

Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

Who thought that the Gospels and Jesus'

words are humourless? Today's Gospel

In my criticism of others and judging them,

according to Jesus, I ignore the bigger issue:

my inability to self-reflect and see the larger

personal weaknesses in my own condemning




