THIS WEEK

The first week of November is an important week in the religious calendar. On 1 November, we celebrate the Feast of All Saints and on 2 November, we have the All Souls commemoration.

On Tuesday, 2 November, let us remember all our loved ones who have passed away, and especially pray for those who have died during the past 18 months as the COVID-19 pandemic has raged.

An event of global importance will occur during the first couple of weeks of November. From 31 October to 12 November, the 2021 United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP26) is being held in Glasgow, Scotland. We pray the world's political leaders will come together and commit to firm, ambitious and achievable targets in the quest to limit the effects of climate change.

SAINTS AND SOULS

This coming week we enter into the month of November, traditionally celebrated as the month of the Holy Souls.

But to kick November off we remember all those souls who've made it, who now experience that for which every human being was created, namely beatitude.

All Saints day reminds us that our



goal is heaven, nothing less. All Saints' day is also a commemoration of those the Church does not formally salute as saints. I'm sure there are plenty of holy women and men who did not have sufficient backing or interest through the formal channels for the Church to recognise them officially. All Saints' day is the day of the little saints whom nobody realised were living lives of heroic virtue. This is the mark of the saint though, one who doesn't blow their own trumpet or continuously provide miracles. The ordinary saint flies under the radar, their deeds only approved of by God himself.

All Souls' Day is, likewise, a joyful day though also tinged with sorrow because it is a day when we commemorate those who have not yet reached heaven but still know that that is where they are heading. More importantly All Souls' Day brings home to us the merciful doctrine of Purgatory which highlights the fact that many people leave this life with the unfinished business of holiness still needing to be addressed. By all means we should hope our loved ones are in heaven but because we are not God we are unaware of the true nature of their souls. "Nothing impure shall enter heaven" (Rev 21:27) the Book of Revelation teaches us, furthermore Jesus teaches that only the pure of heart shall see God (Mt 5:8). Purgatory's object is to purify the soul of all stain of sin, to take away that temporal punishment due to sin and to root out all tendencies toward sin so that the soul may only have place for God.

The celebration of All Souls' day likewise reflects the constant practice of the Church to pray for its dead, this practice has existed from the earliest days of the Church. Turning to early literary sources regarding prayer for the dead, we find evidence in the apocryphal

Cont..."Acta Joannis", composed about A.D. 160-170, that at that time anniversaries of the dead were commemorated by the application of the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass (Lipsius and Bonnet, "Acta Apost. Apocr.", I, 186). The same fact is witnessed by the "Canons of Hippolytus" (ed. Achelis, p. 106), by Tertullian (De Cor. Mil., iii, P.L., II, 79), and by many later writers. Tertullian also testifies to the regularity of the practice of praying privately for the dead (De Monogam., x, P.L., II, 942)" (https://www.catholic.com/encyclopedia/prayers-for-the-dead).

The month of November then, as usual will be a good time to offer a Mass for your loved ones and Fr Rafael and myself will only be too happy to accede to these wishes. November Mass Envelopes will be available in the foyer.

Lastly, on 3rd November is the feast of St Martin De Porres the wonder working cooperator brother of the Dominican Order. For many years we have had a small statue to St Martin in the corner at the Antill St side of the church. Recently a much larger picture of St Martin was found in the parish centre. The painting hung once in the cloister of the old Priory, now once more it has been hung again this time on the Philip Ave side of the Church. It is quite an imposing picture and I would exhort you to pray often for St Martin's intercession. St Martin once had a very strong devotional following, it would be worthwhile, once more, to re-acquaint ourselves with this humble saint, whose intercession is quite powerful.

As I write I am still in isolation but I shall be hopefully cleared by November 3rd to celebrate St Martin and inaugurate the new picture in our church.

THE HUMAN VOICE OF GOD

Thirty-First Sunday of the Year.
Fr Euan Marley OP preaches on the dialogue between God and humanity.

The voice of the Lord is something fearful in the Old Testament, as in the 29th Psalm, where the voice of the Lord strips the forest bare, and shakes the wilderness. Perhaps we could never have heard the voice of God without fear, still less could we look in his face. So in the Old Testament God has to speak increasingly through prophets, who themselves hear God through their own speech. As the Prophets struggle and ultimately fail to speak for God, the way is prepared for the coming of the Christ.

Jesus is truly the embodied voice of God. It is a voice that still inspires fear of a sort. The high priests and scribes are afraid of him because the people are astonished at his teaching. Yet it is a human voice, and as such a voice that can be treated with disrespect.

Far from hiding from this voice, the various parties that Mark speaks of come up to Jesus and try to silence him by their questions. These are questions which are asked not with a view to finding answers but with a view to avoiding answers. They ask him about his authority, try to trap him in regard to the question of paying taxes to the Romans, and the Sadducees seek to show the

Cont...impossibility of the Resurrection through a question about marriage.

In doing this, the opponents of Jesus damage their own speech. We can not force the truth out of others, but we can choose to speak the truth, just as we can choose to love, but not to be loved. Yet in speaking truth, we make it possible for the truth to



come to us. It is in giving that we receive and this is especially true of truth itself.

It is remarkable how many of the great sayings of the Gospel of Mark are not from Jesus himself but are drawn out from those who speak to Jesus. 'Lord, I believe, help my unbelief', 'Even the dogs under the table, eat from the children's crumbs.' When the scribe comes into the conversation, he not only asks a question but shows his willingness to speak of his own conviction, that these two commandments are greater than any sacrifice and holocaust.

So the voice of God has become flesh, and in doing so, part of the meaning of the incarnation is that from now on, all the truth of God will be spoken in dialogue with humanity, not in a monologue. In Jesus, we have heard the voice of God, and we are not afraid.

POPE FRANCIS

The Pope warns about viewing freedom as "doing what you want and what you like" which only leads to the realisation "that we are left with a great emptiness inside and that we have used badly the treasure of our freedom."

Pope Francis said Christians need to "rediscover the communitarian, not individualistic, dimension of freedom," especially in the wake of the coronavirus pandemic.

"The pandemic has taught us that we need each other, but it is not enough to know this," he said. "We need to choose it in a tangible way every day. Let us say and believe that others are not an obstacle to my freedom, but rather the possibility to fully realize it because our freedom is born from God's love and grows in charity."

AS LEAVEN WITHIN THE WORLD

The lay faithful 'are by baptism made one body with Christ and are constituted among the People of God; they are in their own way made sharers in the priestly, prophetical, and kingly functions of Christ; and they carry out for their own part the mission of the whole Christian people in the Church and in the world.

'What specifically characterizes the laity is their secular nature. They live in the world, that is, in each and in all of the secular professions and occupations. They live in the ordinary circumstances of family and social life, from which the very web of their existence is woven. They are called there by God that by exercising their proper function and led by the spirit of the Gospel they may work for the sanctification of the world from within as a leaven. In this way they may make Christ known to others, especially by the testimony of a life resplendent in faith, hope and charity.' Excerpts from Lumen Gentium
