

# COMMENTARY

Today the Church's liturgical year comes to a close with the feast of Christ the King – for many, doubtless, an anachronistic and alien image.

The early generations of believers probably faced much the same problem. The idea of Christ as King, which was inevitably bound up with recognition of him as the Jewish Messiah, had overtones of power and domination that must have seemed incongruous in view of what they believed concerning Jesus. They too had to reclaim and remint the idea of kingship before it could be appropriately applied to him. This is in fact what we see happening in the extract from the Fourth Gospel's presentation of the trial before Pilate, which forms the Gospel for today.

Jesus' whole life has been a revelation, defence and witness to 'truth' in this sense. Now he is on trial for it – as countless others, down to and including our time, will be on trial in the same cause. Pilate may have the physical power of Rome behind him. Jesus has the allegiance of all who seek the truth. They will suffer for bearing witness to it, as he did. Today's feast asserts that they who have shared his witness will share his victory as well.

## **AN UNEARTHLY KING**

Man has always tried to build utopia; heaven on earth. Whether it be through the class warfare and revolution of the Socialist, or the dream life founded on the gamble of the stock market - that sacrament of Capitalism, humanity has desperately grasped for Eden.



The issue at stake is when one jettisons God as the foundation of all human activity, an inevitable vacuum ensues and it is these rather shoddy substitutes that seem to fill the void.

There is only one society for which all human persons are made and that is the kingdom of Christ. From the very moment of his conception Jesus Christ was proclaimed a king. When the angel announced his coming to the Blessed Virgin he pronounced the following:

#### And behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and shalt bear a son, and shalt call him Jesus... the Lord God will give him the throne of his father David...; his kingdom shall never have an end. (Luke 1:31-33)

Yet Jesus was no earthly king. Despite his assumption of David's throne this empire was not to be circumscribed by borders, patrolled by armies or developed by conquest. Rather this empire is one which is found within the hearts and minds of its subjects, those stamped with the name of Christian.

When asked by the crowds where the kingdom of God was Jesus taught:

#### "The kingdom of God is not coming with signs to be observed; nor will they say, 'Lo, here it is!' or 'There!' for behold, the kingdom of God is in the midst of you." (Luke 17:20-21)

In theology-speak it is Jesus who is the kingdom, and it is through baptism, and the participation in the other sacraments, primarily the sacrament of the Eucharist, that Jesus establishes his kingdom. The Kingdom of God is among us here today!!!

As members of his kingdom however we are commissioned to be its agents too, that is, to remind men that there is only one ruler of society and that is Jesus Christ. The Church founded by Christ then is called to act as the agent of Christ's empire and to enter into the secular realm, the public square. *Lumen Gentium*, the Vatican II document on the Church, teaches this mindset when it says particularly of the laity:

> They live in the world... in the ordinary circumstances of family and social life, from which the very web of their existence is woven. They are called there by God that by exercising their proper function and led by the spirit of the Gospel they may work for the sanctification of the world ...In this way they may make Christ known to others (Lumen Gentium #31)

The furthering of Christ's kingdom in part depends on all of us, if we indeed are truly convinced as subjects of

Cont...Christ. This then is the point of our feast, a rededication to Christ's kingdom. We need to remind ourselves daily of the kingdom's etiquette. In this examination of conscience, do we see ourselves as conforming to the world and its delights, its easiness, its path away from the true and the good or do we "**put on the put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation**" (1 Thessalonians 5:7-8).

A constant reminder for us is Jesus' final dialogue with Pilate. When asked whether he was a king Jesus replied "my kingdom is not of this world" (Jn 18:36) The kingdom of Christ is an altogether different regime from the dominions of men and we need to be familiar with it so as to be its agents. The preface of our Mass todays sums up this otherworldly kingdom:

#### a kingdom of holiness and grace, a kingdom of justice, love and peace

The kingdom of Christ is a kingdom of holiness. Are we striving for holiness in our daily life? The Kingdom of Christ concerns grace - do we seek out the graces God can give us through the sacraments and prayer, do we notice those moments of grace that are offered to us but we have refused? These graces may be the opportunity for a daily Mass or some time offered for prayer or an opportunity to assist someone in need.

If we are to be agents of Christ's kingdom let us first seek whether his Kingdom is in us so that then when we are convinced of our own subjection to Christ we can then spread his kingdom to those who need it most. Only then can we, by God's grace, achieve the Utopia for which we truly desire - the Kingdom of God.

# A DEEP TRUTH ABOUT OUR LIVES

'In the meeting of Pilate and Jesus, we have the encounter of the representative of Imperial Rome with Christ the Universal King. To speak of Christ as Universal King is, among many other things, to be reminded that while there is a kind of kingship that is built on power and domination, true kingship, that of Christ, is not like that.

'So the Feast of Christ as Universal King is a reminder of a deep truth about our lives, about where true happiness is to be found and where it is not to be found. When Christ says that his kingdom is not of this world, he is not only telling us that to put our trust in power and domination is emptiness and folly, he is also presenting us with an alternative. The alternative is love. 'If we reflect on what true victory and power really are, as revealed in the loving Kingship of Christ, we can see that there is a kind of victory that makes such complete sense that we might well wonder why we so often fail to see it.' ## **RULERS OF THE KINGS OF THE EARTH**

'Jesus does not deny being a king but this designation is not enough. He does not want to be limited to a kingship of this world. This is the sort of kingship seen throughout world history; it thrives on self-serving ambition, despises weakness and exalts the power of the nationalistic superman.

"Yes I am a king, I was born for this to bear witness to

Cont...the truth and all who are on the side of truth listen to my word." But Pilate refuses this truth. With the high priests he embodies the corruption of worldly government.

'In the midst of this hostile world Jesus bears witness to God's kingdom. And what do we see? A man mocked as a king, crowned with thorns, arrayed in a purple cloak and then finally lifted up on to the throne of the cross. The pretensions of worldly kingship are mocked but as the crucified Christ reigns from the cross he reveals the self-giving love of God and it possesses a power which can draw all men and women into his kingdom. In fact, on the cross his kingship is universally proclaimed in Hebrew, Latin and Greek.'
