The Lord said to Moses, 'Tell the sons of Israel this, "You must not molest the stranger or oppress him, for you lived as strangers in the land of Egypt. Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: You must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'

THE PRIESTHOOD OF CHRIST

Christ the Priest in scripture



Gospel

To understand the person and work of Christ it is to the Gospels one may wish to go to first, however, there is one caveat and that is that these fundamental documents about Jesus do not explicitly refer to his priesthood. Fr Benedict Ashely OP, comments that there is no doubt the people of Jesus' day, and into the early church, saw Jesus as a prophetic figure and

as a kingly figure. Ashely goes on that Jesus "was not a 'priest' as Jews understood the term. He was not even an ordained rabbi. In the eyes of his contemporaries Jesus was just a layman." In fact, if one were to propose Christ's priesthood from the gospels alone one would be bitterly disappointed. Jesus' tribal grouping amongst the twelve tribes of Israel was the tribe of Judah, the tribe of King David, so Christ's royal lineage is certainly implied by this, priests however came from the tribe of Levi.

A parallel to the person of Christ is Moses, and yet we see Moses and Aaron, for instance, were drawn from that priestly clan (Ex 2:1). For further Old Testament evidence Psalm 99:6 also makes reference to Moses' sacerdotal character. Thus it is Moses, who having received a new covenant from God, bestowed a new priesthood on Aaron in order for him to minister to that new observance.

In chapter 40 of Exodus we see Moses wash and clothe Aaron and his sons Nadab, Abhiu, Eleazar and Ithamar. A clue, though, to Christ's priesthood is drawn then from this Old Testament reference for it is this same gesture Jesus does in the washing of the feet at the Last Supper, creating a new priesthood for a new covenant, the covenant in Christ's blood. Logically as well, based on that old scholastic axiom *nemo dat non quod habet*, you can't give what you don't have, it would seem absurd for Christ to bestow the priestly ministry on the twelve if he himself did not in some way possess a priestly nature. The power of the priesthood given to the twelve logically requires that same power to be in its cause, namely Christ; therefore, the priesthood of Christ is implied. Cont... It is to the Letter to the Hebrews we must call upon to assert Christ's priesthood from scripture. The crucial point of Hebrews is to claim Christ's priesthood not by virtue of physical descent or relation to a particular tribe but by virtue of who Christ is, and what he does. Christ's priestly mission is directly from God himself as Hebrews teaches:

"His vocation comes from God, as Aaron's did; nobody can take on himself such a privilege as this. 5 So it is with Christ. He did not raise himself to the dignity of the high priesthood; it was God that raised him to it, when he said, Thou art my Son, I have begotten thee this day,[2] 6 and so, elsewhere, Thou art a priest for ever, in the line of Melchisedech.[3] 7"

Christ's priesthood then is contingent on his sacred humanity, and like Melchizedek's priesthood, completely unrelated to inheritance or tribal affiliation. In his very being Christ is priest and victim, offerer and offered. Hebrews states the role of the priest is one "chosen from among his fellow men, and made a representative of men in their dealings with God, ... to offer gifts and sacrifices in expiation of their sins."(Heb 5:1-2) This function adequately describes the ministry of Christ in the world, he is one who has been chosen from among men to represent humankind to God and to offer up himself as the victim expiating the sins of humanity.

From scripture then there is no doubt that Christ's priesthood is actually a major theological theme when it comes to exploring and indeed explaining Christ's person and work. Jesus' entire life was one priestly act, made concrete in his offering of himself as a perfect victim upon the altar of the Cross.

LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOUR

Love of neighbour has been an essential part of our Covid-19 response. As we wear our masks, obey government rules and defer individual wants to the needs of the all, we show our care and commitment to our neighbour.

In his encyclical, *Fratelli Tutti*, Pope Francis says that God willing, after the pandemic 'we will think no longer in terms of "them" and "those", but only "us". . . . If only this immense sorrow may not prove useless, but enable us to take a step forward towards a new style of life. If only we might rediscover once for all that we need one another.'

In the end, as Jesus says, the greatest commandment is: 'you

must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind ... [and] the second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself.' Lord we pray for your help



in keeping these, the greatest commandments.

The theme uniting today's readings, the unity between the love of God and love of neighbour, goes to the heart of the Christian religion. It seems that the two commandments, existing separately in the Old Testament (see Deut 6:4-5 and Lev 19:18), were brought together by Jesus. But in uniting them he drew directly on the tradition of his people where all commandments regulating behaviour towards others were enclosed within the overall covenant commitment to God. THE LAST QUESTION?

Packed away in this short scene is the unpalatable truth that we too must take up our crosses if we are to love, forgive, heal, and so worship God in spirit and in truth. We can expect scorn and even persecution because that's what love sets off in those who hold and abuse power. In which case, we can see again why this last question put to Christ leads to his questioning of the Pharisees. If we are really in the business of loving God and neighbour, we shall need the power and victory of the Messiah. It is not enough to have a humanistic ethic. The 'great and the good' in our secular materialistic society grossly under-estimate the forces of evil which confront us. We depend on God's grace in history, the power of the Messiah at work in our lives, and in the Church, through the inspiration of the Holy Spirit; we shall ultimately need His judgement and vindication of the martyrs.

LOVING ONE ANOTHER, WITHOUT EXCEPTION

'Love your enemies', these words were addressed to a people whose traditions urged them to care for their own; but saw no place for good will and generosity to foreigners in general whom they looked upon as rivals and enemies. Old Israel had been taken into covenant with the living God, shown in the Exodus to be the champion of the poor and oppressed. Through the covenant they were called to identify with the ways of God. In fact, their traditions - as today's reading from the book of Exodus makes clear - were remarkable compared with the outlook of other peoples of their time. As they began to learn what identification with God's ways involved; they recognised that they must care for the powerless - the poor, widows and orphans, the strangers who had settled among them. But they still had much to learn - their good will was not extended to all of God's children without exception. In advocating this as the ideal as his New Law of love, Jesus was not abolishing the old Law, but bringing it to 'fulfilment'. The ideal held up by Jesus as the fulfilment of the Law was clear: 'I say this to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you; so that you will be children of your Father in heaven' (Mt 5:44).

THE LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

Belle Joseph will be giving a talk **The Light in the Darkness: Suffering, Poetry and Faith in the Nazi Concentration Camps** in the Parish Centre on Sunday 22 November at 3pm. The talk to go for 20-30 minutes, and another 20-30 minutes for questions. The talk will be followed by refreshments.

Description: Seventy-five years after the liberation of prisoners from the Nazi concentration camps, the stories of camp survivors are still well known. Yet few people are familiar with the poems that a number of prisoners wrote in the camps. In poetry, these prisoners not only expressed their fears, desires, pain, and consolations, but they also found meaning in their traumatic experiences. For some Catholics in the camps, poetry became a way of discerning the presence of God in their ordeal. In this presentation, Belle Joseph will share the story of some of the French Catholic prisoner-poets and discuss what their lives and their poetry can tell us today about discovering the light of Christ in times of suffering.

Belle studied French at ANU and taught French there between 2010 and 2018. Her doctorate, completed in 2017, investigated the French poetry written in concentration camps during the Second World War.
