#### FIRST READING

#### First Reading: Wisdom 6:12-16

A reading from the book of Wisdom

Wisdom is bright, and does not grow dim. By those who love her she is readily seen, and found by those who look for her. Quick to anticipate those who desire her, she makes herself known to them. Watch for her early and you will have no trouble; you will find her sitting at your gates.

Even to think about her is understanding fully grown; be on the alert for her and anxiety will quickly leave you. She herself walks about looking for those who are worthy of her and graciously shows herself to them as they go, in every thought of theirs coming to meet them.

#### SECOND READING

#### Second Reading: 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians

We want you to be quite certain, brothers, about those who have died, to make sure that you do not grieve about them, like the other people who have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again, and that it will be the same for those who have died in Jesus: God will bring them with him. We can tell you this from the Lord's own teaching, that any of us who are left alive until the Lord's coming will not have any advantage over those who have died. At the trumpet of God, the voice of the archangel will call out the command and the Lord himself will come down from heaven; those who have died in Christ will be the first to rise, and then those of us who are still alive will be taken up in the clouds, together with them, to meet the Lord in the air. So we shall stay with the Lord for ever. With such thoughts as these you should comfort one another.

#### GOSPEL

#### Gospel: Matthew 25:1-13

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus told this parable to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven will be like this: Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish and five were sensible: the foolish ones did take their lamps, but they brought no oil, whereas the sensible ones took flasks of oil as well as their lamps. The bridegroom was late, and they all grew drowsy and fell asleep. But at midnight there was a cry, "The bridegroom is here! Go out and meet him." At this, all those bridesmaids woke up and trimmed their lamps, and the foolish ones said to the sensible ones, "Give us some of your oil: our lamps are going out." But they replied, "There may not be enough for us and for you; you had better go to those who sell it and buy some for yourselves." They had gone off to buy it when the bridegroom arrived. Those who were ready went in with him to the wedding hall and the door was closed. The other bridesmaids arrived later. "Lord, Lord," they said, "open the door for us." But he replied, "I tell you solemnly, I do not know you." So stay awake, because you do not know either the day or the hour.'

#### THE PRIESTHOOD OF THE FAITHFUL



We have already seen that the ministerial priesthood, the priesthood we normally associate with priests, is ordered towards the sanctification of the common priest hood of the baptized. This week we will explore the priesthood of the baptized in more detail.

As we established last week it was the whole nation of Israel that was considered to be priestly, we recall once more Exodus 19:5-6:

Listen, then, to my voice, and keep your covenant with me; and I, to whom all the earth belongs, will single you out among its peoples to be my own. 6 You shall serve me as a royal priesthood, as a consecrated nation

The importance of this passage has ramifications for the new Israel, that is the Church established by the new high priest, Jesus Christ. The new inhabitants of the new Israel inherit the character of a priestly people and a consecrated nation.

Yet now we must look to the purpose of the priestly people. The fundamental understanding of the priestly nation is to mediate God and God's promises to the world. This task is first of all energized by the priestly people's reception of the sacraments. The sacramental life, particularly of the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Penance, help the priestly people to live constantly in a living relationship with the God they are called to Cont...mediate. More acutely, the priestly character of the baptized impels the baptized person to divine worship, hence the obligation of the baptized to offer worship on the Sunday. The idea of the Sunday obligation makes more sense when we understand it through the lens of the priesthood of the baptized. As priests are ordered towards sacrifice, mediation and worship, so too the priesthood of the baptized is called to this work albeit via the ministerial priesthood which serves it and enables it to offer such worship.

Secondarily, the priesthood of the baptized is meant to mediate God and God's life to the world. Israel was deputed this work as we see in Isaiah 56:6-7:

6And foreigners who bind themselves to the LORD to minister to him, to love the name of the LORD, and to be his servants, all who keep the Sabbath without desecrating it and who hold fast to my covenant-these I will bring to my holy mountain and give them joy in my house of prayer. Their burnt offerings and sacrifices will be accepted on my altar; for my house will be called a house of prayer for all nations."

Israel's office as a priestly nation was to assist in drawing all people to the knowledge and worship of the true God. Thus, the idea of an expanded, new Israel, not contingent on tribal or ancestral connection, was to be the object of Israel's priestly consecration. Furthermore, this drawing of the nations into the worship of the one true God saw that the priesthood once associated with tribalism, whether that be of the nation of Israel as a whole or in particular the tribe of Levi, was now to be open to the foreigner, for Isaiah prophesies the following:

> 18"And I, because of what they have planned and done, am about to come and gather the people of all nations and languages, and they will come and see my glory... 21And I will select some of them also to be priests and Levites," says the LORD. (Isaiah 66: 18, 21)

The mediatory office of the faithful's priesthood also involves the preaching of the kerygma-the fundamental understanding of the Christian faith namely that Jesus Christ died for our sins and is risen now and wishes to share that new life with all people. The role of the faithful then is not to primarily be liturgical ministers, although it does not preclude it, but rather to be the frontline evangelisers in the office, the workshop, the factory, the classroom and the public square.

The Second Vatican Council Document Lumen Gentium, which gives a blueprint for the Church in the modern world, states quite clearly in its chapter on the Laity that:

> the laity, by their very vocation, seek the kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God. They live in the world, that is, in each and in all of the secular professions and occupations. They live in the ordinary circumstances of family and social life, from which the very web of their existence is woven. They are called there by God that by exercising their proper function and led by the spirit of the Gospel they may work for the sanctification of the world from within as a leaven. In this way they may make Christ known to others, especially by the testimony of a life resplendent in faith, hope and charity. (Lumen Genitum #4)

Whilst all are priests by virtue of baptism, both laity and clergy, the laity's priesthood can be fully discharged in this understanding as given in *Lumen Gentium*. The role of being mediators of God's life and love to the world is enunciated most acutely in Cont...Lumen Gentium's outline for the lay faithful:

They are called there by God that by exercising their proper function and led by the spirit of the Gospel they may work for the sanctification of the world from within as a leaven. In this way they may make Christ known to others, especially by the testimony of a life resplendent in faith, hope and charity

It is our heartfelt prayer that the Church, particularly in its priestly people, may continue to work for the sanctification of society and work within it as leaven so that all people may come to know, worship and love God-Father, Son and Spirit.

#### NOT JUST WAITING FOR GOD

Today's Gospel, the parable of the ten girls at a wedding, is a homely tale which climaxes in the crunch line, "Stay awake because you do not know either the day or the hour." 'In the Garden of Gethsemane Jesus would ask, "Could you not have stayed awake with me one hour?" This is the moment when a new world is to be born; when God made man is to make the ultimate sacrifice of his infinitely precious life; when the endless energy that sacrifice releases is about to pour back into the world as the One we call the Holy Spirit – the Spirit who makes all things new, the Spirit who renews the face of the earth.

'Our faith invites us to see the death and resurrection of Christ as the central events in the history of the world. Through them, God's Spirit is sent abroad to remake humanity in the image of his Son, to gather men and women into that union with him we call his mystical Body. And in such we see what human nature can become if only we let grace do its stuff. This is our remedy as Christians for the ills of the world: the new start, the new energy, the new hope for the world of the risen Lord.'

#### SOME THOUGHTS ON TODAY'S SCRIPTURE

Readiness, being alert, a sense of expectancy and hope, these are all things that Jesus tries to communicate through some of his parables. The foolishness of the five was not only that they forgot to bring extra oil, but because they assumed the exact time that the groom was going to come. I ask yourself: Who am I in the parable? Am I willing to wait on God even when I don't know how long it will take? Can I faithfully entrust myself to the unknown with the certainty of God's goodness? Talk to Jesus about these things.

#### THE LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS

Dr Belle Joseph will be giving a talk **The Light in the Darkness:** Suffering, Poetry and Faith in the Nazi Concentration Camps in the Parish Centre on Sunday 22 November at 3pm. The talk will last 20-30 minutes, followed by another 20-30 minutes for questions. The talk will be followed by refreshments. Description: Seventy-five years after the liberation of prisoners from the Nazi concentration camps, the stories of camp survivors are still well known. Yet few people are familiar with the poems that a number of prisoners wrote in the camps. In poetry, these prisoners not only expressed their fears, desires, pain, and consolations, but they also found meaning in their traumatic experiences. For some Catholics in the camps, poetry became a way of discerning the presence of God in their ordeal. In this presentation, Belle Joseph will share the story of some of the French Catholic prisoner-poets and discuss what their lives and their poetry can tell us today about discovering the light of Christ in times of suffering.

Belle studied French at ANU and taught French there between 2010 and 2018. Her doctorate, completed in 2017, investigated the French poetry written in concentration camps during the Second World War.
