Today we are faced with the cost of discipleship, but we are also comforted by the promise of the providence of God. Baptism is for us both death and life. Through it we enter into Christ's death and we die to lives of selfishness and sin. Through it we rise with Christ to a new life freed from everything that previously held us down. As glorious as this new life might be, it requires death to our old ways of living, and this is always difficult.

The cost of discipleship cuts right to the core of our beings, it lays bare the very structures of kinship. Baptism recreates us as children of God; through it we are given a new life and born into a new family. The bonds of discipleship are now even stronger than the bonds of blood. Discipleship requires our very lives. As disciples we can no longer put ourselves first. We must be willing to spend ourselves and to be spent, to serve others in the day to day unfolding of life. We may find such commitment very demanding, but that is part of the cost of discipleship. God promises that if we lose our lives in this way, we will really gain them. If we are unselfish in the way we share ourselves with others, we will be enriched through our generosity.

If we spend ourselves and are spent in our service of others we will be filled with blessings unimaginable.

Updated Archdiocesan Protocols

As from Monday 1st June a maximum of 50 people are allowed to attend church at any given time for private prayer or Mass. Social distancing of 1.5m is to be maintained. Sign-in book is provided prior to entry. You must register your details and provide your contact details to ensure, if needed, that contact tracing can occur. All who wish to attend Mass are required to register with the Parish Office by calling 64951880 during Office hours or email (pambula@cg.org.au) outside Office Hours. Please do not "just turn up" as this will contravene current NSW Government Guidelines.

If you decide to attend Mass, please adhere to these rules:

- There will be no procession of gifts, no passing of hymn books or collection plates.
- The sign of peace will be omitted or given without hand-to-hand contact.
- Holy communion will only be distributed and received on hand.

Hand sanitisers are available in the church. Door handles, pens and surfaces are sanitised regularly

Penance/Reconciliation

- First rite of penance, with priest and penitent observing spacing.
- Second rite of penance suspended until further notice.

First Penance, First Holy Communion & Confirmation (Sacrament Program)

-Normal pastoral practice resumes, respecting liturgical and pastoral protocols.

Prayer and Social Gatherings

- -No more than 20 people permitted to gather whether inside Church or other Church facility:
- a. 1.5metres distancing.
- b. Customary/recommended hygiene practices.

Register

-Parishes and communities are to keep an accurate register of people who come for public prayer.

Hygiene

-Frequently touched surfaces to be regularly cleaned.

Funerals and Weddings

- -A total of 50 people allowed for a funeral inside a church (*excluding celebrant and people involved in liturgical ministries*).
- -A total of 50 people allowed for a graveside funeral (*excluding celebrant and people involved in liturgical ministries*).
- -A total of 20 people allowed for a wedding inside a church building (excluding celebrant and those involved in liturgical ministries).

Baptism

- -50 people permitted inside the Church building (*excluding celebrant and those involved in liturgical ministries*), with customary/recommended hygiene practices.
- a. RCIA candidates can receive confirmation.

Plenary Council - Some Challenges

Due to COVID-19, the Plenary Council will now take place in Adelaide on October 2021 and Sydney in July 2022. May I offer four challenges and reflections.

1. A JOURNEY OF THE HOLY SPIRIT.

The Plenary Council is a work of the Holy Spirit. This means we journey together by way of silence, listening and patient discernment.

This is the most important foundation we must all share. Already this journey has taken us over two years. We need to assess how we have fared in this challenge. I would say we have much room for improvement.

1. CONFUSION OVER THE WORD "GOVERNANCE". The key word "governance" requires greater definition.

It has a theological meaning; it is a derivative of our baptism whereby we share in the mission of Christ as Priest (sanctifying), Prophet (teaching) and King (governing).

It also has a corporate meaning. Good governance is anchored in administrative processes and protocols alongside essential words like "transparency" and "accountability".

The Catholic Church has much to learn from this corporate meaning.

1. THE CHANGE IN CATHOLIC DEMOGRAPHICS.

The recently deceased and loved member of the Plenary Council Facilitation Team, Columban priest Fr Noel Connolly, wrote: "By 2050, 80 per cent of Catholics (globally) will live in or trace their origins to the Global South.

"The typical Christian will soon be a poor coloured woman from a shantytown in Kinshasa, Buenos Aires, Manila or some other large city in the majority world ...

"Forty nine per cent of all Australians are born overseas or have a parent born overseas."

We are challenged to do more to engage our huge vibrant Catholic migrant and youth communities.

1. TO AGREE ON EVANGELISATION AS THE KEY.

Surely we all agree evangelisation is the key pastoral paradigm of the Plenary Council.

Discernment is still required as to how this paradigm is to engage practically our complex Australian evolving culture and those on the periphery of life, especially our First Australians.

BRINGING THE SCRIPTURES TO LIFE!!!!

Would you be interested in developing your ability to proclaim the scriptures in a way which brings them to life for the listener, simply by telling the story as though we are first-hand witnesses?

Ray and Fenella Temmerman, of Winnipeg, Canada, having spent time in Merimbula each year for the last 4 years, now find themselves 'locked down', unable easily to return to their home in Canada. (As Ray says, if you have to be locked down somewhere, there are FAR worse places to be locked down than in Merimbula!)

Ray studied theology and scripture at St Paul's Seminary in Kensington, NSW, 1976-80, then in retirement completed a Masters in Sacred Theology at the University of Winnipeg. He now offers workshops on proclaiming the scriptures. This is how he describes their content:

"I begin by exploring why we proclaim the scriptures. Then I use an Ignation form of reflection to draw people into scripture as a lived experience. We then take time to practice experiencing the scriptures. Finally, we begin the actual practice of proclamation, giving people a chance to tell the scripture story, learn what they are doing well, as well as what they could improve on and how. The process has worked well, with people picking up and applying practical tips to help them improve their proclamation."

Even if you've been a lector for many years, you'll still find some good tips about how to make proclaiming the scriptures an uplifting experience, and receive suggestions on practical aspects such as using the microphone well.

I would encourage everyone interested in developing their abilities to let the Parish Office know that you are interested. If enough people come forward, we can look at setting a date for this exciting workshop.

Ray normally runs the workshop over a 3-hour period. He particularly appreciates if people from different churches can join in, all of us together coming to experience the Word of God as brothers and sisters in Christ, even though we come from churches that are estranged from each other.
