So he went off to Sidon, And when he reached the city gate, there was a widow gathering sticks; addressing her he said: 'Please bring a little water in a vessel for me to drink.' She was setting off to bring it when he called after her: 'Please,' he said, 'bring me a scrap of bread in your hand,' 'As the Lord your God lives,' she replied, 'I have no baked bread, but only a handful of meal in a jar and a little oil in a jug; I am just gathering a stick or two to go and prepare this for myself and my son to eat, and then we shall die.' But Elijah said to her: 'Do not be afraid, go ahead and do as you have said; but first make a little scone of it for me and bring it to me, and then make some for yourself and your son. For thus the Lord speaks, the God of Israel:

> "Jar of meal shall not be spent, jug of oil shall not be emptied, before the day when the Lord sends rain on the face of the earth."

The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent, nor the jug of oil emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.

Jesus said to his disciples:

'That is why I am telling you not to worry about your life and what you are to eat, nor about your body and how you are to clothe it. Surely life means more than food, and the body more than clothing!

Look at the birds in the sky. They do not sow or reap or gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not worth much more than they are? Can any of you, for all his worrying, add one single cubit to his span of life? And why worry about clothing? Think of the flowers Cont...growing in the fields; they never have to work or spin; yet I assure you that not even Solomon in all his regalia was robed like one of these.

Now if that is how God clothes the grass in the field which is here today and thrown into the furnace tomorrow, will he not much more look after you, you men of little faith? So do not worry; do not say: "What are we to eat? What are we to drink? How are we to be clothed?" It is the pagans who set their hearts on all these things. Your heavenly Father knows you need them all. Set your hearts on his kingdom first, and on his righteousness, and all these other things will be given you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own.'

FEAST DAY

Sunday is an important feast for Australians as we celebrate the country's first saint – a woman who deeply relied on God's goodness and believed in it with all her being. Saint Mary of the Cross (MacKillop) dedicated her life to doing something about the needs of people around her. Mary MacKillop chose St Joseph as patron of the women she inspired with her vision of simple living and the education of poor children.

This week let us dedicate ourselves to doing what we can for the people around us.

In 1893, Mary wrote this to her sisters: 'Let us ask Joseph to obtain for us a generous devoted love for Jesus, a love that will make us like himself . . . A love that . . . will make us delight in serving his poor, and his neglected little ones.' It's timely advice for the church in this land that she loved.

ST MARY MACKILLOP: MODEL OF FORGIVENESS

Forgiveness of some sort or another is a fundamental principle of Christian life. St Peter asks Jesus how many times must I forgive my brother, as many as seven times? Jesus will have none of this halfhearted forgiveness; it is seventyseven times which in effect was as often as one had been offended.

In an age where offence is taken very easily and skins have become rather thin, in an age where trigger warnings are in fashion and one cannot deviate from secular orthodoxy with the political correct crowd breathing down our necks, the subject of forgiveness often rears its head. If it's not some sports caster who's made an off comment or someone who's just been overheard in a restaurant, the season for forgiveness is something we're aware of but yet it is selectively displayed. Some people are readily forgiven, but others are not.

St Mary MacKillop was a firm believer in forgiveness, even of those who conspired against her. Despite having been excommunicated on charges that were unfounded, the saint didn't do a sit in at the bishop's office, she didn't go to the media, she didn't have a whinge, what did she do? She forgave, and did so from the bottom of her heart. In writing to her spiritual director she reflected on one of the most painful episodes of her life: Cont... "I really felt like one in a dream. I seemed not to realise the presence of the bishop and priests; I know I did not see them; but I felt, oh, such a love for their office, a love, a sort of reverence for the very sentence which I then knew was being in full force passed upon me. I do not know how to describe the feeling, but I was intensely happy and felt nearer to God than I had ever felt before. The sensation of the calm beautiful presence of God I shall never forget."

Despite being treated fairly shabbily by the powers that be, Mary MacKillop's resilience and the supernatural virtues of charity and patience which she no doubt prayed for during her time of persecution, came to the fore. This example of heroic fortitude under unjust treatment is one of the ways the good Lord tests his followers. St Mary was just doing what any ordinary Christian should do, bear wrongs patiently, seek to forgive rather than ask for an apology, pray for those who should know better. Following in her Lord's footsteps Mary, like Jesus, would say "Father, forgive them for they do not know what they are doing."

Reflecting on the patience and forebearing of our great Australian saint we may hold her in esteem for the great work she and her sisters did for those who were down and out, those in the outback, those who were on the margins, but her sanctity was most apparent in the way she conducted herself in her own spiritual life and in the way she lived the Christian life not just in its easy facets but in its darkness too.

Today let us ask St Mary of the Cross to pray for us especially when we are unjustly treated or when we wish to take offence, let us pray that we may have that spiritual resilience and firmly walk behind her as she in her stead followed Christ.

NEEDS OF THE PEOPLE

St Mary of the Cross is an Australian hero, and the readings celebrate that in important ways. The woman who gives food to Elijah trusted as St Mary did and gave everything in trust, even though it personally cost her a great deal.

VALUE OF EACH PERSON

Mary MacKillop, who famously told her sisters, 'Do not see a need and do nothing about it', was acutely conscious of the needs of the people about her – for basic education, for care, for food. She dedicated her life to doing something about those needs – heroically and most effectively. But inspiring it all and sustaining it all was the vision of God she learned from scriptural passages such as today's Gospel, projecting not just material help and opportunity, but the sense that each person is precious in God's eyes, is loved by God, and therefore is to be valued and given dignity.

The Second Reading (Colossians 3:12–17) precisely catches all the dimensions of the spirit in which Mary MacKillop would have us live. The conclusion, 'and never say or do anything except in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him' recalls

the Morning Offering, a traditional Catholic short prayer of consecration of the entire day – with all its activities – to God: 'O Jesus, through the most pure heart of Mary, grant that all the prayers, works, joys, and sufferings of this day, may be directed purely to the service and praise of your divine Majesty'.



SPECIAL PRAYERS
