#### Gospel - Luke 23:35-43

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

The people stayed there before the cross watching Jesus. As for the leaders, they jeered at him. 'He saved others,' they said 'let him save himself if he is the Christ of God, the Chosen One.' The soldiers mocked him too, and when they approached to offer vinegar they said, 'If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself.' Above him there was an inscription: 'This is the King of the Jews.'

One of the criminals hanging there abused him. 'Are you not the Christ?' he said. 'Save yourself and us as well.' But the other spoke up and rebuked him. 'Have you no fear of God at all?' he said. 'You got the same sentence as he did, but in our case we deserved it: we are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong. Jesus,' he said 'remember me when you come into your kingdom.' 'Indeed, I promise you,' he replied 'today you will be with me in paradise.'

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#### **CHRIST THE KING**

On 24 November the feast for Andrew Dung Lac and Companions commemorates more than 100 Catholic martyrs killed in Vietnam over a period of three centuries. The lives and deaths of the martyrs testify to the power and inspiration of Christ who submitted to death for our salvation. It is fitting this commemoration feast occurs close to the Feast of Christ the King, which does not shrink from bringing out the paradox involved in claiming the Crucified One as 'King'.

Luke's Gospel for the Feast of Christ the King (23:35-43) tells of the two criminals who are crucified on either side of Jesus. One abuses Christ while the other asks Jesus to 'remember me when you come into your kingdom'. Jesus' response to the penitent thief displays his kingship by shepherding the most marginalised one, 'assuring him of inclusion in the community of the saved. To do so, innocent though he is, Jesus has come down to this extraordinary degree of degradation and suffering in order to be truly alongside him.'

This week we pray in gratitude for Jesus' accompaniment on our journey to the Father.

#### THE INCLUSIVE REIGN OF CHRIST

In the aftermath of Queen Elizabeth's departure from this life and the accession of Charles III as King of Great Britain the subject of monarchy has been very much on the minds of us all in these recent months.

For many the concept of monarchy seems quite natural but for others it is merely tyranny, how can all power be invested in one person? We in a more egalitarian and democratic Australia perhaps view monarchy with a healthy cynicism which indeed we also give to our politicians. But can we be so cynical about the kingship of Christ?

The short answer is, we cannot. Aside from all human methods of governance, God's method of governing is at once monarchical and far from democratic. There will be no parliament in heaven, there will be no voting, no politicians. God will be sovereign and that is simply a fact by virtue, not of arrogance, but by virtue of essence. Since God simply <u>is</u> all that is true, good, beautiful and just, there can be no equal; or can there be some kind of divine twist here?

Hidden within the kingship we celebrate today is the divine condescension. The lowering of the Godhead into the real milieu of the human. Christ is king of this world not simply as God but also by virtue of his human family. Jesus was born into the royal tribe of Judah, the tribe of King David, the man found to be after God's heart. Jesus' ancestry as mapped out by St Matthew in his impressive genealogy notes that Jesus' is a claimant to the Davidic throne. Indeed St Luke makes this an element of the angel's message to Our Lady when he says:

"And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High; and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there will be no end."" Luke 1:32-33 RSV

Again we see elsewhere in St Luke's gospel that Our Lady is referred to by her cousin Elizabeth with a strange title:

"And why is this granted me, that the mother of my Lord should come to me?" Luke 1:43 RSV

This title is charged with great queenly significance. In the royal court language of the ancient Near East, the title "Mother of my Lord" was used to address the queen mother of the reigning king (who himself was addressed as "my Lord"; cf., 2 Sam. 24:21). Thus with this title Elizabeth is recognizing the great dignity of Mary's role as the royal mother of the king, Jesus.

However when Jesus stands before Pilate a curious revelation is made concerning Christ's kingdom. Pilate is anxious to know who Jesus is and what he has done, even going so far as to find out whether indeed he was a king.

Are you the King of the Jews?"?...Jesus answered, "My kingship is not of this world; if my kingship were of this world, my servants would fight, that I might not be handed over to the Jews; but my kingship is not from the world." Pilate said to him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. John 18:33-37 RSV

Jesus tells Pilate that his kingdom is not from the world. It is this curious revelation that unlocks our understanding of Christ's kingship. Rather than follow the traits of all Cont...earthly kings, who've for the most part, lorded it over people, Christ's kingship paradoxically is non violent, certainly not militaristic and not interested in power. Rather justice, love, truth and peace are central to Jesus' regime. This is the first acme of Christ's kingship not being mundane.

The second marker of Christ's unworldly kingship is that it is remarkably inclusive. By virtue of our baptismal consecration each individual Christian is conformed to Christ as priest, prophet and king. This inclusion in Christ's kingship rests on us being co-heirs with Christ in all that Jesus has merited for us by his suffering, death and resurrection.

St Paul in his letter to the Romans writes:

And if we are children, then we are heirs: heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ--if indeed we suffer with Him, so that we may also be glorified with Him.

Later on Paul teaches Timothy the fruits of this co-heirship

11<u>This is a trustworthy saying: If we died with Him, we will</u> <u>also live with Him;</u> 12if we endure, we will also reign with Him; (2Tim 2:11)

This spiritual inheritance of co-reigning in Christ's kingdom is likewise corroborated in the Book of Revelation which teaches the following:

#### 21<u>To the one who overcomes, I will grant the right to</u> sit with <u>Me on Mythrone, just as I overcame and sat</u> <u>down with My Father on His throne.</u>

As we ponder Christs unique kingship, let us keep in mind that it is the throne of heaven to which all are invited. All of us are called to reign with Christ in his everlasting kingdom, each of us then are spiritual princes and princesses, but fundamentally it is our sonship of God that grants us these privileges. Today then by God's grace may we realise once more our supreme dignity through our baptism. May we be found worthy to enter fully into the kingship with which we were invested on the day of that baptism so we may indeed live and reign with the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, forever and ever. Amen

#### **REMOVING THE EXEMPTION**

#### Dear friends in Christ,

You will be aware that during the COYID-19 pandemic period this Archdiocese did not require us to attend Church. This was an extraordinary measure for our health and wellbeing. Given the facts of the new situation regarding the pandemic, I am lifting the exemption from obligation to worship God at Mass on Sundays from the First Sunday of Advent, 27 November 2022.

Clearly, this obligation does not bind those who have serious health concerns, or who are physically or morally prevented from attending Mass.

Indeed, I ask you to remain at home, if you are feeling unwell, have cold or flu symptoms, or believe you pose a risk to the health of others.

As Catholics we believe that Jesus is present with us in a very special way when we gather as a community in prayer and action, walking together in our faith and celebration. We attend Mass because Jesus feeds us in Word and Sacrament. An obligation to attend Mass is present to support and encourage us all to gather for the Eucharist, "the source and summit" of our entire Christian lives. We need each other's prayers at Mass, especially to support those struggling in life.

We appear to be coming to an end of this long and, for so many, most terrifying time. We reflect on all we have experienced. We pray for each other, especially for those who continue to suffer in any way from the COYID -19 pandemic.

As we prepare for the Christmas Season of joy, let us continue our "Walking Together" into this penitential season of ADVENT in repentant and joyful HOPE for the coming of the Saviour at Bethlehem.
