GOSPEL

Gospel - Luke 10:25-37

A reading from the holy Gospel according to St Luke



There was a lawyer who, to disconcert Jesus, stood up and said to him, 'Master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' He said to him, 'What is written in the Law? What do you read there?' He

replied, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbour as yourself.' 'You have answered right,' said Jesus 'do this and life is yours.'

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' Jesus replied, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of brigands; they took all he had, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead. Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him on to his own mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the brigands' hands?' 'The one who took pity on him' he replied. Jesus said to him, 'Go, and do the same yourself.'

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JESUS WITHOUT THE CHURCH?



I'm spiritual but not religious. This common saying is an interesting distinction in the enterprise of faith. What people mean is that though they have beliefs related to the transcend ent or supernatural, organised doctrine or central teaching authorities are not welcome.

A further species of this overriding genus is the people who say they love Jesus and admire his teachings but they don't want the Church. This novel distinction however cannot be maintained when one investigates Jesus' actual teaching and actions, as well of those of his closest associates.

For instance in the 16th Chapter of St Matthew's gospel we have Jesus actually explicitly refer to the creation of a visible community of believers, lead on earth, by a disciple, Peter:

"And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the powers of death shall not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven."

Matthew 16:18-19 RSV

Here Jesus explicitly does two things, sets up an institution called the church, or in Greek "ecclesia", which literally means the calling out of the people into a public space for a gathering of importance. In the context of Christ's intention here a gathering of those God has called to witness to him in the public square. The Church then is an invitation by Christ to witness to the power of God publicly. Further to the Matthean text Jesus invests in one of his closest followers supreme power, nothing less than the keys to the kingdom of heaven with the added power of adjudication and administration of the ecclesia on earth, the power to bind and loose.

Our reading from St Paul's letter to the Colossians likewise teaches the important point that one cannot arbitrarily subtract Christ from the Church equation, nor vice versa, Paul writes:

Christ Jesus is the image of the unseen God and the first-born of all creation, for in him were created all things in heaven and on earth....
Before anything was created, he existed, and he holds all things in unity.
Now the Church is his body, he is its head.

If Christ the image of the unseen God is the institutor of the Church as described by St Matthew, and that furthermore he is the Church's head, how can they say that they want Christ but not the Church? The logic is twisted, how can the head be without a body, or a body without a head?

Perhaps what these people refer to is that, in effect, they do not want a church with other people in it, or structures, or rules and regulations, or even a morality. But simply this is not what Our Lord gave us. Can we say

Cont...that the body of Christ has sometimes acted strangely or even in a manner contrary to the desires of the head? Sure. Even in our own bodies what we want to do and what our body does can be at odds. But in essence it is all the same unit, my body is me. And the same is with Christ. We are Christ's body, also known as the Church. By baptism we are incorporated into the very life of Christ and made sons and heirs of the Father really and truly, but all of this comes within the very structure Christ himself organised. To be baptised is to be a part of the community of the church, to become a cell along with all the other cells of Christ's living body on earth. Not a cell on its own outside the body.

To add more to this understanding we can also say that the Church is the sacrament of Christ to the world. The Church, like the sacraments, is a tangible, visible thing that can be experienced much like one of the seven sacraments. It is through this visible body of people united to Christ the head that the world may come to know Jesus. Each and every Christian is an individual sacramental unit which can pass on the grace and knowledge of Jesus. Much like last week though it depends on whether we live the life of our head daily in our lives. If we do so authentically and heroically we may perhaps win those doubters who do admire Jesus the head but not his body.

JESUS REFUSES BOUNDRIES

'The story of the Good Samaritan illustrates the contrast between two different conceptions of the moral life. The first is seen in the behaviour of the priest and the Levite. When they come across the man left beaten by robbers they both pass by on the other side of the road, fearing that he might already be dead. Both wanted to be obedient to the Jewish law, in this case the purity law which restricted contact with a corpse. But out of fear of violating an obligation imposed by the law, they failed to put into practice the heart of the law.

'Their conduct can be contrasted with the behaviour of the Samaritan traveller who, moved with pity at the sight of a fellow human being in need, acts with spontaneity and resourcefulness.

'Jesus refuses to answer this question in terms of identifying boundaries which separate neighbour from non-neighbour, whether these boundaries are defined by faith, national identity or special election by God. Now my neighbour is the first person I encounter who constitutes a claim on my love. At the same time it is in the person in need that I encounter Jesus Christ who identifies himself, in particular, with the lowly and the suffering.'
