

ENTRANCE ANTIPHON

Entrance Antiphon - Acts 1: 11

Men of Galilee, why gaze in wonder at the heavens? This Jesus whom you saw ascending into heaven will return as you saw him go, alleluia.

FIRST READING

First reading - Acts 1:1-11

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

In my earlier work, Theophilus, I dealt with everything Jesus had done and taught from the beginning until the day he gave his instructions to the apostles he had chosen through the Holy Spirit, and was taken up to heaven. He had shown himself alive to them after his Passion by many demonstrations: for forty days he had continued to appear to them and tell them about the kingdom of God. When he had been at table with them, he had told them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for what the Father had promised. 'It is' he had said 'what you have heard me speak about: John baptised with water but you, not many days from now, will be baptised with the Holy Spirit.'

Now having met together, they asked him, 'Lord, has the time come? Are you going to restore the kingdom to Israel?' He replied, 'It is not for you to know times or dates that the Father has decided by his own authority, but you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you, and then you will be my witnesses not only in Jerusalem but throughout Judaea and Samaria, and indeed to the ends of the earth.'

As he said this he was lifted up while they looked on, and a cloud took him from their sight. They were still staring into the sky when suddenly two men in white were standing near them and they said, 'Why are you men from Galilee standing here looking into the sky? Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven, this same Jesus will come back in the same way as you have seen him go there.'

COMMUNION ANTIPHON

Communion Antiphon - Matthew 28: 20

Behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age, alleluia.

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The Feast of the Ascension which celebrates the end of Jesus' work on earth, also invites us to be joyful followers of Christ (scripture reflection – I am with you always). This week we celebrate Laudato Si' Week, which marks the seventh anniversary of Pope Francis' landmark encyclical on creation care. While the final make-up of federal Parliament is yet to be decided, it is clear Australians are keen to embrace candidates who want to tackle climate issues. And as National Reconciliation Week gets underway later this week, 'Reconciliation requires bravery' we need to recognise and understand past and present injustice, particularly that which shapes attitudes and institutions.

ASCENSION



Often when I read a good novel or watch a good serial on TV I become rather attached to the characters, as I venture towards the final chapters of the book or hit those last few episodes I begin to feel rather empty. I've entered in to a new world, met a whole lot of new people and been

with them on an adventure; and now it's all ending.

I suppose we feel that way with Easter. we've started the journey in Lent which is a bit like plodding through the first part of the book-we're getting to know the characters, it's a bit bumpy, a bit new and uncomfortable, and then we hit upon Holy Week, that's the crisis, act two if you like-all of a sudden there's a plot twist the main character at one point lauded by the people is shockingly put in the worse possible situation and dies a fairly ignominious death. The protagonist offered so much, he was wise, gentle, just, and now they've got him. Come Easter Sunday and we see the resolution, there's yet another twist but this time it's the happy ending we've wanted -the resurrection. The resolution of resurrected life is celebrated for forty days we begin to enter more fully into Jesus' life and in doing so we come to an understanding of our own life, that is, our lives too are pointed towards the resurrection, towards a new kind of life. And now it's all ending again, there's sadness once more, or is there one final twist?

Unlike my morose disposition at the end of that novel or TV serial, we have no need for despondency. Our Easter life continues because at heart we are, essentially, by baptism and its irrevocable character, geared towards the resurrection and the life of Heaven. By virtue of our baptism we are always an Easter people, a people inclined towards resurrected life.

In Jesus' ascension we see more acutely the scenario of a human nature leading us to God. Jesus, he who is God become man, takes us to where he always was, for as St Augustine incisively points out:

He did not leave heaven when he came down to us; nor did he withdraw from us when he went up again into heaven. The fact that he was in heaven even while he was on earth is borne out by his own statement: no one has ever ascended into heaven except the one who descended from heaven, the son of man, who is in heaven.

Augustine remarks further regarding our part in Christ's Ascension when he says:

Cont...[It was] out of compassion for us he descended from heaven, and although he ascended alone, we also ascend, because we are in him by grace. Thus, no one but Christ descended and no one but Christ ascended;

Augustine observes and takes seriously, as we all should, that we are true members of Christ's body and that by virtue of the grace we receive in the sacraments we too through Christ's experience even now the life of heaven.

This rationale, though obscure, is heightened in our reception of the Eucharist. It is in our devout reception of the holy Eucharist that the door to ascended life is opened. Through our reception of his body that link with Christ and with heaven is made, that is why it is called holy communion, we enter into union with heaven where Christ in his human body blazes the trail for us. Our reception of Holy Communion acts as a bridge into the life of God, our Eucharistic meal offers us the pledge of future glory, the pledge of hope; a hope which is not stuck gazing into the sky fruitlessly but a hope fulfilled even now because Christ our hope prepares a room for us. This feast invites us to take seriously our reception of Christ's body in the sacrament because by virtue of his sacramental real presence Jesus Christ risen and ascended offers us an entry into the life he himself enters into and which we commemorate today.

Looking forward however there will be a second descent and a second ascent too. The second coming of Christ will be in judgment of humanity, a judgment which will enable those who have unwaveringly hoped for his coming to see that hope consumed in divine love.

SORRY DAY

Sorry Day (26 May) and Reconciliation Week (27 May – 3 June) are two aspects of the same mission. Sorry Day marks one of the worst episodes in the mistreatment of Indigenous Australians by the descendants of the colonial invaders.

It records the forced removal on ideological grounds of children from Indigenous families and the lasting suffering inflicted both on the children and their families.

Sorry Week was initiated in 1998 after the publication of the *Bringing Them Home* Report. It led eventually to the Apology to the Stolen Generations in 2008 and the Parliamentary commitment to close the gap between the lives of Indigenous and other Australians.

Reconciliation Week focuses on what remains to be done in ensuring that Indigenous Australians are not discriminated against. If that is to happen the wider Australian community must understand and want to change the conditions that entrenched inequality. Reconciliation must be based on a shared acknowledgment of the reality of colonial settlement in Australia, of its effects on the First Australians, and on a shared determination to change the ways in which Indigenous people are treated as second class citizens.

JOY IS LIBERATING

'The Ascension completes the cycle of the Incarnation. The eternal Word became flesh in Mary's womb. The angels told the shepherds news of great joy, that the Saviour would be wrapped in cloth and lying in a manger. 'Now that same Saviour departs from them and is carried up to heaven. The disciples worship him and return to Jerusalem with great joy. Joy at the beginning of Luke's gospel and joy at the end. Joy at the Incarnation and joy at the Ascension.

'Joy is liberating. It gives us the possibility of dreaming what a fully human life might be like. What is it like to be people of integrity? What is it like not to fear unemployment or sickness? What is it like not to fear death? Joy involves hope. We have hope because Jesus is ascended into heaven, and where he has gone we hope to follow.'
