- If you don't have the Check In CBR app you must provide your details to the church so they can check you in.
- Take personal responsibility for your own COVID safety.

Entrance Antiphon: Cf. Revelation 12:1

Let us all rejoice in the Lord, as we celebrate the feast day in honour of the Virgin Mary at whose Assumption the Angels rejoice and praise the Son of God.

FIRST READING

First Reading: Apocalypse 11:19,12:1-6,10

The sanctuary of God in heaven opened and the ark of the covenant could be seen inside it.

Now a great sign appeared in heaven: a woman, adorned with the sun, standing on the moon, and with the twelve stars on her head for a crown. She was pregnant, and in labour, crying aloud in the pangs of childbirth. 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PARADIGM OF THE SALVATION

The Feast of the Assumption marks the special place that Mary, chosen to be the Mother of Jesus, has in the life of the Church. The Catholic Church today celebrates that she was taken, body and soul, into heaven, when her life on earth was over.

The Assumption emerges from the Tradition to balance the otherwise male-oriented pattern emerging from Scripture. If in the risen Lord we see a male human person arrived at the fullness of human existence as intended by God, in Mary assumed into heaven we see female humanity arrived at that same fullness. The Spirit has stirred in the Tradition to restore the balance: 'male and female (God) created them' (Gen 1:27).

THE ASSUMPTION A FORETASTE OF HUMAN DESTINY

On the 15th August 1945, after years of conflict both in Europe and in the Pacific, Japan finally surrended to the Allied forces. This event was precipitated by the ethically problematic use of nuclear weapons on the two cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, interestingly two of the more Catholic cities in Japan (where Christianity is a distinct minority!).

This event by God's providence fell on the feast of the Assumption, the feast which highlights for us firstly the dignity of the Blessed Virgin Mary but also the nobility and destiny of the human person in general.

The actual dogma was proclaimed in 1950 in the aftermath of World War II as a sign of hope to all people of good will. The timing of this teaching, which by this stage had been assented to for centuries, providentially was made official Church teaching partially in response to the barbarism and inhumanity demonstrated throughout the war. One only need cast one's mind back to the concentrations camps of Auschwitz or Belsen, the indignity and brutality shown at Changi or the general brutality of war itself to realise that the world needed some good news.

And so it is the case then that the dogma of the Assumption teaches us the following:

[the] Immaculate Virgin, preserved free from all stain of original sin, when the course of her earthly life was finished, was taken up body and soul into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, so that

Cont...she might be the more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of sin and death (Catechism of the Catholic Church #966)

The reasoning behind this dogma rests on that other official teaching of the Church regarding Our Lady, namely her Immaculate Conception which itself teaches that the Blessed Virgin Mary in view of the redemptive merits of her Son was preserved from the stain of Original Sin and constituted from the very moment of her life as being in God's sanctifying grace. In other words, Our Lady from the very moment of her conception, was created without sin and placed always in right relationship with God. This understanding is crystallized for us in the words of the angel Gabriel to Mary "Hail full of Grace".

Characteristics of a being constituted in grace renders the individual sinless, more fully cognizant of God's ways, but also that the creature will not experience the corruption of the body after death. This is the situation regarding Our Lady, that even after death her body did not see the corruption of the grave but was raised by God in both her body and soul to enjoy heavenly glory.

The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin is not something Our Lady does of her own volition or power, rather it is something God does to her, which is very different from the Ascension of Jesus which is an action of Christ the God-man himself. Our Lady on the hand, because of her unique status as the Mother of God and one who is immaculately conceived, is granted the privilege of attaining heaven body and soul.

In her attainment of heaven with body and soul still fused in that intimate union all human persons are constituted, we too see our own destiny. As we saw a number of weeks ago in the feast of St Dominic the teaching of the Church regarding the body is a prominent aspect of our understanding of the human person, this understanding is reiterated in this feast. Because we confess the resurrection of the body in the Apostles' Creed we acknowledge first in the feast we celebrate today that eventually what has happened to the Blessed Mother will indeed be the destiny of all the faithful who are welcomed into heaven at the end of time.

The importance of Our Lady's bodily assumption into glory then ennobles and underlines the importance of bodily integrity and that the nature of the human person is as an ensouled body or an embodied soul. The body and soul are not two separate components that can happily live apart rather they are components which cannot really exist well apart from each other, they are made for each other and find their true purpose in bringing about the one entity namely the human person. Furthermore, the destiny of the human person is to exist in a glorified body fashioned after that of the Risen Lord, a body in which there will be harmony between spirit and flesh, soul and body.

Today as we commemorate the bodily assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary let us all see in this feast the destiny to which all of us are called. In this destiny the degradation of the human body as exemplified in war, torture, sickness and death is redeemed and transformed into the glory of the resurrected body a condition which manifests the triumph of God's will and the true purpose of human existence. What Our Lady shares in today we, by her prayers, will someday also enjoy.

Our Lady assumed into heaven, pray for us.

Failure keeps you humble, success keeps you glowing, but only faith and determination keeps you going.
