

The Fifth Plenary Council of Australia ended on Saturday but in a statement, approved by all members, the Council said the work had only just begun.

According to the statement, the Council had been an 'expression of the synodality that Pope Francis has identified as a key dimension of the Church's life in the third millennium'. 'Synodality is the way of being a pilgrim Church, a Church that journeys together and listens together, so that we might more faithfully act together in responding to our God-given vocation and mission,' it said. This week let us pray for all in the Australian Catholic community and its leaders act decisively to implement the decisions of the Plenary Council.

LISTENING TO JESUS



Quite often Jesus finds himself having to sort out domestic disputes, some times it's working out who will inherit what (Lk 12:13), and in our gospel for this weekend Jesus is asked to tell an ostensibly lazy sister to get to work!!!

Oddly Jesus defends the ostensibly lazy Mary, defending her from her

choleric and distracted sister Martha who is getting on with all the hospitality. From her pots and pans one can imagine an increasingly frustrated Martha banging away until it all gets to her and she has a quiet word in Jesus' ear. Now, you think Jesus being a practical man, used to hard and tiring work as a carpenter would have some sympathy with the onerous duty of putting on a Semitic feast. Wrong!!!

St Luke mentions twice the word "took" when it comes to Mary. "Mary **took** her place at the Lord's feet", and later Jesus exclaims " "Mary has chosen for herself the best part of all, which shall never be **taken** away from her". Mary takes the time to listen to Jesus' words. In fact, Mary is being a far more gracious host than the grouchy Martha. Mary affords her guest an open and ready ear from the Word himself. Much like the mother of Jesus, this Mary too listens to the word of God and keeps it.

There is a lot in this story to digest but the overarching concern is <u>listening</u> to Jesus. This listening envisages taking time out to be with Jesus and sit at his feet. The gesture of sitting at the feet of someone, in ancient cultures, meant obedience to that person too, and this is what Mary encapsulates for us, one who listens to Jesus and obeys him.

So do we listen to God in prayer? Do we listen to the voice of Jesus or do we act like Martha and let the cares, concerns and anxieties of life overwhelm us and allow Jesus' voice to be drowned out?

Listening to Jesus is also a very special vocation in the Church too and we call this vocation a vocation to the contemplative life. In his Summa Theologiae Thomas Aquinas devotes an entire question to the topic as to whether the contemplative life is nobler than the active life. Thomas argues initially that the active life must be greater because activity is proper to those who are nobler in society like those in authority, further to this he notes that those in active roles often command those who walk the contemplative path. Finally, Thomas observes that quite regularly within the Church contemplatives are called to high office such as bishop or Pope. However, in his response to the question as to which way of life is better Aquinas uses the words of Jesus from today's gospel "Mary has chosen the better part, which shall not be taken away from her". This is Thomas' initial response but then he proceeds to give eight reasons why the contemplative is nobler than the active dimension, I will only enumerate four however:

- The contemplative life is more suitable to human beings because we are primarily intellectual creatures who desire to know and love.
- Once again using the archetypes of Martha and Mary, Aquinas shows that the person engaged in

- **Cont...**busyness and constant practicalities is troubled for Martha as Jesus describes her has "many cares and troubles".
- The contemplative is self-sufficient and doesn't need trivialities or distractions to give himself joy. The contemplative is like Mary who has chosen the "one thing necessary"
- Contemplation consists of a certain rest and quiet.

Today let us appreciate the contemplative dimension to which we are called to in the journey of Christian life, no matter how we may choose to live it. May we sit at the feet of Jesus and listen, really listen to what he says to our heart so that we may choose the better part and the one thing that is necessary like Mary, and overcome the anxiety and preoccupation of poor old Martha!!!

DISTRACTIONS

In the Gospel, Luke 10:38-42, two sisters, Martha and Mary, give hospitality to Jesus. Martha appears to be the dominant personality. Certainly, her hospitality is more active and practical. Her sister Mary simply sits at Jesus' feet and listens. This sets up the kind of "triangular" pattern often to be seen in Luke's gospel: Jesus interacts with a character, usually someone in a marginal situation in some respect; a third character or party takes offence at this and grumbles or murmurs. Jesus defends the more marginal party, showing how her or his action is the more appropriate in terms of what he has to offer. Understandably, down the ages and perhaps particularly in recent times, it is Martha who has evoked more sympathy. Her complaint that she has been left to do all the work by herself seems at one level very justified. But this is precisely where the provocation of the Gospel has its bite. As Luke's Gospel so often makes clear, frenetic service, even service of the Lord, can be a deceptive distraction from what the Lord really wants. Good people are always prone to measure their goodness by all they do for the Lord. They forget that nothing that they can

The scene has also been controversial in feminist interpretation. Is Jesus, in a liberating way, defending in Mary the right of women to be free of traditional "women's work" (kitchen duties, etc) in order to receive the kind of instruction from himself that will equip them for leadership in the community? Or is he, on the contrary, subtly putting women in their place by praising a woman (Mary) who takes a more passive role, while criticising the more active and energetic Martha? Both these positions miss the mark. The fact that two characters in the episode are women, while significant in its way, may not be the main point. As so often, the Gospel's focus is upon the abundance of God's gift and the barriers that human beings put up against receiving it.
