

THE LITTLE THINGS...

Little things can be really important. On Wednesday the discovery of the little girl Cleo Smith, who had been abducted from a campsite in north -ern Western Australia eighteen days ago, brought a whole nation great relief and joy. One of the photos released by the Police show her in hospital beaming with a big smile and an ice cream, possibly oblivious



to the fact that a whole nation was anxious for her return to her grief stricken family. Although Cleo was small, she was a big deal.

Small things matter. This is the genius behind our gospel for this weekend. We encounter Jesus observing people putting in their contributions for the up keep of the Temple. Amongst the more ostensibly generous benefactors is a poor widow who gives two small coins, in the eyes of the world not a great deal, in fact almost nothing.

One commentator gives the full background to this small episode:

These little coins are called lepta, meaning 'light', hardly more than shavings of copper, hardly worth picking up.

Obviously this brief vignette evokes the fundamental intentions we have when we do anything for God. Do we give our all in the cause of the gospel, that is do we go over and beyond in our practice of our faith, or do we do the bare minimum? Is our charity meaningful or cursory? Is our prayer life scant, or when we do pray, do we do it in such a hurry that it becomes cold and insincere?

Our Lord, in observing the practice of this widow shows us that ordinary holiness is not son et lumiere (lights and sound) but meek, sincere, real, not dissimulated, pretentious or false. "Do not let your left hand know what your right is doing" Jesus teaches us. Our charity, our prayerfulness, our conduct must be sincere. It's not what we do but how we do it.

Speaking of little things, the real thinking behind our gospel this week is the simple little way of the Little

Cont...Flower, St Therese of Lisieux who realised that she wasn't called to magnificent missionary work like a Francis Xavier, nor was she called to pick the dying poor off the street like her fellow Theresa, Theresa of Calcutta, nor was she called to high ecclesiastical office. Her role, she discovered, was to love, and do all things, even the smallest things with great love of God.

This week let us try to follow this "little way", let us do even the most mundane of works with great love, care, and for the glory of God because small things do matter

PHYSICAL AND SPIRITUAL MALNUTRITION

'When Elijah confronted the widow, she was on the verge of accepting her death and the death of her son, because of malnutrition. How many thousands, even millions, of people in our world face the same slow death because we live in a world suffering from inequality, greed and self-ishness.

'Jesus drew the attention of his disciples to the action of the poor widow who had put in "more than all who have contributed to the treasury ... everything she possessed". She had done just as Jesus had advised the rich young man to do, who had sought his advice on how to inherit eternal life earlier in Mark's Gospel, by giving everything she possessed.

'Contrast with that his scathing condemnation of the Pharisees' hypocrisy of proclaiming to help the poor while "swallowing the property of widows".'

INEQUALITY

The Gospel passage for this Sunday in full is a two-parter. In Act I we see a religious and political system that is run by a few wealthy and powerful individuals in the culture. These are the entrepreneurs of the religious establishment, who "as a pretext" to fleecing the poor and the vulnerable "recite lengthy prayers" in show of their religious commitments and to paint the financial exchange as "of God."

Prior to witnessing the widow's offering, Jesus had been teaching his disciples about some systems of social inequity, of imbalance in the religious, political, and social structures of his day. This is not simply to contrast the wealthy with the poor, those who have a "surplus of wealth" from which they offer their gifts at the Temple versus those who have only their subsistence from which to draw. No, Jesus is painting a much starker picture that is, in effect, more about the wealthy scribes than it is about the poor, destitute widow.

Most absurdly, what Jesus observed in his day remains true today — those with the least continue to give more, by percentage of their resources, than the wealthy!

Jesus is *not* endorsing this behaviour, but blatantly naming it for what it is and challenging us to see the structures that allow this to continue. What can we do to make society and the our faith communities more equitable? Why do we let this continue to happen such that the poor give until it hurts and the wealthy seem to so often benefit from this self-defeat of the impoverished?

Hopefully this Sunday we don't miss the point of the widow's mite, but instead follow Jesus's line of thinking and make a difference in our world.

PARISH FINANCES

Over the past 11 weeks with the absence of weekend masses neither the Fathers nor the Parish have been able to receive any receipts using envelopes, the collection boxes or Tap & Go machines. Thankfully the Fathers and Parish did receive income from parishioners using electronic methods (Direct Debit, EFT, Credit Cards) to make contributions to both the Fathers' and Parish accounts. Thank you to those parishioners for their continued support.

Our largest loss of income was from those parishioners who could not use their envelopes to make their normal contribution due to the lack of Masses. If you have several weeks of contribution to make and to assist out counters please try to fit your contribution in as few envelopes as possible.
