

OFFER IT UP!



Many times when I was a child if something didn't go well or you felt sick my Dad would always roll out that Catholic saying "offer it up"! I never really knew what that meant, and even still it can be rather perplexing trying to explain what this saying was meant to convey.

The notion of redemptive suffering as a concept starts obviously with Jesus himself. Jesus' invitation to shoulder the Cross is an invitation to participate in his sufferings. Now first one might ask, how do I participate in the sufferings of Christ? I can't be Jesus, I can't imagine what he went through?

This line of thinking has its merits, ostensibly. Yet, we forget that we too are a part of the mystical body of Christ. Remember St Paul's journey to Damascus where he is, all of a sudden, hit with a bright light? After this incident Paul hears a voice which says:

"Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" And he said, "Who are you, Lord?" And he said, "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting;" Jesus does not say why are you persecuting my Church, but why do you afflict me? Acts 9:4-5 RSV

We see in this remarkable scenario Jesus identifying with those who were suffering for the faith. This piece of scripture, amongst others, reflects the notion that we are an extension of Christ's body and that the suffering of any Christian is really the suffering of Christ. If then we say Christ's own sufferings redeem humanity, save it, then by extension so can our sufferings assist in saving others, bringing them to God. Even St Paul got this message as we read in his letter to the Colossians:

"Now I rejoice in my sufferings for your sake, and in my flesh I complete what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of his body, that is, the church,"

Colossians 1:24 RSV

Keeping these ideas in mind we begin to understand that the offering up of our own weaknesses, sickness, difficulties are a participation in the redemptive suffering of Christ. It is as it were that in order to draw humanity closer to God, Christ uses our visible suffering and our acceptance of it as a means to edify and convert those around us who do not see any use in suffering.

When suffering lacks meaning the only way of treating it is to extinguish it. Sadly this has become a mindset amongst many, that when faced with pain or difficulty the only way is to end things.

Pope Benedict XVI, however, in his encyclical "Spe Salvi," affirms that it is not by avoiding or fleeing from suffering that we are healed, but rather by accepting it and finding meaning through union with Christ. Our capacity to accept suffering, mature through it, and find meaning in it is what allows us to participate in the redemptive value of Christ's suffering.

Today as we bravely accept Jesus' offer of the cross let us realise that our suffering can be united with Christ's suffering and participate in the redemptive work of salvation.


Cont.... By embracing suffering in the service of the Gospel, we can complete what is lacking in Christ's afflictions for the sake of the Church.
