

#### **GOSPEL**

Gospel: Matthew 18:15-20

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If your brother does something wrong, go and have it out with him alone, between your two selves. If he listens to you, you have won back your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you: the evidence of two or three witnesses is required to sustain any charge. But if he refuses to listen to these, report it to the community; and if he refuses to listen to the community, treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.

'I tell you solemnly, whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.

'I tell you solemnly once again, if two of you on earth agree to ask anything at all, it will be granted to you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.'

#### A CATECHESIS ON THE MASS

#### **Eucharistic Prayer**



Our little framework we mentioned last week gives us the fundamental meaning of the Eucharistic Prayer. The framework set out the following "at any meal in the home, there are three actions, so too when it comes to the Lord's Sacred Banquet as St Thomas Aquinas called it (Sacrum Convivium): we set the table, say grace and share the food." The Eucharistic

prayer is an extended grace whereby the food that we will receive is blessed and becomes the body, blood, soul and divinity of Jesus Christ.

We have already set the table during that part of the liturgy called the "Preparation of the Gifts": the altar has had placed on it the Corporal (a large square piece of cloth symbolic of the shroud in which Our Lord was bound in the tomb); placed on the corporal are the chalice a top which is placed the Pall (a small square of stiffened linen, or, of cardboard which protect the contents of the chalice, from debris or small insects), beside the Corporal is placed the Purificator a long strip of linen used to cleanse the chalice after communion and to wipe any of the Precious Blood if communion is distributed with the chalice.

With the **Prayer over the gifts** said, which thanks God for the gifts received and looks forward to the gifts becoming the Lord Jesus, the **Eucharistic Prayer** begins then in earnest, here is its structure:

both throughout history and in our lives, giving thanks to God for all these things. Often the Preface mentions something about the feast of the day, so it is variable as it narrates something about the saints we celebrate. The Preface may also reflect the event we are celebrating so for instance Marriage, Funerals and other Sacraments celebrated in the Liturgy (for example Confirmation) have a Preface that is either proper to it or that resonates with the celebration.

b. **The Sanctus**- In Western Christianity, the Sanctus forms part of the Ordinary (the unchangeable parts of the Mass which include The Kyrie (Lord Have Mercy) The Gloria in excelsis Deo, The Creed and the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God). The Sanctus is sung (or said) as the final words of the Preface of the Eucharistic Prayer. The preface, which alters according to the season, usually concludes with words describing the praise of the worshippers joining with the angels, who are pictured as praising God with the words of the Sanctus. The Sanctus reminds us that our liturgy is where heaven meets earth. It is worthwhile remembering that invisibly host of angels attend the Mass for as St John Chrysostom writes: "The angels surround the priest, the whole sanctuary and the space before the altar is filled with the heavenly Powers who come to honour Him who is present upon the altar."

#### c. The Eucharistic Prayer proper

Currently there are four main Eucharistic prayers in the Roman Liturgy. For over 1500 years there was only one known as the Roman Canon, now known as Eucharistic Prayer I. The rationale of the Eucharistic prayer is based on Jewish Meal prayers called 'Berakah'. Fr Roch Kereszty writes: "The solemn Eucharistic prayers of the Church have probably developed from the blessings said after festive Jewish meals. These prayers praise God the Creator and Savior of Israel, who gave Israel the land and the law; by reminding him of his mighty deeds in the past, they call upon his saving intervention in the present." d. Epiclesis: Within the Eucharistic prayer there is a special prayer invoking the Holy Spirit to come and change the humble elements of bread and wine and transform them into the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ. The word 'epiclesis' means to invoke or call upon and this is what we do in the Eucharistic prayer when we say for instance:

Therefore, O Lord, we humbly implore you: by the same Spirit graciously make holy these gifts we have brought to you for consecration, that they may become the Body and + Blood of your Son our Lord Jesus Christ, at whose command we celebrate these mysteries.

#### e. The Institutional Narrative

We come to the Liturgy of the Eucharist's crescendo when the priest utters the words of Christ himself at the Last Supper.

TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND EAT OF IT, FOR THIS IS MY BODY, WHICH WILL BE GIVEN UP FOR YOU.

TAKE THIS, ALL OF YOU, AND DRINK FROM IT, FOR THIS IS THE CHALICE OF MY BLOOD, THE BLOOD OF THE NEW AND ETERNAL COVENANT, WHICH WILL BE POURED OUT FOR YOU AND FOR MANY OR THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS.

DO THIS IN MEMORY OF ME.

With these sacred words the sacrifice of Christ is made present to us. Jesus utters these words before he is put to death and yet these words point not so much to what Jesus is actually doing at the Last Supper but what will happen to him on the next day at Calvary.

Cont... It is at this moment of the Mass that we realise that what is presented in ritual conveys that which happened 2000 years ago. Jesus invites us to be with his Mother, St John and the other faithful woman, at the foot of the cross. By these words Jesus reflects for us the importance of his death as it is really the triumph of life over death, of victory over sin and the opening of Heaven's gates.

We shall explore further next week the rest of the Eucharistic prayer.

#### A COMMUNITY OF MERCY

Twenty-Third Sunday of the Year. Fr Peter Harries OP preaches on forgiveness, the principal rule of the Christian Church.

Today's gospel passage gives us a warning. Some patterns of behaviour are wrong and cannot be tolerated within the community. If, after repeated warning, someone persists in some serious wrong, then they are to be treated like a pagan or a tax-collector — they are no longer to be treated as one of the Christian community. Such a person has failed in some serious way to love their neighbour, and has failed to repent. The gospel does not give us a comprehensive list of such serious wrongs. Each generation will reflect differently but sins of violence against others, and the systematic exploiting of other people will surely feature. So will sins of deliberately neglecting the needs of others for food, shelter or care. These are total failures to love our neighbour as oneself. In contrast let us orientate our life to love of God and love of neighbour, with the help of God's grace.
