

For those of us in places where COVID-19 restrictions are lifting, there is enjoyment and trepidation. In fact, it can be quite difficult to go back to dealing with crowds, as well as managing expectations as things open up slower than desired. This week, as the scripture reflection emphasises, let us keep the Lord in our sight and be living signs of Christ's love and forgiveness as we once again start to move about more.

THE END TIMES

To be frank there's nothing like a good end of the world prediction! The reason is most predictions about the world's demise usually amount to nothing. Our Lord alludes to this point today, not even he in his human nature knew when all things would pass, so its highly unlikely that I or some other preacher can give you the day or



the hour. More strikingly though our dire gospel reading today reminds us that this world is not forever, it is transitory, material and therefore prone to decay.

This outlook is not meant to depress us, though it may, but rather to draw our attention to the fact that despite our best efforts at trying to stop global warming, or climate change, or whatever, the universe as we know it will come to a conclusion. We cannot stop this and we do not know when this state of affairs will occur.

Crucial to our own lives though is the more imminent demise of our own human reality. November is traditionally the month where we consider our own mortality as we commemorate the feasts of All Saints and All Souls. We start this month of November not considering our own terrestrial terrors such as melting glaciers or reduced numbers of polar bears but rather we look beyond the horizon of our present reality. The fact for us is that we will one day face God, our supreme judge. This reality is something we confess every Sunday "He [Christ] will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead". Jesus foretells this state of affairs in the gospel too:

And then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory;

Jesus' exhortation to us though is to have faith and hope. In the passages prior to our gospel selection for today Jesus points out that there will be numerous false Christs and false prophets "who will rise up and shew signs and wonders, so that, if it were possible, even the elect would be deceived. 23 But you must be on your guard; hereby, I have given you warning of it all." What this amounts to is that no human authority nor even any created spiritual reality can provide the universal panacea to world problems and if the recent meeting in Glasgow was anything to go by we haven't come close to any real global solutions, perhaps we are fine for now! Yet, Our Lord's words strike at the very heart of our present crises, and the one's in the future, and that is that our global problems cannot be definitively solved by humanity. Yes, humanity is ingenious, adaptable and capable but because ultimately all things are tending towards consummation in the final coming of Christ it is only, in the final analysis, Jesus Christ who will be the solution to our ills. This does not let us off the hook, indeed we do need to find solutions about our current crises but we also need to realise there is a bigger game at play and that is a supernatural one. In his letter to the Ephesians St Paul outlines the real cosmic battle which surrounds us:

> Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his might. 11 Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles

Cont...of the devil. 12 For we are not contending against flesh and blood, but against the principalities, against the powers, against the world rulers of this present darkness, against the spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places. 13 Therefore take the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand. 14 Stand therefore, having girded your loins with truth, and having put on the breastplate of righteousness, 15 and having shod your feet with the equipment of the gospel of peace; 16 besides all these, taking the shield of faith, with which you can guench all the flaming darts of the evil one. 17 And take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. 18 Pray at all times in the Spirit, with all prayer and supplication. To that end keep alert with all perseverance, making supplication for all the saints,

The cosmic battle which confronts us, the supernatural conflict that seeks possession of our souls is indeed the true crisis. Whilst we may be dismayed and distracted by the affairs of our world, as Christians, we cannot boil everything down to a purely naturalistic base. Salvation is not deliverance from the evils we have created in our exploitation of the natural world but rather salvation is the deliverance from those imbedded tendencies towards selfishness and greed which have led to our destroying of our God given home. It is not so much about whether we didn't dispose of our rubbish correctly or whether we threw our cigarette butt out the window, it is the disposition towards apathy and disregard; it is on these characteristics we will be judged.

One may posit then that our current crises as we well know are created not just by practices that we see as normal these are merely symptoms of sick spiritual dispositions. Sin is pollutive.

As we contemplate then the end of time and the things that accompany it let us be mindful of our own greed, self-centeredness and apathy. Let us realise that the true cause of our ills are not external but rather internal. May the Lord Jesus exorcise the selfishness from our own hearts so that we may be truly vigilant for his return and aware that no one other than Jesus Christ can save us.
