

Gospel - Luke 9:11-17

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Jesus made the crowds welcome and talked to them about the kingdom of God; and he cured those who were in need of healing.

It was late afternoon when the Twelve came to him and said, 'Send the people away, and they can go to the villages and farms round about to find lodging and food; for we are in a lonely place here.' He replied, 'Give them something to eat yourselves.' But they said, 'We have no more than five loaves and two fish, unless we are to go ourselves and buy food for all these people.' For there were about five thousand men. But he said to his disciples, 'Get them to sit down in parties of about fifty.' They did so and made them all sit down. Then he took the five loaves and the two fish, raised his eyes to heaven, and said the blessing over them; then he broke them and handed them to his disciples to distribute among the crowd. They all ate as much as they wanted, and when the scraps remaining were collected they filled twelve baskets.

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CELEBRATING CHRIST'S PRESENCE

Corpus Christi focuses on Christ's presence under the form of bread and wine. This focus was shaped by disputes within the Church in the Medieval period when the Feast began. In Europe at the time the religious beliefs of some groups called for deliverance from material things into the world of spirit. They dismissed Catholic sacraments in which God was seen to work through material things such as water, bread, wine and oil. These groups were focused in local areas and were seen as a threat both to the rulers of Europe and to the Church. Crusades were launched against them with great savagery.

For Catholics the presence of Christ in the transformation of bread and wine became a central emblem of true faith and a rallying call. They found support in miracles where the Eucharist was seen to be turned into Christ's human flesh and human blood.

'Do this in remembrance of me'



As one gets older it is often the case that one looks back on one's life. This process of remembering can be assisted by looking at photos or old videos. Looking at these memorabilia can allow us to travel back to that holiday or that wedding or that other significant event. By using these

things, we can be drawn back to the past.

In some sense the Holy Eucharist is like this but more so.

Cont...When we celebrate the Eucharist we are asked to cast our hearts and minds back to those seminal events of our Christian faith, the passion, death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ. Unlike those old photos or videos, the person we are remembering is not just limited to a piece of celluloid or the digital processes of a computer, but this person appears among us as living and as vital as he did when he walked this Earth over 2000 years ago. The only catch is that Jesus' presence among us under the appearance of bread and wine throws our sensibilities a little, but it is the way that Jesus himself intended for us to remain in communion with him. When we celebrate the Eucharist then we are not just remembering but rather we are opening ourselves up to being in Christ's presence now recalling his love for us and his victory over sin and death, a victory which is crucial to our eternal destiny.

'Behold I am with you all through the days that are coming, until the consummation of the world'

At the conclusion of St Matthew's gospel Our Lord says these words, promising that he will be with us till his coming again. What Jesus is promising is not just that he will be up in heaven thinking about us but that he would really be with us as we negotiate life's pilgrimage. In the Holy Eucharist Jesus' promise is fulfilled. In the Eucharistic species Jesus Christ true God and true man remains with us day and night in the tabernacles of our churches, he remains there waiting for us to commune with him, he is waiting there to fulfill his promise that he would be with us till the end of the world. Yet, Jesus' presence among us in this extraordinary way fills in the gap between our life in this world and in the world to come. In heaven, in beatitude, we will no longer experience the Lord in such a veiled and obscure sort of way but rather we will see Christ as he is, face to face. The Holy Eucharist then is the bridge between faith fumbling in obscurity and the blessed day we will see our God as he is. The Eucharist provides for us though even now that union for which we truly long.

'My flesh for the life of the world'

In Jesus' Eucharistic presence he accomplishes what he teaches. His very flesh is given so that we may have eternal life. The Sacrifice of the Mass and the sharing of Christ's body and blood remind us always what Jesus has done for us, that is, through his atoning death and life giving resurrection the life of the world is restored, renewed and elevated. It is with this mindset that St Paul when writing on the Eucharist in his first letter to the Corinthians penned the following words we which we say at Mass occasionally "So it is the Lord's death that you are heralding, whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, until he comes." The flesh that Christ gives for the life of the world is something which we celebrate until the second coming. The Eucharist will continue to be celebrated every day until Christ returns and each celebration joyfully awaits that event. So our Eucharist then whilst it is an act of dynamic remembering of the past it is also a moment of anticipation for the Lord's coming.

As we celebrate the great gift of Jesus' body and blood given for us let us be mindful that this gift is given so that we can remember what Jesus has done for us, that he will be with us until the consummation of the world and **Cont...** that this flesh given for the life of the world points us to that place which is beyond this world, the life of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.

TAKING PLEASURE IN THE THINGS OF GOD

The Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi).
Fr Peter Hunter OP shows how the Holy Eucharist brings
us the joy of an overflowing feast.

I think it is fair to say that my mother doesn't particularly enjoy cooking (except perhaps on special occasions) but she certainly has always enjoyed seeing her family fed. One of her recipes was called 'chops for hungry chaps': tasty and filling food, it satisfied my brothers and me, even when we were ravenous teenagers. She taught me to enjoy food; that was just one aspect of a general pattern, that she and I somehow can always have fun together, take pleasure in whatever we are doing. I was reminded of this when one of my Dominican brothers said he lived for pleasure, and then explained that he meant he always tried to take pleasure in whatever God might send.

It seems to me that taking pleasure in seeing your family fed is a very human attitude, which finds deep echoes in our Christian tradition. Feeding someone is a fundamental way of loving them, of showing that you care for their well-being.

Food, for us human animals, goes far beyond what it is for our furry cousins in the rest of the animal world. Like them, we need it to survive, but we eat together to build up friendships, to show love, to celebrate our great successes in life. It's a human, natural way of creating a community.

It's such a rich symbol in human society that God can use it to communicate to us Himself. The feeding of the five thousand which we read about in the Gospel today is a richly meaningful event. At the most basic level, Jesus simply shows his love for those who have followed him to this place. But of course, it is also a rich sign, of the way in which God feeds us every day, providing us with our daily food, loving us by sustaining our existence. And at a third level, it is a sign of the way God feeds us with Himself, the way Jesus loves us by sustaining us spiritually, giving us His body and blood. Just as food can create a community, or express and strengthen a friendship, the food that God gives us makes us part of the community of the saints, and expresses and strengthens friendship, but in a way beyond any human expectation: by making us friends of God, sharers in His life.

God loves us by seeing us fed, by satisfying us spiritually with the Living Bread. Indeed, God delights in it, he delights in giving us all we need. And yet, ironically, we are never satisfied. "Show us the Father, and we shall be satisfied," Philip says to Jesus, as if the company of God With Us was not enough.

What this miraculous feeding shows us in a symbolic way is that what God gives us is not just enough, but more than enough to satisfy us, to fill our every desire. Jesus doesn't just give the huge crowd enough food, but much too much, an excessive amount.

Cont...There is a small mountain of food left over. And so it is with all God's acts. We need forgiveness, and God gives us glory. We need to be restored to our humanity, and God gives us a share in His own, divine life. We need spiritual support to turn us from a selfdestructive life, and God feeds us with Himself, moulding us into the image of His beloved Son.

Whatever God gives us, whatever good we find in our lives, is enough and more than enough. We are not willing to be satisfied and want something else, but God patiently waits, offering us what we really need, and more than we need.

And perhaps, then, taking delight in the good things God sends our way, however little they may seem to us, is a very important part of our Christian life. God is in fact showering on us everything we need, and infinitely more. The joy I have in the things I share with my mother have, perhaps, taught me something about enjoying the gifts Fr Peter Hunter OP, http://english.op.org/torch of God.

The Feast of Corpus Christi is a feast of its time.

It is also a Feast for every time that encourages us to pray, to wonder at Christ's continuing gift to us through his presence and his continuing activity, and to follow him in giving ourselves to those in need.
