

QR CODE & TRY BOOKING

We are using the online booking system TryBooking (which costs us nothing) and this means we can print off a list of people who have 'booked' for each Mass. This saves you and us time, speeds up the arrival queue at Mass, and helps us manage the numbers at each Mass.

Government Requirements - Your responsibilities

- Use the Check In CBR app to check in before entering a business or venue, or before being seated.
- If you don't have the Check In CBR app you must provide your details to the church so they can check you in.
- Take personal responsibility for your own COVID safety.

To comply with Government rules we need Welcome Ministers to check parishioners in. Remember that the Welcome Ministers are volunteers who have come to Mass but give their time to welcome you, and to help sign people in. PLEASE make sure you arrived before Mass begins.

GOSPEL

Gospel: John 6:1-15

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee - or of Tiberias - and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

GRANDPARENTS AND THE ELDERLY

We start this week with the country's two biggest cities and around half the population in lockdown, while the rest of the nation looks on uneasily. This is a difficult time for everyone, no matter their circumstances, so this week let our watchword be 'kindness'.

Be kind to others, but also to yourself. Take time to go for a walk, to check in with yourself about how you're feeling, and to pray. And if you can, consider ways in which you can connect with others in your parish who may be feeling lonely and isolated. Perhaps organise a telephone tree, or see if there are people in your neighbourhood to whom you could drop off a copy of the parish bulletin. Many of those feeling isolated are likely to be elderly, so it is appropriate that Sunday (25 July) we honour our elders in Pope Francis'-declared inaugural World Day for Grand-parents and the Elderly. 'The love that binds' says 'In Pope Francis' Catholic vision, the aged should not be regarded and treated as if they are dispensable, but rather have a place of honour'.

While we may struggle in the coming weeks in different ways – working from home or not working at all, having no visitors or looking for peace and quiet in a household that is forced to eat, work, study and play in close confines, longing to meet with family and friends or concerned that isolation is becoming too attractive – remember that 'God provides for us physically as well as spiritually'.

MONEY DOESN'T BUY YOU EVERYTHING

It's very interesting to read about quite often the downfall of the high and mighty, the whole irony of how the rich and powerful end up poor and penniless, or behind bars. One need only look to Hollywood to see such people as Harvey Weinstein or actors like Kevin Spacey to see that power, prestige and popularity can be taken away just as easily as they were accrued. Faith in only material concerns as salvific usually ends up in a disaster, how can something created draw one beyond oneself or satisfy one's interminable yearnings. Movies like the Wolf of Wall Street or in fact that 80s classic Wall Street preached a prosperity gospel, the almighty dollar had replaced almighty God, redemption is found in retail therapy and happiness can now be acquired at a tap of the card.

This is the fundamental error of the people we find in our gospel about the multiplication of loaves. Contextually the people were starving, they had journeyed with Jesus and now found themselves out of town with no nearby general store to get the necessities of life. Jesus feels sorry for them and gets them organised for his miraculous feeding, a feeding which echoed the miraculous descent of bread from heaven in the desert which Moses acquired from God and a similar miracle wrought by the prophet Elisha in our first reading.

Jesus miracle of the loaves however holds a deeper meaning for John the gospel writer though. There are two things happening, John is connecting Jesus with the prophets of old showing his continuity with them but also the fact that he surpasses them. The other aspect which is brought out is that the concept of "bread" in the rabbinical tradition is a metaphor for God's law. Proverbs 9:5 relates this thought when it has personified Wisdom to announce to those who seek her riches "come eat my bread and drink the wine I have mixed for you". Yet the people in this part of John chapter 6 do not see the spiritual import very well. They are only partially aware that Jesus is indeed powerful and like the prophets of old but they do not see it is not bread Jesus wants to give only but rather heavenly teaching, the teaching which puts pay to

Cont...the old beliefs about God's blessing upon them being only a material thing, for up to then the Jewish understanding of the afterlife was still a matter for debate. For instance the Sadduccees did not believe in eternal life nor heaven; their cross town rivals, the Pharisees, on the other hand did hold to an afterlife and a reward for the just and punishment for evildoers. A Sadduccee would view material wealth and gain in this life as a blessing from God not something to be ashamed of and indeed this echelon of Jewish society was prosperous as well as being in cahoots with the occupying Roman forces. Jesus' Teaching, however, mirrors that of the Pharisees; wealth and prestige are only stepping stones to the more exalted destiny of the human person, namely, divine union.

Pope Benedict XVI articulates the attitude of the people in these terms: "they have been looking at salvation in purely material terms, as a matter of universal wellbeing, and they have therefore reduced man, leaving God out altogether....if they see the manna only as a means of satisfying their hunger, they need to realise that even the manna was not heavenly bread, but only earthly bread, even though it came from heaven it was earthly food..."

Benedict draws our attention then to the paradox which human beings have at the centre of their hearts: the desire for the material and at the same time the dissatisfaction material things eventually bring upon the human condition. This point reminds me of a retreat I was on for Yr 12 boys most of whom I would regard as probably not "religious" in the conventional sense. When asked about what they truly desire or for what they were truly thankful for it wasn't the latest video game, or sporting equipment, nor was it the prestige they may have earned by being on the top sporting teams, it was often things that were quite immaterial, the love of a parent, the love of a sibling, or some other important relationship in their lives. The proof of our desire for the immaterial and satisfying love that only God can give is only symbolised in the bestowal of the bread, the bread is only a sign which evidences Jesus supreme teaching authority, as one who could be trusted implicitly. Fundamentally Jesus wanted not their empty bellies but their hearts of flesh which yearned for the law of the Lord, the law that set them free to love God and in reciprocation receive his love.

Today let us ponder on the materiality which pervades our own lives and seek to realise that we will not find true happiness in the created but rather in he who IS UNCREATED.
