

QR CODE & TRY BOOKING

We are using the online booking system TryBooking (which costs us nothing) and this means we can print off a list of people who have 'booked' for each Mass. This saves you and us time, speeds up the arrival queue at Mass, and helps us manage the numbers at each Mass.

Government Requirements - Your responsibilities

- Use the Check In CBR app to check in before entering a business or venue, or before being seated.
- If you don't have the Check In CBR app you must provide your details to the church so they can check you in
- Take personal responsibility for your own COVID safety.

To comply with Government rules we need Welcome Ministers to check parishioners in. Remember that the Welcome Ministers are volunteers who have come to Mass but give their time to welcome you, and to help sign people in. PLEASE make sure you arrived before Mass begins.

SUNDAY

Our relationship with each other, our country and our planet is the theme of both NAIDOC Week and this coming week's celebration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday.

NAIDOC Week provides an opportunity for all Australians to join in celebrating the culture and aspirations and hopes of Indigenous and Torres Strait Islanders.

This year the theme of the <u>National Aboriginal and Islander</u> <u>Day Observance Committee (NAIDOC) Week</u> (4-11 July) is short, sharp and challenging. It is 'Heal Country!' It calls on all of us to continue to seek greater protections for our lands, our waters, our sacred sites and our cultural heritage from exploitation, desecration, and destruction.

NAIDOC Week, of course, is built on the determination of many Indigenous people who recognised that they were neither respected nor heard to work for change. They spoke truth to power, a truth that has rarely been acknowledged. The organisation grew out of the recognition that it inappropriate to celebrate Australia Day on the anniversary of the arrival of the First Fleet, an event which marked the beginning of their dispossession. They began to organise in order to find practical recognition by other Australians of their right to participate in society as equal members, but faced opposition at every corner. On the question of Australia's national day they still face opposition, but have now built considerable support in the wider community.

NAIDOC Week was born out of that movement. It continues to provide an opportunity for all Australians to join in celebrating the culture and aspirations and hopes of Indigenous and Torres Strait Islanders. And to listen to their voice.

As our country faces the continued challenges of COVID-19 and natural disasters, let us pray for all Australians and for the country that sustains us. Fr Andrew Hamilton

WEAKNESS

Are you weak enough?

"My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness."

A couple of weeks ago I had the privilege of being at the diocesan clergy conference. It was a great time of fraternity and fellowship.

One evening whilst we were at a recreation some of the priests were discussing how their ministry was going, some were tired, some were engaged in new endeavours and others were busy ministering in their own way. I am not sure how this came up but we began to talk about what the priesthood meant to us personally. All agreed it was an honour to be ordained for ministry but that none of us were really worthy of it. One senior priest piped up and asked us were we "weak" enough to be priests. What an odd phrase I thought, but then it struck me, this is exactly what Paul is mentioning in his epistle for today's Mass. Paul's little discussion about his own troubles arises in the context of a number of passages whereby the Apostle is trying to establish his credentials as an agent of Christ to the Church at Corinth. Paul carefully enunciates how qualified he is to represent Christ to them, how he was truly a son of Israel, a son of Abraham, and that he is more Christ' servant than the other apostles since he has suffered a lot more. Our passage which we read in this weekend's liturgy is a moment where Paul realises that he is boasting too much.

Cont... It is because of this superior mindset that Paul remarks:

That I, Paul, might not become too elated, because of the abundance of the revelations, a thorn in the flesh was given to me, an angel of Satan, to beat me, to keep me from being too elated.

We are not quite sure what this "thorn" in the flesh was, was it some moral failing? Was it a physical handicap? What we are made aware of is the fact that whatever this mysterious thorn was it grieved Paul personally and may have been a source of embarrassment for him. In any account it humbled him.

Are we weak enough to serve Christ? Are we weak enough to represent him to others? Often in scripture weakness is fertile ground for God to act. Weakness, moral failure, physical handicap, economic hardship, all are decent foundations for God to manifest his glory. There are countless stories in scripture which bear witness to this odd phenomenon. For instance:

Moses was a murderer (Ex 2:12), he also had a speech impediment (Ex 4:10) yet he was called to lead Egypt out of slavery.

Gideon was from the poorest family in his tribe but called to lead Israel to war (Judg 6:15)

King David was the youngest in his family a mere runt (1 Sam 16:11), but he was also a murderer and an adulterer (2 Sam 11:1-27)

Jeremiah was only a youth yet called to be a prophet of Israel (Jer 1:6)

Mary was only a young girl but by God's grace became the Mother of God (Lk 1:26-38)

Peter was a humble fisherman (Mt 4:18)

In our own weakness God's glory can shine. We may think that we are nothing but it is that humility, that knowing of our station in life that God can produce miracles. If God could use the abovementioned characters in scripture just imagine what he can do in you. But are you weak enough?

PEOPLE SIMPLY DIDN'T GET IT

'Have you ever wondered what it must have been like to meet Jesus? It would have been such a privilege to have heard him, to have seen the things that he did. Yet time and again in the Gospel, we find that when Jesus speaks to people, or when he teaches and preaches, people simply didn't get it.

'In today's Gospel Jesus is acclaimed as one with wisdom and an ability to work wonders that does not match with his background as the simple carpenter, the son of Mary. The people are so distracted by their own ideas about who and what Jesus is, and cannot allow themselves to really listen to what he says, and look closely at what he does. They are not attentive enough to be able to truly see, and through seeing, truly believe.

'Pride is certainly not good news, because it gives us the illusion that we already know it all, and prevents us being disposed towards receiving from God. The next time we are tempted to think that we know all there is

to know about Jesus, let us pause for a moment and think again.
Let us dare to take a second look, and strive to live the Gospel at a deeper level, asking that we might receive that life which Christ has promised us. Except Fr Robert Gay OP



ETERNALLY LOVED - We see Jesus Christ, true God and true man, grappling with the limitations of his own humanity and that of others. He preaches in his home town, but does not succeed in convincing those whom he probably knew from when he was a boy. We are told: 'And he could do no mighty work there, except that he laid his hands upon a few sick people and healed them.' This may mean that Jesus, shocked and disappointed, felt that a miracle would not be worthwhile because of their degree of unbelief, but did not wish the sick to suffer because of what was lacking in others. 'For Christians, to be mindful that we are limited creatures is not to put ourselves down, but is meant to be a source of comfort. In a world where profit and loss, efficiency and productivity, dominate, there is something truly wonderful in knowing that our relationship with God does not work like this.' Excerpt from a homily by Fr. John O'Connor OP SHARING THE TRADITION - Prophets and prophecy have always been part of the heritage of the people of Israel. The prophets of the Hebrew scriptures were charged with the difficult task of speaking God's words to a people who did not always want to hear such a difficult message, often about their own failings. Prophets were not people who fortold the future but those who had a clear understanding of what God wanted and called the people back to fidelity to God's plan and covenant when they had strayed. Even today, there are people who speak out against the status quo, who refuse to accept that the ways things are is the way things should be. Sometimes, the way things are is not the way God intended! The Summit Journal
