



THE ROCK ON WHICH THE CHURCH IS BUILT

In the Gospel Reading, Christ tells Peter that Peter is the rock on which Christ will found his church. And, Jesus promises, the gates of hell will not prevail against this rock or against the church built on it. This is a comforting thought, isn't it? In the darkness of the world, there is something—the apostle Peter, the Church—that evil cannot wreck! The problem is that it so often looks as if the gates of hell *have* prevailed against Christ's church.

The Church is not a collection of the sinless, and it was not meant to be.

Actually, the problem begins with Peter. The apostle, who was supposed to be the rock of the Church, betrayed the Lord he loved in his Lord's worst need. A betrayal like that seems to have something hellish about it, doesn't it?

As far as that goes, how does Peter differ from Judas? Judas betrayed Christ too, of course. In fact, the Gospel of John says that Satan entered into Judas before he went to the Pharisees to conspire with them to get Jesus (John 13:27). There is certainly something hellish about the treachery of Judas if Satan entered into him.

So why not think that the gates of hell prevailed against Peter too, in *his* betrayal of Christ? What is left of Jesus' promise that the gates of Hell will not prevail against Peter or against Christ's Church?

But notice that there *is* a difference between Judas and Peter. You might think the difference is that Peter repented and Judas didn't. But there you would be mistaken. The Gospel of Matthew makes it clear that Judas repented, too (Matthew 27:3).

So, here is the real difference between them. When Judas saw the sin of his betrayal for what it was, he killed himself. He threw himself away as hopeless, as irredeemable. But Peter came back to Christ. He cleaved to the Lord he loved even in the face of his own betrayal of him.

And that is why Peter is the rock on which the Church is founded. The Church is not a collection of the sinless, and it was not meant to be. The Church was founded on Peter, who loved, and sinned, and held on to the Lord anyway. The gates of Hell cannot prevail against this kind of love.

This is a deeply comforting thought.

A SAVING FAITH

Jesus is roving and curing people. An odd thing happens in each case. He tells them. "Your faith has saved you."

Quite obviously Jesus does the healing, or they wouldn't be asking for cures, so why does he say their faith did it? Why didn't he just say "Go in peace, I have healed you"?

Let us seek the answer in Sunday's Gospel. I will tell it as a storyteller might. Jesus is in Caesarea Philippi and the disciples are just back from their mission of preaching. He asks them who people think he is. Maybe he is measuring the faith-status of the regions who have heard of him. The disciples laugh boyishly and give answers they have heard. Here is an approximation of what they said: Believe it or not, some think you are John the Baptist returned from the dead! The ones I talked to said you were the prophet Elijah! It was hilarious! A few of them said you are Jeremiah or one of the other prophets! They just don't know what to make of you. Laughter all around.

Love given must also be love being received. But Jesus had thrown a curve ball, and now it crosses the plate. He says abruptly, "And what about you? Who do you say I am?" Eyes wander, laughter becomes coughs, feet scuff. The disciples' faith is still young and perhaps they are confused, not to mention the fact that they have never been required to profess anything out loud. Red faces.

Peter is bold (or maybe just enthusiastic). Figuratively, he is walking on water again. He stammers out a very good answer. "You ... you are ... the Christ, the ... the Son of ... You are the Christ, the Son of the living God!"

Silence. And then nods and relief all around.

"Simon, how great is your faith," Jesus replies. "Whatever you open with this faith will stay open. Whatever your faith shuts will remain shut, not only here but in heaven." A high compliment to Peter's tottering belief status.

But what does the story tell us? That Jesus is always seeking a two-way relationship between himself and other people, not just one-way. Look back and see it. He wants a mutual love-relationship, in which they open up their hearts and let the Godly lover in. Besides being a charismatic leader or a good friend, he is the very reality of God's love, present in the world, wide open to loving them. He wants them to relate to the fullness of who he is. The name of that openness to God's love on the part of the people is "faith." Maybe you see how this relates to our question from above, "Your faith has saved you"?

The people whom Jesus cured had at least a beginning relationship with him. Healing is at last able to take root because Jesus is never just acting on his own, like a mechanic replacing spark plugs: his cures are love being given. But love given must also be love being received. Otherwise love can't get in.

So, in fact, it is their faith (openness to God's love) that has in fact saved them. The healing power of Jesus could never get to them unless the openness named "faith" were not within them!

BREAK OPEN THE WORD

The innocent question Jesus puts to his disciples, "Who do people say the Son of Man is?" quickly becomes personal: "But you, who do you say I am?" It's a question that has haunted every generation, and it bothers us still. It's a question that we want to shy away form and yet find alluring: it both threatens and promises. Our lesser self is threatened by the decision it demands of us. We sense that we are being asked for a commitment. Our settled ways are in jeopardy. We might have to re-evaluate our beliefs and behaviours. We suspect that we may be called to let go of familiar things and venture into unknown territory. For all that, the question attracts us. It has an air of adventure about it, the promise of discovery. That promise centres on the person of Jesus. We are drawn to him. We find him endlessly fascinating. Our better selves know that we will find his company exhilarating. With him we discover the depths of our humanity, in him we see the face of God.
