

FIRST READING

First Reading Isaiah 5:1-7

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

Let me sing to my friend the song of his love for his vineyard. My friend has a vineyard on a fertile hillside. He dug the soil, cleared it of stones, and planted choice vines in it. In the middle he built a tower, he dug a press there too. He expected it to yield grapes, but sour grapes were all that it gave.

And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, I ask you to judge between my vineyard and me. What could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done? I expected it to yield grapes. Why did it yield sour grapes instead?

Very well, I will tell you what I am going to do to my vineyard: I will take away its hedge for it to be grazed on, and knock down its wall for it to be trampled on. I will lay it waste, unpruned, undug; overgrown by the briar and the thorn.

I will command the clouds to rain no rain on it. Yes, the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the House of Israel, and the men of Judah that chosen plant. He expected justice, but found bloodshed, integrity, but only a cry of distress.

Keep doing all the things that you learnt from me and have been taught by me and have heard or seen that I do. Then the God of peace will be with you.

GOSPEL

Gospel Matthew 21:33-43

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people: 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. "They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone. This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see?

'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'

THE COMMUNION RITE



Preparation for Holy Communion

While the people are saying or singing the Agnus Dei (Lamb of God), the priest bows low with hands joined on the altar, here he says one of two preparatory prayers before his Communion:

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God,
who, by the will of the Father
and the work of the Holy Spirit,
through your Death gave life to the world,
free me by this, your most holy Body and Blood,
from all my sins and from every evil;
keep me always faithful to your commandments,
and never let me be parted from you.

Or:

May the receiving of your Body and Blood,
Lord Jesus Christ,
not bring me to judgment and condemnation,
but through your loving mercy
be for me protection in mind and body
and a healing remedy.

I would like to explore for a moment the first prayer the "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God..." which recounts in a very brief manner the work of the Triune God in humanity's

Cont... salvation. It is indeed the Father's will that his Son exemplify true obedience in reparation for the disobedience of Adam. The new Adam, whose presence in this world is brought about by the power of the Holy Spirit, gives his life for humanity's, this substitution then enables humanity to once more embrace the 'life' it was meant to have but lost in Eden. The reception of the body and blood of the divine victim enables this saving story to become a part of the one who consumes the sacrifice. By receiving Jesus' body, blood, soul and divinity the human participant internalizes the saving action that has been celebrated throughout the liturgy. This prayer also teaches us that by reception of Holy Communion any minor or venial sins are washed away and true friendship and society with God is renewed.

Lastly by receiving Holy Communion we are asking for that friendship to be permanent, requesting from Jesus the graces to never be fully attracted to the glamour of this world but rather always joined to him. This last petition "keep me always faithful to your commandments, and never let me be parted from you" reminds us of two quotes from scripture which Jesus teaches:

"If you love me keep my commandments" (John 14:15, 21, 23)

"I am the vine and you are the branches. The one who remains in Me, and I in him, will bear much fruit. For apart from Me you can do nothing." (15:5-8)

The reception of Holy Communion should be a time when we consider these particular quotes from Holy Scripture. When we receive Jesus he wants us to become a part of him, in fact he wants us to become like him, and this likeness is achieved by the grace of the sacrament we receive. Moreover, we are invited to become from the many of us the one Christ and this is made concrete in receiving the one Lord Jesus in Holy Communion. Bread made from many grains of wheat becomes one loaf, hence we need to become one in Christ. Communion is the sacrament par excellence of unity. St Augustine when preaching on the Holy Eucharist taught the newly baptized, and in fact to all his Christian brothers and sisters, the following:

So why in bread? Let's not bring anything of our own to bear here, let's go on listening to the apostle himself, who said, when speaking of this sacrament, One bread, one body, we being many are (1 Cor 10:17). Understand and rejoice. Unity, truth, piety, love. One bread; what is this one bread? The one body which we, being many, are. Remember that bread is not made from one grain, but from many. When you were being exorcised, it's as though you were being ground. When you were baptized it's as though you were mixed into dough. When you received the fire of the Holy Spirit, it's as though you were baked. Be what you can see, and receive what you are.

In other words Augustine is exhorting us to become or imitate him whom we receive, that is an invitation to become truly a part of Christ.

God love you all. You're all in my prayers.

THE POWER OF CHRIST

Twenty-Seventh Sunday of the Year.
Fr John O'Connor preaches on the difference between true power and the abuse of power by the wicked tenants.
Today's Gospel is about, power and the abuse of power, "We must look within, at our own tendencies towards the abuse of power. It is so easy to shift the attention onto others, as though these issues are not part of our lives. They are. All our lives are littered with the consequences of this: a loss of ability to hear what others are saying to us, and a deafness to the voice of God in our lives."

REFELCTION

This week's readings remind us that the Lord of the vineyard is the God of hosts, the master of creation and the giver of all gifts. The texts invite us to reflect on the Lord's giving of such gifts and on our acceptance of them. We, the beneficiaries, are totally dependent on the one giving. And God gives to us too, so that we can respond in a way worthy of praise. As we read and ponder, we see that, sometimes, the gifts are met with unproductivity; at other times they are even misused. This week, let's pray that the God of peace, who has already promised to be with us, may find in us a 'noble' and 'virtuous' response.

A TRUE VINEYARD

The church is the vineyard of the Lord. It has been placed by God "on a fertile hillside; he spaded it, cleared it of stones, and planted the choicest vines." Unfortunately, what grows in this vineyard is often not a crop of grapes but wild fruit, of no use to the master. We have within our community a good share of selfishness, power grabbing, and short-sightedness. The very same social ills that we see in the world at large can be found right here within our own community: racism, sexism, economic injustice, and marginalization. We pray that God "forgive our failings." We hope that God will "take care of this vine, and protect what your right hand has planted." The challenge is for us to become a true vineyard of the Lord, free of all the sinful conditions that we lament in the world. We work for the day when Christians will form a Christian community united in love and service. Is it too much to hope for? No, it is not, as long as we maintain our faith in our God, who can "lead us to seek beyond our reach." Although the Catholic Church has been endowed with all divinely revealed truth and with all means of grace, her members fail to live by them with all the fervour they should.

As a result, the radiance of the Church's face shines less brightly in the eyes of our separated brethren and of the world at large, and the growth of God's kingdom is retarded. Every Catholic must therefore aim at Christian perfection and, each according to their station, play their part so that the Church ... may daily be more purified and renewed.


ADVENT
