

FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER / A

10 May 2020

FIRST READING

Acts 6:1-7

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles They elected seven men filled with the Spirit and wisdom.

About this time, when the number of disciples was increasing, the Hellenists made a complaint against the Hebrews: in the daily distribution their own widows were being overlooked. So the Twelve called a full meeting of the disciples and addressed them, 'It would not be right for us to neglect the word of God so as to give out food; you, brothers, must select from among yourselves seven men of good reputation, filled with the Spirit and with wisdom; we will hand over this duty to them, and continue to devote ourselves to prayer and to the service of the word.' The whole assembly approved of this proposal and elected Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, together with Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolaus of Antioch, a convert to Judaism. They presented these to the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them.

The word of the Lord continued to spread: the number of disciples in Jerusalem was greatly increased, and a large group of priests made their submission to the faith.

SECOND READING

1 Pet 2:4-9

A reading from the first letter of St Peter You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood.

The Lord is the living stone, rejected by men but chosen by God and precious to him; set yourselves close to him so that you too, the holy priesthood that offers the spiritual sacrifices which Jesus Christ has made acceptable to God, may be living stones making a spiritual house. As scripture says: See how I lay in Zion a precious cornerstone that I have chosen and the man who rests his trust on it will not be disappointed. That means that for you who are believers, it is precious; but for unbelievers, the stone rejected by the builders has proved to be the keystone, a stone to stumble over, a rock to bring men down. They stumble over it because they do not believe in the word; it was the fate in store for them.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a consecrated nation, a people set apart to sing the praises of God who called you out of the darkness into his wonderful light.

GOSPEL

Jn 14:1-12

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

I am the way, the truth and the life.

Jesus said to his disciples:

'Do not let your hearts be troubled.

Trust in God still, and trust in me.

There are many rooms in my Father's house; if there were not, I should have told you.

I am now going to prepare a place for you, and after I have gone and prepared you a place, I shall return to take you with me; so that where I am you may be too.

You know the way to the place where I am going.'

Thomas said, 'Lord, we do not know where you are going, so how can we know the way?' Jesus said:

'I am the Way, the Truth and the Life.

No one can come to the Father except through me.

If you know me, you know my Father too. From this moment you know him and have

seen him.'

Philip said, 'Lord, let us see the Father and then we shall be satisfied.' 'Have I been with you all this time, Philip,' said Jesus to him 'and you still do not know me?

'To have seen me is to have seen the Father, so how can you say, "Let us see the Father"? Do you not believe

that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words I say to you I do not speak as from myself:

it is the Father, living in me, who is doing this work.

You must believe me when I say that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; believe it on the evidence of this work, if for no other reason.

'I tell you most solemnly, whoever believes in me will perform the same works as I do myself, he will perform even greater works, because I am going to the Father.'

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Reflections Gospel

'IT IS BETTER THAN I GO AWAY ...'

Today's Gospel comes from the long instruction that Jesus, according to the Fourth Gospel, gives to his disciples at the Last Supper. He reflects upon his return to the Father and what his absence will mean for the disciples.

Jesus' 'departure' seems to operate on two levels. The setting of the supper on the night before he dies makes it natural to understand 'going away' as a reference to his imminent departure in death; his 'coming back', then, would refer to his appearance on the third day as risen Lord.

At another level, however, Jesus addresses a more permanent 'going away' when, following his appearances to the disciples as risen Lord, he finally ascends to the Father (see John 20:17). From this perspective, his 'coming back' would refer to his return at the end of time.

At this level the instruction Jesus gives does not bear upon the short space between Good Friday and Easter, but upon the indefinite 'time of the Church' that will follow.

During this time—which remains our time—the disciples will not enjoy his physical presence. But Jesus insists that it will be a better time in fact. His death on the cross will defeat the grip of sin and death upon the human race, and open up for us the gift of eternal life.

Jesus is 'the Way, the Truth, and the Life' in the sense that his death supremely reveals the 'truth' about God (that God is love) and opens up the 'way' to human sharing in God's (eternal) 'life'.

FR GEORGE'S GOSPEL REFLECTION

Do you allow any troubles to rob you of God's gift of peace? As much as we try to avoid it, we inevitably encounter challenges and trials that can shake our confidence and our trust in God. Jesus knew that his disciples would be put to the test when their Master was taken from them during his suffering and passion. Jesus encouraged his disciples to put their faith and hope in God the Father and also in himself.

What could seemingly be referred to as Jesus's farewell speech in John's Gospel, left the disciples sad and disheartened. For the Disciples of Christ, it was a moment of confusion, doubt, anxiety, worry and even sadness. Jesus had just revealed that He would be going away from them. This opened up all sorts of questions in their minds. What would happen to their plans and ambitions? Did they waste three precious years by following Jesus? Was their Master truly the Messiah? If So, why is He going away without restoring the kingdom which they had hoped for? Jesus comforts and consoles the disciples who are saddened by His imminent departure from this world. He tells them of the purpose of His departure: to go and prepare a place for them.

He also reveals that he would come again and take them with him that where he is, they may also be. But Thomas throws up the question of where He is going and what is the way to where He is going? Jesus makes the all-important and profoundly meaningful statement: "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, but by me...." This assertion of Jesus is a self-revelation of who He is (TRUTH of the Father); what His mission is (to be to the Father) and how He is going to accomplish His mission (by giving His LIFE world in obedience to the Father). In Jesus we have the revelation of Truth, Way to our destiny and the source of our Life. We can satisfy the deepest yearnings of our heart in in our union with Jesus who is one with the Father. When we follow Jesus, our struggles and sadness will turn into joy.

Jesus Master, the way, the Truth and the Life, have mercy on us!
