate which was rife during the apostolic age-to circumcise or not to circumcise, to be an observant Jew before becoming a Christian or enter into the Church straight from a life of paganism. These were the hot issues, issues we do not face today but which, I am sure, could find equivalents for in today's Church. Fundamentally it was a debate over tradition- the apostles and their collaborators had to ask the question do we chuck out all our traditions or do we preserve something of our heritage.

The case to circumcise was dismissed totally by St Paul. you see circumcision was a sign of God's covenant with Israel, that was its purpose, it was designed as a physical reminder to the men of Israel that they were a consecrated people, a holy nation, a royal people, a people set apart for God.

St Paul knew that Christ had become the new covenant, the new agreement, the new deal from God, And how was that symbolised? How do we know about this new agreement? One word, 'the Eucharist'. Recall the words the priest uses to consecrate the precious blood-"this is the chalice of my blood, the blood of the new and everlasting covenant, it will be shed for you and for many, so that sins may be forgiven, do this in memory of me." Christians did not need to be circumcised anymore, because they remembered God's covenant through the Mass. In celebrating the Mass daily the Christian recounts the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is in the spilling of Jesus' blood that the new covenant is signed, sealed and delivered. Man did not need to spill his own blood in circumcision because the precious blood of the god-man had been poured out in abundance for him.

So tradition then can be modified or abolished, but only when it regards what is no longer essential, or when it is superseded by something greater.

Yet traditions should not be abolished arbitrarily, for as G. K. Chesterton once quipped:

Tradition is the democracy of the dead. It means giving votes to that remotest and obscurest classes, our ancestors. It refuses to submit to the arrogant oligarchy of those who simply happen to be walking around.

Let us be mindful then of our traditions realising they link us to the past and indeed they may very well teach us how to move on into the future.
