

FAMILY OR CHRIST?



In his continuing discourse to his disciples Jesus makes some more outrageous statements. These statements are so offensive that one must ask, how can Jesus say such things?

First of all, Jesus places the disciple in an awful dilemma, whom should I be loyal to? Family or Christ? This demand seems,

ostensibly, to be intractable. Can't I be loyal to both? As we know Jesus' answer will be a person cannot have two masters. One cannot equally serve two competing causes, one must finally claim a person's heart.

Cont...Furthermore, Christ's demands seem to run contrary to the commandments. The fourth commandment is to honour Father and Mother. This commandment was important because it is the only commandment bound with a promise "Honour your father and your mother, that your days may be long in the land which the Lord your God gives you." (Exodus 20:12).

More crucially, family life was integral to the customs and practices of the Jews. Loyalty to one's tribe, people and land was in the DNA of the faithful Jew, very similar to the way many First Nations people see their familial and land ties. Hence, Jesus' demands run counter to the lived experience of the people to whom he was speaking.

The choice to leave family for a higher cause, a godly cause, however, was not unknown in the time of Christ. Those who are aware of the so called Dead Sea Scrolls, ancient parchments found in a place called Qumran in the 1940s, revealed the existence of a Jewish monastic community called the Essenes. These Jewish monks exemplified a break from the prevailing custom of familial loyalty. Why did these people engage in this lifestyle, a lifestyle so counter cultural? Well, because for these monastic practitioners union with God and the anticipated return of the Messiah were prominent in their minds. Family life and familial custom stood in the way of this outlook. Apart from the extremism of the Essenes even some contemporary rabbis of Jesus' time did encourage following God, or ones rabbi rather than one's parents.

Jesus' demands, however, are contingent on who he is. The disciples are challenged to give up all things to follow Jesus because Jesus is no ordinary prophet, religious teacher or sage, but rather God incarnate. Fundamentally the choice then is to be faithful to the teachings of Christ even in opposition to familial ties. Much like last week's gospel one will not be judged by one's parents or relatives at the end of time, but God himself. Our gospel today in its context reveals that for the disciple faith in Christ and his teachings would be divisive. We know that many of Jesus' followers were excluded from worship in the Temple and in the synagogue because of their belief that Jesus was the promised Messiah. This exclusion may have also seen ruptures in the family too and thus Jesus is emphasising this situation as the decider in one's commitment as a disciple. For us the choice to follow Christ may not always pose such dire disruption in family life, but our gospel today reminds us that in the final analysis fidelity to Christ must take priority. Today let us pray for the grace to remain faithful to Jesus even when it is difficult, and at times, strains our familial ties.

FAMILIAR WORDS, MIND-BLOWING TRUTHS

Thirteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Fr Gregory Pearson OP says the Gospel challenges us to reflect on the immensity of the gift Christ offers us.

One of the things it's very easy to fall into, I think, when we come to Mass every week, and hear these various passages of the Gospel, is that we can stop noticing quite what it is they're saying – they become familiar, well loved words, like the words of a song we really like, perhaps, but we can fail to notice the astounding things that are actually being claimed. Today's Gospel passage from Matthew has a few such points: texts where we think, 'oh yes, find life – lose it, lose life – find it: I know that one,' for example.

Alongside such texts in the Gospels which become, we

Cont...might say, dangerously familiar – texts which, despite the magnitude of what they're saying, can sometimes wash over us as we listen – there are others which are much less likely to pass us by in that way. Specifically, I'm thinking of what are often called 'hard sayings' (after the complaints of some of the followers of Jesus in Jn 6:60): teachings of Jesus which stand out and stick in the memory for their apparent harshness. In today's Gospel we have one instance of a recurrent theme of hard sayings: we are unworthy of Christ if we prefer anything or anyone to him, ever our own parents or children (Mt 10:37).

And in fact, if we think about how we approach these hard sayings, there might be a connection with the casual familiarity with which we can treat the Gospels as a whole. If we think of the Gospels as something comfortable and comforting, nice and familiar, then the bits that don't fit in with that approach are really going to shock us, to challenge us. Talk about loving Jesus more than our mother and father, more than our children, can never be something which will sit comfortably with us; it speaks of hard choices and brings home to us in very concrete terms what the difficulties of following Jesus, the 'cross' we are to take up, might look like.

But as these hard sayings remind us of the cost of disciple-ship, they can also help us to discover – or rediscover – new depths in the texts and stories which we have, perhaps, allowed to become overly familiar. To put it bluntly, when we think more seriously about the cost of disciple-ship, we're more likely also to think more seriously about the benefits. We're challenged to be single-minded in following Christ, to place him above all else, because he shows to us the sheer immensity of the gift which he gives to those who follow him.

'Anyone who welcomes you welcomes me; and those who welcome me welcome the one who sent me,' (Mt 10:40) Jesus says: another familiar saying, perhaps. Yet within this statement is contained the utterly mind-blowing notion that human beings can be so closely united to God that it's possible for Jesus to speak of our relationship with him in the same way as of his relationship with the Father. If we ask ourselves why we should love Christ more than our most dearly beloved relations and friends, then the answer we find is that the friendship, the closeness, already offered to us in Christ is something which goes further and deeper than even the very closest human relationship.

And of course, as we see in Christ's own life, union with God doesn't make life in this world of ours easy. But it does mean that this effort, this suffering, is not without value - 'if anyone gives so much as a cup of cold water ... he will ... not lose his reward' (Mt 10:42); in this following of Christ, this union with God, our suffering becomes a sacrifice in the true sense, an offering of what we have, of what we are, to God, united with Christ's own great sacrifice.

And, as St Paul reminds us in his letter to the Romans, in our baptism we have been given a share, not only in Christ's sacrifice but also in his victory, a share which transforms our lives and sets us free. Yes, that means being able to identify our sufferings with his, but it also invites us, rather dauntingly, to share in his work of transformation – by taking up our cross and following him, by working out our Christian faith in our lives, Jesus invites us to share in that work of saving and sanctifying the world which he has wrought through his cross and resurrection, and so also in the glory which is that work's fulfilment and reward.
