Specially I would to thank a few people from the parish who journeyed with me closely: Ursula Stephens for her incredible leadership as the Restoration Committee Chair, members of Parish Finance Committee and Pastoral Council, Michael Lamarra and Tim Sieler who spend more than 3 months in cleaning, sorting out and storing things from St Brigid and the surroundings, David Bourke and Diane Green for their willingness to support and help anytime, Maureen Griggs for her meticulous cleaning, volunteers who helped to move things at the start of restoration, Matt Casey for coordinating the Reopening Celebration, Domingue Croker and the Trinity Catholic College Hospitality Team for their amazing service on the Reopening and Louise Thrower from Goulburn Post.

Special thank you Fr Joe for your great support, inspiration and commitment. Last 12 months you were a great support to parish and to me. You are humble, a man of prayer with great sense of humour. We will miss you. Please be assured of our prayers. We wish you the best in Tumut Mission.

Also, I take this opportunity to thank Sharon Cashman, on behalf of Goulburn Mission parishes, for her service as the parish secretary for last 16 years. We wish her all the best in her future endeavours.

The glory of God and profound peace reaching out to embrace the whole of humanity are dynamically related in the baby in the manger. This is the song of the angels, and it is our privilege to join in that song at this Christmas Mass.

Every baby is a promise of a new future which fills one with hope. But this baby is unique. This Jewish boy baby is the body language of God. This baby is the sonburst of God entering our dark world. This baby shows us that God is not impossibly remote but, rather, God is as intimately close as a vulnerable infant.
