He then said to them, 'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar - and to God what belongs to God.'

CATECHESIS ON THE MASS

The Priesthood of Christ



Over the last couple of weeks we've been looking at the form by which the sacrifice of Christ is offered. It is to be remembered when we understand the Mass that it is primarily the Sacrifice of Christ on the Cross made present really and truly by the ritual of the Mass. As we recall there are a number of ingredients that are inti-

mately associated with sacrifice-1) a visible (often precious) gift, 2) an act of sacrifice or ritual which visibly represents the invisible, inner sacrificial disposition of the priest and worshippers. 3) a sacrificing priest who is authorized to appear before God as the representative of the community; 4) the purpose of the sacrifice, which primarily consists in the recognition of the absolute sovereignty of God through adoration, thanksgiving and petition, and secondarily in reconciliation with God through atonement.

We have covered, so far in our analysis, the notion of a visible gift or oblation, this is Jesus Christ himself. Jesus is the divine victim the most precious gift that can be offered. Christ by virtue of his truly assumed humanity offers his own body and blood as the new Passover Lamb **"Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world"**. Just as the Passover Lambs of the Old Law represented God's mercy by sparing the inhabitants of those homes whose wooden lintels were covered in the Lambs' blood, the God-man's blood now pleads for mercy, forgiveness and reconciliation on the wood of the Cross.

The sacrifice of the cross then is played out for us ritually in the Mass. This is the second element of sacrifice we have now investigated by our thorough explanation of the Eucharistic Liturgy, its rites, gestures and structure. The Mass simply is the ritual which visibly represents the invisible, inner sacrificial disposition of the priest and worshippers.

We now come to an appreciation of the third element of sacrifice and that is the concept of priesthood.

Anthropologically the notion of priesthood obviously pre-dates Christianity, most sophisticated cultures entertained a priestly Cont... caste, tribe or college. Prior to a sophisticated take on priesthood every father of a household or every leader of a tribe acted as a priest. For most cultures' priests were the agents of sacred rites, custodians of the moral code, mediators between the god and the tribe, and the bearers of sacred knowledge. To some extent these characteristics are pertinent to the priesthood of Christ's Church too, the priest is a conductor of sacred rite, the guardian of the moral law, and the bearer of sacred knowledge.

The Christian understanding of the priesthood derives from Christ himself. Jesus Christ is the priest *par excellence*, he, as the *Letter to the Hebrews* teaches, is the Supreme High Priest of our religion (Hebrews 5). It is the priesthood of Christ then we shall explore in the coming weeks.

BEATING THE CRUNCH

In the paper the other day someone wrote about the current economic crash as a 'crisis of faith': we had believed in the money markets as our religion. We just thought that money would make money and money would buy happiness.

'The Pharisees are trying desperately to get rid of Him. If He says you can pay taxes to Caesar, then He's on the side of the hated Romans, whom they hoped the longed-for Messiah would free them from, so they can stir up the people against Him. But if He says not to pay Caesar, then He's guilty of treason and they can hand him straight over to the Romans.

'Jesus saw straight through this. And His answer was not just clever: it had a very basic message that we often forget: God is in control, not human beings. We don't need to try to manipulate God or others. If we are faithful to God, and work within our situation, He will do the rest.

'In these tougher times, we need to rely on God's providence. This is our opportunity to let go of the money religion, so that money becomes what it should be: a useful tool, not our master.' Excerpt from a homily by Dominic White OP

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

There was a young man who was desperately in need of a job. He asked God to help him find employment, and when he secured a job that paid \$10 a week, the young man was so overjoyed that he promised God that he would always give 10 percent of his income to the church. Now he was making \$100 a week, and he dutifully put \$10 in the plate each Sunday. Eventually, he earned \$1,000 a week, and while he still put \$100 in the plate, it had become a grudging duty.

Finally, he hit the big time -- earning \$10,000 a week. He could not bear the thought of putting \$1,000 into the plate each Sunday, so he sought out the pastor. "When I made that promise, I only earned \$10 a week," he said. "My promise made sense back then, but now things are different. Would you please release me from my promise to give 10% of my income to the church?"

The pastor thought about it for awhile and then replied, "My son, I cannot release you from a promise you made before God. But I would be happy to pray that your income be reduced back to the original \$10 a week!"

ANNE GRIEVE


