#### **SENT OUT TO PREACH**

The theme that linked the readings last week, that of the "rejected prophet," in some respects carries on today, appearing in both the First Reading and the Gospel.

The Gospel, Mark 6:7-13, places the Twelve in the line of this authentic prophetic tradition in that they are ordinary people sent out with the authority of Jesus to carry on the preaching, liberating, and healing role that has been his alone up till now.

#### PILLARS ON WHICH THE CHURCH IS BUILT

The Twelve, of course, are the "pillars" upon which the later Church will be built. Their mission here foreshadows that of the Church, establishing something essential for its life: that it is always a community on mission, entrusted with the supreme treasure of the Gospel and the healing ministry carried out in the Sacraments.

How it is to imitate these first missionaries in the "lightness" of its travel is far more of a problem, granted the massive institutional plant and wealth that the Church has acquired in the course of the centuries. There are no facile solutions to this – save perhaps the otherwise traumatic experience of persecution. But the Gospel reminds the Church that the effectiveness of its prophetic role – its critique of prevailing cultural assumptions and practice – will largely be in proportion to the "lightness" with which it travels, the trust in the goodness (hospitality) of ordinary people and the lack of self-seeking it presents to the world. This is perhaps all the more necessary at a time when the Church's credibility has been so seriously eroded by the sexual abuse crisis.

#### **ANOINTING OF THE SICK**

"The Anointing of the Sick, not just the dying"

"Can you come and give me Mum the last rites?" How often I have received a phone call or text message like this. First of all, when I receive a phone call or text like this I rejoice but never know exactly what I will encounter. Often visiting the bedside of dying person isn't really the right time for lengthy catechesis about the sacraments.

Our gospel today highlights the ministerial work of the disciples, they are to preach repentance, cast out demons, and surprisingly anoint sick people with oil. This last activity of anointing with oil is one of the bases of the Church's sacrament which we now call the Anointing of the Sick. For information's sake there is no such things as the "Last rites" per se, at one point in the Church's history we referred to this sacrament as Extreme Unction, a strange title but probably just an anglicized version of the Latin Extrema Unctio - literally the Anointing at the end or at death.

It is at this juncture that I would like to outline the nature of this sacrament, a sacrament which sometimes falls between the cracks - it's not as dramatic as baptism or marriage, perhaps it seemingly doesn't pack the same punch as the Eucharist nor does it seem to get the publicity it deserves. Yet, I can tell you from my point of view it is the most gratifying to celebrate because when I leave a dying person I know that they are in God's embrace now.

The introduction to the book I use for visiting the sick, the Ritual, is a helpful guide for us when we want to understand this sacrament. The Ritual says first of all that "part of the plan laid out by God's providence is that we should fight strenuously against all sickness and carefully seek the blessings of good health, so that we may fulfill our role in human society and in the Church. Yet we should always be prepared to fill up what is lacking in Christ's sufferings

Cont...for the salvation of the world as we look forward to creation being set free in the glory of the children of God."

The sick have a role "in the Church and it is to remind us of the essential and higher things. By their witness the sick show that our mortal life must be redeemed through the mystery of Christ's death and resurrection."

Our gospel illustrates that the Lord himself showed great concern for the sick for both their bodily and spiritual welfare and as we see today he commanded his followers to do the same through the anointing with oil.

In the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick then the Church by the prayer of its priests and the anointing with oil commend those who are ill to the suffering yet glorified Christ, associating the patient with the suffering Lord particularly. The sick person can then join his or her sufferings with Jesus and by it make reparation for their own sins and the sins of others.

So who can receive this sacrament? Well not everyone. If you're not actually sick you're not a candidate. The Ritual advises "a prudent or reasonably sure judgment, without scruple, is sufficient for deciding on the seriousness of the illness, if necessary a doctor may be consulted".

As an adjunct to this judgment the sacrament may and should be given to anyone whose health is seriously impaired; on the other hand it may not be given indiscriminately or to any person whose health is not seriously impaired." So if you've got cancer or heading for heart surgery chances are you'll be a candidate but not if you've stubbed your toe or if you've just got the common cold or man flu.

The sacrament can be repeated if the sick person recov-

ers and then gets sick again during the same illness and it can be celebrated particularly before serious surgery too. Of note is that one should request the sacrament whenever they feel the need to it but it has to be serious, though not always terminal. In fact, the celebration of the sacrament should be done when a person is fully conscious and aware of the celebration. I have often been called to anoint someone who is in a coma, who knows what sentiments they entered the coma with but one can only commend them to the Lord. The best practice is to request anointing when one is aware and fully able as best they can in their enfeebled state to participate in the rite. It is of great import that if a patient is terminally ill they be anointed fairly soon before a graver deterioration robs them of the ability to receive the sacrament fruitfully.

As we reflect on this often forgotten sacrament let us be aware that in this celebration of the Lord's care for those who are ill that the sick and enfeebled have a prominent place in the Church. Let us be mindful that we can request this healing oil when we are confronted with serious illness and that one need not be at death's door. Recall that it is the anointing of the sick, not anointing of the dying. Today let us commend all who face serious health problems to the Lord that the divine Physician may stretch out his healing hand upon them to cure them or to give them the courage and patience they need in their discomfort.

#### **CARRYING FORWARD CHRIST'S MISSION**

'In reality, the unity which God wills for humankind is broken in many different ways. The poverty gap between rich and poor has widened in the past decade. In developing countries destitution, malnutrition, vulnerability to disease, remain scandals that may implicate Western nations as the beneficiaries of an unjust economic order. Within so-called 'developed' nations migrants and asylum-seekers may be isolated and humiliated, a far cry from the compassion which is to be shown to strangers by members of the Promised Land. Their advertised exclusion supposedly serves our national or cultural unity - whatever that is. As I write this sermon, I can only guess if and how these questions are addressed in the new papal encyclical from Benedict XVI, Caritas in Veritate (Charity in Truth).

'Yet the very existence of such an encyclical can inspire hope. It reminds us that the prophetic mission of Amos (First Reading) to speak the words given to him by God is not a dead letter or dead end. That mission to Israel continues, culminates, in the advent of the Divine Word made flesh, Jesus Christ, whose preaching is carried forward in today's Gospel by the apostles. The encyclical reminds us that His and their mission is likewise carried forward in the Church. Her vocation is inescapable. For - mercifully - whatever our disunity, whatever the false compromises, God has acted decisively to restore our full unity in Christ. As the Letter to the Ephesians insists, God chooses us to be His adopted children in Christ so that all things are brought together at the end under His authority.'
