Reflection: 13 Sunday



Jesus treats with respect and concern two 'untouchables': the haemorrhaging woman and the young girl's corpse.

This double story shows us not only his compassion for those who are sick and his power over death but also his willingness to go beyond social and religious prohibitions in the service of others. The sick and desperate woman overcomes her social inhibitions in order to touch Jesus, hoping that mere contact with his garments will ensure her healing. Her faith urges her to act. In the case of Jairus' daughter, the child herself cannot ask. Instead, it is her father, who as a synagogue official was probably deeply suspicious of Jesus, who pleads for her. In both cases it is faith which is the key to healing.

Have you ever been unable to help yourself; totally dependent on another person for your needs?

Do you feel any special bond with any of the characters in this gospel? In what ways do you associate with them?

For Jesus to lay hands upon a young woman of twelve years of age (old enough to be betrothed) would have been seen as a scandalous act. Jesus breaks through the restrictions of social norm to bring life.

- To have physical contact with women who were menstruating or with corpses meant that the person who had touched them became 'unclean' and therefore unable to participate in the religious life of Israel. Here Jesus contravenes the Jewish law to bring wholeness and life. .
