When some were talking about the Temple, remarking how it was adorned with fine stonework and votive offerings, Jesus said, 'All these things you are staring at now – the time will come when not a single stone will be left on another: everything will be destroyed.' And they put to him this question: 'Master,' they said 'when will this happen, then, and what sign will there be that this is about to take place?'

'Take care not to be deceived,' he said 'because many will come using my name and saying, "I am he" and, "The time is near at hand." Refuse to join them. And when you hear of wars and revolutions, do not be frightened, for this is something that must happen but the end is not so soon.' Then he said to them, 'Nation will fight against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there; there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name – and that will be your opportunity to bear witness. Keep this carefully in mind: you are not to prepare your defence, because I myself shall give you an eloquence and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and brothers, relations and friends; and some of you will be put to death. You will be hated by all men on account of my name, but not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives.'

SCIENCE & CLIMATE CHANGE

On 10 November the UN World Science Day for Peace and Development is commemorated. The day highlights the significant role of science in society and the need to engage the wider public in debates on emerging scientific issues. Consider the paradox that while scientific advances and technology are beneficial in solving problems they can create new issues or exacerbate existing problems. Science needs for us to always put others at the heart of our decision making. While 'we still look to science for discoveries and technologies that will limit climate change [...] we recognise now that we need a change of heart and change of priorities at every level if we are to limit the damage that suffered, and we as part of it.'

We pray for all those who have been affected by flooding and other natural disasters.

YOUR ENDURANCE WILL WIN YOU YOUR LIVES.

The end of the world is nigh! This is what all of our readings would have us believe this week. As we know though there have been prophets of doom popping up all over history, all, so far, have been proved wrong. Yet, despite the fact that these dire predictions have yet to bear fruit we cannot summarily dismiss the fundamental claim that the universe as we know it is limited, is material and therefore corruptible, and that we have the Word of God warning us that all things must end.

The writings of the prophet Malachi, or as the text also calls him merely a 'messenger' of God, were penned around 515BC. Israel was still dominated by the Persian Empire, which was really auite liberal in terms of how the Jews conducted themselves. Nevertheless within the Israelite milieu there was the hope of some final resolution for the Jewish people. There was the hope that one day they would be free and on the path to self determination. More importantly Malachi talks about a future event mysteriously known to Old Testament scribes simply as the 'Day of the Lord', it is this future event which would effect a final resolution to Israel's woes. We note that despite the rather chilling vibe Malachi's oracle of disaster entails the prophet concludes his vision with an air of hope for those who are faithful to God: 'But for you who fear my name, the sun of righteousness will shine out with healing in its rays'. This conclusion teaches us that it is reverence for God and his commandments that will grant us endurance when the final test for humanity arises.

Paul in his second epistle to the Thessalonians advise them to not be in too much of hurry to pack their bags for heaven. Paul's concern is contrary to Malachi's, and a little more sobering. Earlier on Paul has had to warn the Thessalonians that the end of the world is something that is sudden, unseen and like a "thief in the night". By all means be prepared, he advises them, but don't put your lives on hold waiting for it to happen! Paul's balanced advice is good news for us in that we should not be anxious about such things. If we are truly trying to live good lives in response to God's word and the teachings of the faith this will be our protection against woe.

Lastly, the Gospel for this week details a prophecy by Jesus concerning the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem. The importance of the Temple was second to none for the devout Jew. For the Chosen People this was literally the place of God's presence on earth and it was the holiest site in the world. However, the Temple had been destroyed before by the Babylonians in 587 BC this was the Temple built by King Solomon. When the Jews were in the thrall of the Persians, who had defeated the Babylonians, Cyrus King of the Persians allowed the Jews to rebuild the Temple, this reconstruction is narrated in the Old Testament books of Ezra and Nehemiah. The Temple Jesus knew was this Second Temple, and it too would meet the same fate as it's predecessor. Jesus' prophecy came true in 70 AD when the Roman military under the general Titus besieged Jerusalem and burnt the Temple and its environs with fire. This military incursion was initiated by ongoing unrest in Jerusalem particularly over heavy taxation.

Jesus' prophecy however underlines that no matter how safe we feel or no matter how secure we may be there will be trials sent to us to determine our fidelity to God. Jesus predictions include environmental disaster

"There will be great earthquakes and plagues and famines here and there; there will be fearful sights and great signs from heaven." Cont...The Lord also warns of false messiahs. Meaning that no human agency can truly stop what will happen, and no human knows for sure when the end will come:

'Take care not to be deceived,' ... because many will come using my name and saying, "I am he" and, "The time is near at hand."

A final, and perhaps, more dire prediction is that to be a Christian will entail persecution, ostracisation and trial.

'But before all this happens, men will seize you and persecute you; they will hand you over to the synagogues and to imprisonment, and bring you before kings and governors because of my name – and that will be your opportunity to bear witness.

In the context of St Luke's gospel Jesus' predictions were becoming apparent, indeed many early Christians did suffer for their beliefs. Nevertheless, even in our own time Christian beliefs are under attack on a variety of fronts. To be a Christian is seen now to be, or an object of scorn. Often Christian views in areas of human life, marriage and family, and even the nature of the human person are ridiculed or seen as "dangerous"; Yet we're supposed to live in a pluralistic democracy where officially there is "freedom" of religion.

As we see off this liturgical year let us be mindful that indeed the world we live in is fragile, corruptible and set for a cosmic conclusion, but may Jesus' own words be our hope:

Your endurance will win you your lives.
