Happy are the poor. Woe to the rich!

Jesus came down with the Twelve and stopped at a piece of level ground where there was a large gathering of his disciples with a great crowd of people from all parts of Judaea and from Jerusalem and from the coastal region of Tyre and Sidon who had come to hear him and to be cured of their diseases.

Then fixing his eyes on his disciples he said:

'How happy are you who are poor; yours is the kingdom of God.

Happy you who are hungry now: you shall be satisfied.

Happy you who weep now: you shall laugh.

'Happy are you when people hate you, drive you out, abuse you, denounce your name as criminal, on account of the Son of Man. Rejoice when that day comes and dance for joy, for then your reward will be great in heaven. This was the way their ancestors treated the prophets.

'But alas for you who are rich: you are having your consolation now.

Alas for you who have your fill now: you shall go hungry.

Alas for you who laugh now: you shall mourn and weep.

'Alas for you when the world speaks well of you! This was the way their ancestors treated the false prophets.'

Breaking Open the Word

'BLESSED' ARE YOU ...

Like Matthew's Sermon on the Mount, Luke has Jesus teach his disciples. It occurs on a plain with the teacher surrounded by a great crowd of his disciples and others. We learn that his audience comes from around Judea, even from ancient Syria (Tyre and Sidon, in present-day Lebanon). In Luke, Jesus teaches about the primary qualities of discipleship and warns of the subtle attractions or seductions that compromise that discipleship.

Wealthy and poorer Greco-Romans make up Luke's late first-century Gospel audience, and Luke directs Jesus' words deliberately at them. The first half of his teaching is to those who are economically poor, hungry and grieving. Those are the members of Luke's world who do not have the power or status to respond to their social, economic or personal situation. They are utterly powerless and live, perhaps, on the margins of Luke's Gospel household. God will reverse their status. Luke reminds them that they are 'blessed' by God.

The translation, 'happy are you...' doesn't capture the powerful sense of Jesus' teaching. To be happy is a personal emotive response to good fortune. To be 'blessed' comes from above. This is God's act, God's gift, independent of one's emotional state. Blessedness places one in the realm of the holy. The second half of Jesus' teaching is addressed to those in the Lukan household who are wealthy, have all they need and are dismissively laughing, perhaps at others' misfortune. Their situation will also be reversed. Jesus' words are insightful and sobering. They invite us, contemporary disciples, to identify what we struggle with and what seduces us.

it has no worries in a year of drought, and never ceases to bear fruit.'



Archdiocesan News - Fr Tony Percy

Pope Francis has appointed Fr Tony Percy, currently the parish priest of St Gregory's parish, Queanbeyan, as the next Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Sydney.

Fr Percy, 62, was born in Sydney but relocated to Cooma with his family soon after. He is well acquainted with Sydney, however, having studied a Bachelor of Commerce (Hons) from the University of New South Wales and, more recently, serving as the rector of the Seminary of the Good Shepherd from 2009-2014.

Following his ordination to the priesthood in December 1990, Fr Percy served at the parishes of Young, Queanbeyan, Ariah Park, Ardlethan and Barrellan before heading to the United States for further studies, obtaining his Licentiate and Doctorate in Sacred Theology.

After his return from studies, he served as parish priest in Goulburn before being invited by Cardinal George Pell to head the seminary.

Following his term as seminary rector, Fr Percy returned to Canberra and served as the archdiocesan Vicar General from 2015-2023. During that time he also served as parish priest at Wanniassa and then—until this appointment—as the parish priest of St Gregory's, Queanbeyan.

Before Fr Tony's departure for Sydney, there will be a Mass and Farewell for Fr Tony at St Christopher's Cathedral.
